



**Patronal Festival:**

As this is the second of the major Festivals kept at All Saints' each year—the Consecration Festival in August being the other—we do sincerely trust that all parishioners will give us their support in this special "local" celebration.

A Church Missionary Society nurse who is a former parishioner of All Saints' will be the speaker at Evensong on 27th November. She is Miss Josephine Brennan, who has recently returned after several years in East Africa.

This Service, starting at 7 p.m., will also be the occasion of the Y.C.F.'s. 56th Commemoration Service, to which all present and former Institute Members are cordially invited.

Before the Service, the Fellowship will have their monthly Youth Tea at 5 o'clock.

## 1966 CONFIRMATION

The Right Reverend F. O. Hulme-Moir, Bishop Coadjutor and Dean of Sydney administered the Sacred Rite of Confirmation to 15 candidates from All Saints' on Tuesday, 4th October. Candidates from our adjoining parish of St. Augustine's Stanmore were presented at the same Service by their Rector, the Rev. J. E. McDonald.

Bishop Hulme-Moir, participating in his First Service at All Saints' in twelve years, and the first since his return from New Zealand, gave an inspiring address to the confirmees based on the text from Deuteronomy 30, verse 19, which reads:

"I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live".

The Bishop, his friendly personality quickly putting the candidates at their ease, told them how to use their God-given wills to secure a better life on this earth. He instanced the life of Moses, who used his training as a general to save his people, and Yehudi Menuhin, the violinist, whose determination and persistency resulted in him becoming one of the great players of our day.

We are all given a will by God. We must pray to God that we may use our wills correctly in His service, and also that He may strengthen them not only to know, but also to do what is right in His Name. Depending on the direction we use our will, it can produce either wonderful or hurtful results.

God made us to be His servants, and if we are to be true to Him, we ought to be different from others—we must think and speak the best, we must not be envious, we must be generous, loving and thoughtful.

The Bishop told the candidates that they were pledging themselves to a loving kind God, and that they should encourage others, especially those who found life "hard going", to find and believe in this same loving God. They would find a big, wonderful world outside, but that greatness in it could only come with God's help.

Bishop Hulme-Moir said that this help from God could be obtained by reading the scriptures and praying daily, by continuing to worship in their Church after Confirmation and by attempting to put into practice in their lives all they had been taught and would continue to learn in the future of the Christian way of life.

By "choosing life" they would strengthen the soul, and find the "will" of adventure in their spirit. They would find that by exercising their wills, they would never be ashamed to call Him our God and would find a no more wonderful helper, friend, guide and Master than the strong Son of God, Jesus Christ.

The Rector expects that all confirmees will attend Mr. Dingle's Sunday morning Extension Group for at least twelve months, as part of the agreement they each made with him before Confirmation. Mr. Champion will give character references only to those who fulfil this obligation.

## EXTRA NEWS ABOUT GREAT FETE

Once again, we are seeking to surpass the All Saints' Fete Record of \$3,117 set only last year. Main aims of the Fete this year are to renew more of the church flooring, to carry out urgently needed repairs, and to make up the leeway in parish finances caused by loss of parishioners and falling collections.

In fact, if we had no fete at all, All Saints' could just not carry on financially.

However, we have been mightily blessed in every Fete we have run over the last ten years, and with your help, we look forward with confidence to beating last year's figure. Do what you can to help, support the various stalls and entertainment, and by your presence, help make this another gay and joyful day for All Saints'.

### Special Attractions This Year

New this year will be "Slot Car Racing" which is fast becoming a craze throughout Sydney. Twin tracks will enable contestants to race their cars against each other over some 80 feet of track built on the stage of the Parish Hall.

Boys and girls who haven't got their own cars will be able to hire them. However, if you have already bought your own, you will be able to bring them along and race at a reduced price.

### Performing Dogs

Free shows by a team of performing dogs will be given in the grounds at 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. These dogs have appeared on television in Sydney, and they have been described as "amazing", "colossal" and "almost human". It is even claimed that they can count and talk. So if you want to check these statements, make sure you're at the Fete during the afternoon.

### Other Great Attractions

The following entertainments will also be provided:

- Pony and Merry-go-Round rides all day.
- Sydney Thistle Highland Band will play and march in the grounds throughout the afternoon. This is Australia's champion highland band.
- All persons attending are eligible to sign the visitors' book and have a chance of winning a big poultry dinner hamper.

