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

LETTER FROM THE ACTING RECTOR

Dear Parishioners,

We are now close to the great Easter Festival. Can we recapture something of what it meant to the first generation of Christians, the men and women who saw Christ crucified?

"The Lord is Risen" was the central note of the message the early Church preached. "He was seen by 500 brethren at once, of whom the greater part remain unto this day," writes St. Paul. It was this certainty which gave the early Christians their sublime courage and endurance. In spite of persecution and suffering, theirs was an essentially joyous outlook. In the Greek Church this is the Easter greeting: "The Lord is Risen" and the reply, "Christ is risen indeed."

What do we, you and I, believe about the Resurrection? Even if we cannot imagine what our future existence is like, we can at least realise why we cannot imagine it. Take an illustration from Nature. If a tadpole could reason, could it foresee its future life as a frog, in a quite new environment? Could a caterpillar understand its existence as a butterfly? It is the same being, but how different its experience as a free, airborne insect.

One thing is certain, what we are now will have a profound bearing upon what we shall be, for we are growing towards our future. We are not just bodies, but each is a soul gradually being created by the Spirit of God, or better still, is being gradually freed from the material body by developing our capacity to love God and enjoy doing His will. "If ye be risen with Christ seek those things which are above. . . ."

On the other hand, just as a man who only cultivated a taste for third-rate music would not enjoy a classic masterpiece, so a man who devoted himself to coarse and sensual tastes would find himself utterly miserable in association with "all the company of Heaven."

May God grant you this Easter a foretaste of the Joys of the Risen Life.
