

THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
31st July, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints',

In order to make our Consecration Festival a success, we shall need the utmost co-operation and support of all parishioners. Sunday, August 20, will be observed as "Back-to-All Saints' Sunday," and you can help by getting in touch with all the former parishioners you possibly can, to invite them to worship with us in their old parish church on that day. You can assist also by inviting present parishioners, particularly those who do not attend church regularly, and those who do not come at all. Above all, please remember the Festival Services daily in your prayers.

A special invitation is extended to all the men of the parish who are communicants, to be present at the early Celebration on August 20, and to join in the fellowship of the Men's Communion Breakfast which follows. On pages 3 and 4 of this issue, you will find particulars of the services being arranged for the Festival.

Those who have collecting boxes which have been in use for the past four months (in lieu of a fete) will please return them on the Festival Sunday. For those who have no box, there is a special envelope issued with this "Chronicle," in which you are asked to place your special offering and bring it to church on the same Sunday. If it is not possible for you to be present on August 20, please send your box or envelope offering by a friend, or leave it at the Rectory beforehand.

In connection with our Festival there is the Parish Tea and Social Re-union on Wednesday, August 23. We may, I think, rightly claim that the organisers of the Parish Teas have attained a very high standard, and we must help them to maintain it. All Saints' Parish Tea has been so wonderfully successful, and so very greatly appreciated in years past, and we have reason to believe it will be no less so this year. Donations are invited from any who may be willing to give a table or part thereof, and promises of donations in kind will be very welcome. Admission to the Tea and Social Re-union is by ticket, which costs one shilling, and which

may be obtained from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild, or from the Rectory. You will understand the importance we place upon the sale of tickets, for it is only by such sale that we can hope to approximate the number for whom it is necessary to provide. Of course, you intend coming to the Tea! Well; then, please purchase your ticket as soon as possible!


Confirmation classes commence this week—for girls on Tuesdays, and for boys on Thursdays, at half past seven, at the Rectory. It is absolutely essential that candidates for Confirmation should attend the classes regularly, and should put their preparation class before all other engagements. Not only are the parents of the candidates expected to be at the Confirmation Service, but the godparents also. If the godparents are within reach of this Parish, the candidates should invite them to their Confirmation, which will be on Sunday, October 29, at 11 a.m., and, if I might have the names and addresses of the godparents, I would be pleased to send them my own personal invitation to the Service.

In common with all other Parishes, All Saints' has felt the onslaught of the prevailing influenza epidemic upon our congregations, and consequently upon our offertories, as you may see from the figures published in this paper. We sympathise with all those who have been laid aside, and trust we may soon have them back with us. Winter conditions, with their accompanying ailments, seem to me to be another very powerful reason for adopting the envelope system of offertory, so that your Church, which must naturally be affected by your enforced absence, may not suffer financially, for, by the use of envelopes, you put aside your offering each week, whether absent or present.

I am grateful to Mr. Gardner and all those who assisted him during my absence—the Reverends F. O. Hulme-Moir, A. W. Morton, C. L. Oliver; to Mr. R. F. Atkinson, who kindly gave the children's address; and, indeed, to any upon whom fell extra work by reason of my holiday.

I would pass on this story as being worth a thought or two. It was told by Pat McCormick, of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. "A native potentate had a son who wanted to become a Christian. He did not thwart the boy, who had seen the beauty of the teaching of Jesus; he simply sent him to England. What was the consequence? Well, the boy did not see Christ in England, and he never became a Christian. No doubt he could have been taken to see Christ, but he had plenty of money, and all he saw was blatant selfishness and a well-to-do, pleasure-loving crowd, disregarding almost all the precepts of Christ. Now, supposing he had been sent to you or to me—would he have become a Christian through seeing Christ in us?" Does the thought make you wonder?

After the business meeting, when arrangements were made for the Festival Tea, some musical items, a competition, and supper were much enjoyed, and brought the evening to a close.

The Quarterly Rally is on August 10, at 3 p.m. There will be a service in the Chapel, when the address will be given by Miss Herring, of the A.B.M. Hostel, Stanmore. This will be followed by a social hour in the Parish Hall. All women of the parish are cordially invited to be present.

The Y.C.I. Annual Social was held in the Parish Hall on July 25, when about 80 guests and members were present. The programme comprised musical items and sight acts, and novelty was lent by a special “presentation of debutantes.”

The 11th issue of the Manuscript Journal, released on July 21, was up to the usual standard, with an even mixture of serious and comedy articles. Subjects dealt with included: Modern Dress, The Small States of Europe, Faith in our Time, Zeppelin Raids in London, and Institute and Church affairs.

The other July meeting was devoted to a games night, when a novel programme of indoor sports was played. The night was cold, and the games fast, which was a happy combination, especially when capped by a supper prepared by the refreshment committee.

Visit of Prebendary Hinde.—His Grace the Archbishop writes:—

“Church people in the Diocese of Sydney are singularly fortunate in having Prebendary Hinde, of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, and Principal of Oak Hill College, in their midst during the latter part of July and this August. He comes as a trusted leader in Church affairs in the Old Land—a man of wide experience. His sane outlook, his grasp of fundamental issues, and his deep spirituality of life will at once make a strong appeal. He comes right from the heart of things. All Church people are earnestly invited to attend his meetings in the **Chapter House**, next to St. Andrew's Cathedral, for the **deepening of the spiritual life**—July 31 to August 4, at 8 p.m. each day. His **Bible readings** will be in the Cathedral at 1.15 p.m. on Thursday, July 27, and August 10 and 24. He will conduct a **Retreat for the Clergy** at Moore College each evening, August 28 to 31, and **special meetings** for them in the Chapter House on Monday evenings, July 27 and August 7, 14 and 21. Churchwardens will hear him at their Commissioning Services, and there will be **meetings for youth** at Moore College on July 28 and August 4, 11, 18 and 25, at 7.45 p.m. The keen desire of all is that he will be greeted with large audiences.”

Overseas Missionary Exhibition.—The Australian Board of Missions is to be commended for the proposal to hold a Missionary Exhibition in August, 8th to 11th, in the Sydney Town Hall (Lower), which will be opened by His Excellency the Governor at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, August 8th, when the Archbishop of Sydney will take the chair.

Afternoon and evening sessions will be held each day at 2.30 and 7.30 p.m.—Wednesday, August 9th, being Ladies' Day, when members of girls' and women's organisations are especially invited to see what Australian women can do for the aboriginal and native women.

The Exhibition is organised by Mr. A. J. Batchelor, of the Victorian office of A.B.M., who has organised most successful similar exhibitions in other parts of Australia, and in England and Wales. There will be Courts depicting Mission work among aborigines, Melanesia and Polynesia, New Guinea, Jerusalem, and the East, China and Japan. Addresses will be given on each of these countries, in many cases by people who have seen the work at first hand, and special interest will be afforded by the presence of Mr. David Unaipon, a full-blooded aborigine, and a most gifted speaker on his own people.

Missionary plays will be given at each session in a special theatre. Eastern and island goods, Missionary literature, produce, cakes, sweets and gifts may be purchased, and the proceeds will help to meet the heavy

expenses. All our parishioners are strongly urged to make a point of attending the Exhibition. Admission will be 6d. for adults and 3d. for children, except on the first afternoon, when admission will be 1/- for adults and 6d. for children. Season buttons, available for all sessions, are obtainable from the A.B.M. Office, 14 Spring Street, Sydney, at a charge of 2/- (adults) and 6d. (children), from the local Button Secretary, Mrs. C. Reilly, 6 Merton Street, or at the Rectory.
