

Dear Friends,

The argument over ordination of women to the priesthood continues. Should women become rectors of parishes, or take up duties which to-day are exclusively the dominion of male clergy?

This question is largely debated from two sides. The opinion against ordaining women usually rests on the interpretation of the Bible, especially the New Testament letters of St. Paul. The argument for ordaining women is not so strongly based on Scripture but is instead based upon the social climate we find ourselves in to-day.

For myself I opposed such ordinations on both Biblical and also on the basis of the society in which we live. It is about the latter I want to write.

From the Creation Story onwards men and women have had fairly well defined roles within the family and society as a whole. True! many of these roles are breaking down. In many areas this is good but I doubt whether that is true in every area. There are differences.

Having spent my whole life (short as it may be) as a part of one or another congregation I have observed that strong, vital congregations are those where whole families worship father, mother and children. Such family commitment is no doubt the key to vital worship and parish life. No matter how dedicated are the ladies in a congregation it is no substitute for a family based congregation.

Here is where the crunch comes. A lady in the pulpit,

or at the Holy Table does not project the image of family life, and so what is true for the congregation is even more so in the pulpit or at the Holy Table.

As a church we need to attract families; not just Mum and kids, or just Dad by himself (and it is interesting the number of men who do worship alone) - we need families. This should be our constant concern. There is a wholeness that comes when families gather together in worship on Sundays and live out that worship through the coming week. A mini - community where each member of the family helps each other to grow in faith, in discipline, in love and most importantly in God.

Let us pray for the families around us, especially for those whose children may come to Sunday School. Let us pray that there may be a sense of wanting to grow up together to the glory of God and the enrichment of each others life.

But this time, we shall also be able to see the State rooms of Admiralty House, thanks to the generosity of Their Excellencies.


