## EVENING SERVICES IN WINTER

### Change of time proposed

Every year at this time, the colder, rainy winter weather approaches, and there is a marked falling away of the attendance at our Sunday evening service. As the Rector said at Evensong on 19th April, this is mainly due to the fact that folk prefer to stay in the comfort of their own homes (and watch television) rather than come to Church in the colder weather.

If it would help the congregation, the Rector would be willing to begin the service earlier at say 6.45 p.m. or even 5 p.m. Some parishioners are known to favour these earlier times.

This proposal will be discussed at the Annual Vestry Meeting, and any parishioners desirous of either changing the time, or keeping it at 7.15 p.m., are invited to take part in the discussion at this meeting. If agreed to, the earlier commencing time could possibly operate for about three months, i.e., from June through August.

## MAJOR WORK TO BEGIN

### Organ Contract Let

The Rector has announced that a Contract has been let to the well known organ firm of Noads for the repair and restoration of our Church organ. As parishioners are aware, improvement of the organ was one of the main objectives behind last year's annual gala fete.

Just over 30 years ago the organ was given a comparatively minor overhaul, but this will be a major job, including replacing the leather on the bellows. Many of the pipes that have been disconnected or are otherwise unusable will also come back in to service, some after many years silence. The work will cost over £1,000.

As it will take six weeks to carry out all the required repairs, Noads will supply us with an electrically blown organ to carry on our Services.

## COLUMBARIUM WORK BEGINS

With the return of Mr. Arthur Cook, our Officer of Works, from annual vacation, work on the construction of the final stage of the Columbarium is beginning this month.

After a great deal of difficulty in locating bricks to match the Church building, a suitable type was secured, and they have now been delivered to us. Bricklaying etc. will be taking place on successive Saturdays, and offers of labour (skilled and unskilled) from the men-folk of the parish would be greatly appreciated. The Rector or Mr. Cook will be pleased to let you know the hours and dates of the work.

**MAKE A DATE FOR THE GALA FETE**

By the time the bills are paid for the restoration of our organ, there won't be anything left from the proceeds of last year's Annual Fete. The balance of the money has already been used on property maintenance, and to meet a Synod assessment on our Fete takings.

We must, therefore, look to this year's Fete to raise more funds to continue the tremendous task of getting all our property back into good condition. Paving of the car parking area, relaying of old brick paths, roof repairs, and rebuilding of the "leaning fence" of Frederick Street are just a few of the urgent projects.

To be as successful as last year, we must start now to organise the stalls. Already, some of the folk are working on their stocks amongst these being:

**Watches and Clocks:** Mr. Arthur Cook now seeks old clocks and watches that he can place in good working order for re-sale at his stall. We ask especially that you may leave your gift at the Rectory or with Mr. Cook as quickly as possible, as it takes weeks and sometimes months to get the parts necessary to fix some clocks.

**Books, Toys, Stamps and Jewellery:** Mrs. Millarey is now building her stocks for this Stall, and if you 'phone her at LM 1643, she will gladly call and collect your gift. Books of any description will be accepted, including rare and antique books, for which Mrs. Millarey can get a special price from a bookseller.

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**PARISH PARS**

By popular demand, last November's "Y.C.I. Revue" is to be repeated in the Parish Hall on Friday, 15th May. The musical production number, which was widely acclaimed last time, will again be featured, with guest artists from local musical societies. Proceeds will be used to buy a backdrop for our Fall stage and more chairs for the Hall. Come along and be part of a bumper audience for a bumper show.

Judo classes are now held in the Parish Hall on Thursday nights, in place of the Table Tennis Club which has ceased to function because of lack of support from the lads of the parish. Men and women, boys and girls, are all catered for at the new classes.

"The Calling of Matthew" is the title of this month's film, to be shown at the Social Hour to follow Evensong on Sunday, 24th May. All parishioners are invited to attend. It would be appreciated if the Y.M. and Friends' Club could arrange the supper for this night.

Confirmation Classes are now about to commence for young folk and adults wishing to be confirmed this year. Would any who have not yet given their names to the Rector please see him within the next few days.

Before the June "Chronicle" appears, there will be another Street Stall conducted by the Young Marrieds' and Friends' Club. It will be held outside the Church gates on Saturday, 6th June, and donors and buyers will be very welcome.

The quest for clean newspapers continues. However, we can now accept "Heralds" only, as there is absolutely no sale for other newspapers, or for magazines. In fact, we've recently had to pay to get a stack of these smaller papers carted away.

Club Room of the Parish Hall on Friday, 8th May, at 8 p.m. The Rector will present his Annual Report to the Parish, all Club Secretaries are asked to report on their activities of the past year, and Church Wardens and Parish Councillors for the coming twelve months will be elected. The matter of a new starting time for Evensong will also be raised. All parishioners are invited.

