THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

29th November, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

The beautiful Festival of All Saints has come and gone, bringing with it its measure of encouragement and disappointment. The early Celebration on November 2, was well-attended, as we expected it would be: being the First Communion for the recently Confirmed. The morning service was no better than an "ordinary" Sunday morning congregation; and the evening was, for a Festival Sunday, deplorable. It is irksome to have to write in this strain, but I feel it is something All Saints' people should know. It set me asking, "If All Saints' people will not come to the All Saints' Festival, when WILL they come?"

We were glad to have the Reverend Clive Kerle's assistance at the early Celebration, and we are particularly indebted to him for a splendid address to the Confirmes at the Communion Breakfast for which, in passing, we record our gratitude to some of the Guild members assisted by the Young Marrieds and those who, by their gifts, helped them to provide. The occasional preacher at Evensong was my old friend, the Reverend J. Robertson, formerly of Petersham Baptist Church. I was very disappointed there were not more people to hear his stimulating and helpful address.

Once again Advent affords us the opportunity to prepare ourselves for the Christmas message. Whilst the Advent season gladdens our hearts with the glorious message of God Himself coming to our world and living a human life, Advent also confronts us with the fact of our slackness and indifference. How little have we done to prepare the way for Christ's Coming, how frequently our selfishness and cowardice have hindered the progress of Christ's Kingdom. Hence the timely challenge of Advent Sunday, with its insistent call to **awake** out of the carelessness and apathy which make our religion so ineffective.


We live in times when the Christmas message of peace and goodwill seems to have no relevance. There is no sign of peace and little evidence of goodwill. Yet in the sphere of personal relationships, the number of estranged friends and relations who have been reconciled at Christmas is legion. Moreover, nearly every good cause in the world looks for its

support to Christian people moved by the Christmas spirit. In the sphere of child-life especially, the fact of the Coming of Christ as a Child has had a mighty influence. Though so many people by their indifference reject the Christian Faith and the Christian way of life, they still continue to keep the Festival which has its origin in the Birth of Christ. Whether they realise it or not, such observance is a link with spiritual things. There can, however, be no real Christmas without Christ.

Thanks to your generous response, we were able to ask the N.S.W. Secretary of the Australian Board of Missions to receive our gifts for the Melanesian Mission which amounted to over £100. We thank Mr. Childs for his appropriate address.

Such a large family at the present time costs £34,000 per annum to maintain.

Our objective will be to build this Home on the cottage-system, with all the necessary environments, thus creating as near as possible a home atmosphere—so dear to a child. Situated, as it will be, near the Boys' Home and "Havilah," we will create our own village.

These Homes are your Homes, and we pray that you will have their interests at heart, having also one desire, the building up of the Homes, and, in particular, the building up of our children in body, health and spirit. They, the children, must have a future—will you help give it them? A future bound together in unity of love and understanding. But this cannot be carried out without your help, either financially, materially or prayerfully.

You are shareholders in this work—will you help us pay dividends? The child dividend of love, steadfastness, security, and the will to walk in that way unto which it shall please God.

Dear friends, the children and our aged ladies sincerely wish you a very happy Christmastide, and God's gracious blessing on you throughout the coming year.
