THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory, 1st April, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints,

We would draw your attention to the last page of this "Chronicle," where you will see the times of the Services arranged for Holy Week and Easter Day.

— Once again we would ask that so far as you possibly can, you will keep Holy Week (commencing on Palm Sunday, April 14) free from all social engagements, that you may be able to observe it as a Holy Week, and take advantage of the opportunities your Church provides for the proper observance of this sacred season. There will, of course, be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week, and members are invited to attend the services, particularly upon the evening of their regular meeting.

Because many people use the most sacred day in the whole year — GOOD FRIDAY—for purposes which we cannot do other than deplore, and against which we should never cease to protest, it is necessary to emphasise the fact that the ONLY REASON why Good Friday is a holiday is because our Lord was crucified for us, and for all mankind, on that day. Your Church makes ample provision for all to spend this sacred day quietly and thoughtfully in corporate Acts of Penitence and Thankfulness. No one who honestly faces the bare facts that bring us to Good Friday's hill, will stand there long in speculation before kneeling in supplication, knowing that all this was done to God. We are reminded that God will come down to the lowest to help us, to stand beside us, to share our burdens. The Cross of Christ is the greatest proof in the world that God loves us and will do anything and everything to win our hearts and make us His. Christianity affirms that God is like that; and what He has done through Jesus Christ, living, crucified, risen, is the bedrock of all Christian living and Christian praying. Nothing is so humbling as to wake up to your indebtedness. I am humbled by the thought of men dying for me in New Guinea, in Singapore, in the Middle East, in Europe and elsewhere. I am still more humbled that on the Cross Christ died for me and for all the world. The essence of humility is to see yourself in a right perspective over against other people, and, above all, over against God. If only we could see straight in this way, then all life's relationships would be changed for the better, on the small scale and the large. The trouble is with so many of us, that we have an excessive regard for our own interests and a somewhat inflated idea of our own importance; so much so, that Number One looms so large in one's vision that it distorts the view of other things and other people. I suggest we look again at the Collect for the Sunday next before Easter (*Palm Sunday*). This prayer can't say everything about the Cross and ourselves; but it names two qualities which are essential for right living, and which a Christian learns, and only learns at the foot of the Cross. They are humility and patience. We therefore urge that you range yourself on the side of those who are trying to preserve this most Sacred Day—Good Friday. Do not allow yourself to be side-tracked by popular opinion, and do not drift with so-called popular behaviour. We shall need all our courage to take the offensive and offer a definite challenge to much careless life and thought which is so evident today.

The best preparation for our Easter Communion is a proper observance of the days preceding Easter. It is only as we receive and know the "Power of His Resurrection" that we have any chance of making our aspirations after a new and better world order become effective; only in His Power can the Church (which means you and me) surmount its failures and frustrations and stand up far more powerfully for God and righteousness.

Our Lenten boxes and envelopes for the A.B.M. and C.M.S. should be returned on Easter Day, together with our Easter offerings. If you are planning to be away from the Parish for Easter, will you please return your box before leaving, or else send it in by one of your friends?

Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be very acceptable, and should be left at the Church or Rectory not later than Saturday morning, April 20th.

The Children's Library—Thanks to the financial success of the recent evening given by The Modern Theatre Players, and organised by Miss D. P. Brown, we have been able to spend another £10 on new books for the Library. Such are book prices today, that this expenditure represents the purchase of only 35 books! We are indeed fortunate in receiving, since then, a fine donation from Mr. Gerald Locke of 35 books, all in excellent condition, which make a valuable addition to our catalogue, and which brings our total up to over one thousand books. Many thanks for this most acceptable gift which enables us to attain our objective of 1000 books before our first birthday.

The Library is one year old on April 21, and the Rector and members of C.S.O.M. invite you to our Children's Library Birthday Party on Saturday afternoon, APRIL 27, at 3 o'clock. The programme will be provided by the children who will present Living Pictures and a musical programme. Many thanks to Mrs. Furnell for her enjoyable afternoon which realised £4 for C.S.O.M.

Women's Guild—The Guild held its first Quarterly Rally for the year on Thursday, March 28. The attendance was good but not up to the Guild's usual standard. This was disappointing as our guest speaker, Mrs. W. G. Coughlan, was so worth while. She gave a most challenging address, which, it is hoped, will spur one and all on to help make a better world. Mrs. Reilly and her group kindly dispensed tea in the Parish Hall. During this social time a letter was read from Jean Henderson, one of the students at the A.B.M. Hostel last year, who has arrived in New Guinea. Amongst many items of interest, Jean, who is a nurse, says: "The hospital, at the moment, consists of one room. It serves as dispensary, theatre, and out-patients' department. Last week I treated 900 natives. The army and plantation people come too. There are some things that perhaps All Saints' people might like to help with. We need dressing towels (made out of old linen or sheeting), bandages, and garas (cloths) to cover new-born babies. They can be made out of old scraps of material, similar to a patch-work quilt, and need only be about thirty inches square." One feels sure this appeal will have a ready response, so "spring to it," won't you? The meetings for the month, are April 11, Bible Study, led by the Rector, and on SATURDAY, April 27, we combine with C.S.O.M. for the Children's Library Birthday at 3 p.m.—*P. Lucas, Hon. C.E.N.E.F.—At the last meeting of this Society it was decided to hold a Market Day, in conjunction with the Women's Guild, on Saturday, June 15, at 3 p.m. Part of the proceeds are for the C.E.N.E.F.