Here are some final points of interest from stallholders:

● **Refreshments:** Those responsible for the Refreshments this year would appreciate donations of money or goods (such as cakes, scones, biscuits, suitable fillings for sandwiches, butter, tea, sugar, etc.) There will be the usual hot pies again this time, as well as morning and afternoon teas of the same high standard as in previous years. In addition we shall be serving beautiful salad lunches.

● **Christmas Gifts:** Many Stalls will have items suitable for Christmas gifts. For example, Mrs. Clark will have towel sets (small and large), tea towels, table cloths, boxed pillow cases, apron sets, plastic flowers, as well as many other beautiful items.

● **Manuscript Journal Book:** For 56 years, the members of the Y.C.I. have contributed articles on a wide variety of topics to their "Manuscript Journal", which is compiled four times yearly.

Fortunately, these thousands of articles have all been preserved down the years, and a selection of wit, wisdom and humour has been put into book form for sale at the Fete, priced 30 cents a copy. It will be a "must" for all past and present Y.C.I. members, but will also be of great interest to all parishioners. A number of the Fete Stalls will be selling copies.

● **"White Elephant":** This is the stall that sells what other people don't want. A big marquee outside the front porch of the Parish Hall will be crammed full of wonderful bargains. Even if you can't help any other stall by a donation, there must surely be something around your place that you no longer need. Just drop it along to All Saints' before the day of the Fete.

● **Toys:** This will be a separate stall this year, manned by the Fellowship. A great variety of stock will cater for kiddies of all ages, and a special attraction will be a range of substantial tables and chairs for the children to play with. Free delivery of the latter within a five mile radius of the Church will be made on the Fete day to anyone buying this furniture.

● **Jewellery:** Amongst a wide range of attractive jewellery Mrs. Millarey is having a display of unusual chain pendants. These fantastic bargains have to be seen to be believed. The necklaces, earrings, brooches, rings, and children's jewellery are also the best buy ever.

## BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

## ZECHARIAH

The Book of Zechariah is made up of prophetic messages addressed to the people of God in a number of different aspects of their religious and social history. The first eight chapters refer to the apparently insurmountable difficulties that surrounded the tiny group of Jews that returned from exile in Babylon about 520 B.C. While Haggai, his contemporary, directed himself principally to the re-building of the temple, Zechariah's words dealt with a wider area of problems.

The Jews at this time, having returned from exile to their devastated land, its economy disrupted and its cities ruined, were faced, not only with these problems but with the task of renewing the spiritual life and religious activity of the nation which before the exile had been the centre of its national vitality and morale. To them, Zechariah's message came as a word from God. His prophecy is far more linked with vision and dream than is the case of the earlier prophets and his style does not fit easily into modern concepts of communication. Many of us will find a god general Bible Commentary such as the IVF New Bible Commentary or the SCM Layman's Bible Commentary in its relevant volume, a help in understanding the prophecy.


There is much emphasis in these early chapters on the fulness and depth of God's forgiveness. God has "returned to Jerusalem with mercies" (ch. 1 v. 16) and the sin of the people has been wiped out. The almost impossible work of reconstruction will be accomplished; "not by might, nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts" (ch. 4 v. 6). Jerusalem shall become a great and prosperous city "... without walls, by reason of the multitude of men and cattle therein" (ch. 2 v. 4). Indeed the city will need no walls for defence, God will be her defence, "... the Lord will be a wall of fire around about" (ch. 2 v. 5).

The second half of the book, chapters 9-14, deals in a rather obscure fashion with the future destinies of the Jews. Much of the material in these chapters is centred on a figure described as a shepherd who appears at times to be identified with an un-named and future king. The king comes in humility and peace, yet brings victory (ch. 9 v. 9). In another section we read of an assault, or the murder of the shepherd and the scattering of his flock (ch. 13 v. 7). These fragments are almost impossible to interpret in the context of the Old Testament alone, and only in the Gospel account of Jesus' life and death do these shadows become clear.

The book ends by taking up and developing the earlier themes of the final prosperity and abundance of God's people; Jerusalem "shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets" (ch. 8 v. 5). All nations shall turn to the God of Israel in true worship and faith. "The Gentiles ... shall go up ... to worship the King, the Lord of Hosts" (ch. 14 v. 16) and "men ... out of ... all the nations shall take hold of the skirt of them that is a Jew, saying, "we will go with you, for we have heard that God is with you".



"Grafted into the body of Christ's Church"