Copies of the Hon. Treasurer's Financial Statement will be available at the Church early this month.

QUESTIONS FOR THE PARISH COUNCIL

1. Are we of one heart and mind in seeking God's will and guidance?
  2. Do we just deal with routine business or are we the spiritual leaders of the Parish?
  3. Do we pray for the Rector and our people, and for one another? Do we worship together?
  4. Have we any thought-out system of dealing with the various spheres of parish work—needs of old people, youth, witness and publicity, social service, liaison with the Diocese, and with the world mission of the Church—as well as finance and care of buildings?
  5. Do we go apart for a quiet week-end together to consider our spiritual needs and plan the strategy for the parish?
  6. Do we ever invite someone to come and talk to us about matters of importance to the Church and the community—the local M.H.R., the Mayor, the police inspector, the Archdeacon, the Rural Dean, the secretary of the A.B.M. or C.M.S., the organist, the Sunday School Superintendent?
  7. Do we ever help the Rector in suggesting subjects for sermons, occasionally working out a sermon together, which he can then deliver, as a message from the Rector and the Council?
  8. Are we willing to join with other Parish Councils in surveying the spiritual needs of the area and in fixing Priorities?
  9. Do we ever send greetings to other parishes, delegates to their dedications and jubilees? And gifts?
  10. Do we think of ways in which we can help neighbouring parishes?
  11. Is the canvass just a technique for paying our way (not a had starting point?) or a means of securing the necessary resources for the work of the Kingdom and enlisting people in its service?
  12. Do we want their money or their life?
  13. Do we try and help the organisations of the parish with their problems?
  14. Does there happen to be some money saved up that might be lent to a struggling parish free of interest for (say) five years?
  15. Is the subject of the missionary task of the Church regularly included in the agenda of the Parish Council as one of equal importance with other subjects?
  16. How far have we been able to work towards achieving the principle of the second great commandment by giving away to diocese, missions and charitable service as much as we spend on ourselves?
  17. Do we ever, from time to time, survey our neighbourhood to see if there is some particular need that our Church might undertake to meet?
  18. Would it be a good plan to discuss some of these questions at length at future meetings of the Parish Council?

## JUDGES


Our series on the books of the Bible, written by the Rev. Donald Cameron of Moore College

Judges takes up the history of Israel from the point where the book of Joshua closed. After a successful assault on the land of the Canaanites, they had demoralised their enemies and deprived them of much valuable country. However Israel failed to take up the challenge, and no longer having the benefit of the strong leadership of Moses and Joshua, each tribe, clinging to its own tract of country, fell into disunity and ignored the general good and needs of the whole nation.

National standards and morale declined further when the Israelite invaders settled down among the Canaanites and an exchange of religious practices and beliefs grew up. The Israelites began to move from the pure worship and faith they had known under Moses to the Canaanite religion with its complex idolatry and human sacrifice. Thus divided nationally and weakened spiritually, they fell prey to every kind of evil. Attacked by Canaanite groups, subjected to military pressure from the Philistines and also the Midianite camel raiders from the desert, Israel was almost at one point forced into the position of a slave race once more, a fate from which she was saved only by the genius of David.

However, God did not leave His people comfortless during this time of disunity and reversal. The Israelites were ruled and lead by judges such as Deborah, Gideon, and above all, Samson. In the Old Testament, the word "judge" does not merely mean to decide between, or to act simply in a legal capacity, but rather to deliver or save. Thus, the judges were men ordained by God to rally His people in a time of national emergency and lead them out of defeat and subjection. They were only partly successful in their task, but they saved Israel from extinction, and in so doing prepared the way for the golden age of David.

Judges, read best in the Revised Standard Version, makes vivid and powerful reading, full of "Heroic Age" stories of battle, murder and sudden death. Yet the book's final significance lies not in its barbaric heroes or its tales of war, but in its clear sense of both God's judgement and His mercy. When Israel "did that which was evil in the sight of the Lord" in idolatry and immorality, they were sore distressed but they were never finally abandoned or left to destruction and despair. "The Lord raised up Judges . . . and saved them out of the hand of their enemies."



● Sydney Diocese's Board of Education has now entered the field of adult education. Following the offer of financial support by the Standing Committee of the Diocese, the Rev. K. McIntyre, B.Ec., Th. L., has been appointed Adult Education Officer. In the early months, his work will be primarily that of evaluating existing forms of adult Christian Education in the various Churches and laying foundations for sound work in this field within the Church of England. The Board hopes to publish material for leadership training and for leader's use. Your prayers are invited that the Holy Spirit will guide and prosper in this new advance.


