## RECTOR'S NOTES

My dear Friends,

During the past month I received an interesting letter from the Marrickville Municipal Council's Department of Social Work. It draws attention to a new service provided for all people receiving a pension and all those of pensionable age. This is a hot mid-day meal five days a week—Monday to Friday. It is provided at Petersham Town Hall for 20 cents per day. The Town Clerk has asked me and others to advise folk of this service.

In these days of difficulties and anxiety and much public complaining about what "they" should be doing to help overcome our community problems isn't it nice to be able to report a good thing being done by a public authority.

The Council is to be commended for this move. It will be of real assistance to a section of our community that must be reeling under the impact of the run-away inflation of more recent months.

This month of November brings us one of the "big" occasions of the parish year. Our annual fete will be held on the Church property on 16th November. The work of the Church in Petersham is very largely financially dependent on this event. This significance comes about as a result of inadequate provision being forthcoming from direct giving to the work of God through other means. Of course one would wish that we were able to provide for ourselves, but the fact remains that at present we depend upon "catching" the support of many who are not "members of the family"—and we must gratefully acknowledge the kindness of many who will make it a successful day. Many of our own folk labour diligently nearly all the year and contribute considerably by using their talents in preparing for the day. We are appreciative of their loyalty and devoted energy. The preparation absorbs a tremendous amount of their annual efforts and planning. Let's hope we have a happy day with good weather.

Any help in preparing the Hall and grounds on the Thursday and Friday before will be most welcome—and, of course, we hope menfolk will make themselves available on Saturday evening to return the Hall to a fit condition for our Sunday responsibilities.

This month we remember on Remembrance Day, all those who in times of trouble and distress have given their lives for that in which they believed. I would like to share with you two passages written by Able Seaman Christopher Goldie, of H.M.A.S. Parramatta. The first was written in June 1941, at Mersa Matruh:

"Bright flowers about an altar small  
Scented the summer air;  
Deep silence stretched from wall to wall  
Like one long prayer.  
The chapel clock it struck the hour  
And the chimes rang out from the chapel tower.  
Ringing out the hour of three,  
The hour of Blessed Trinity.  
'Lord, in a month where shall I be,  
And what, O Lord, in a year?'  
Where a lamp burnt red, a soft voice said,  
'Draw near, my son, draw near.'  
'For I am the Way, by land and sea,  
I am the Truth and the Life;  
And if ye believe, my son, in Me,  
Ye shall live though ye die in strife.  
I am He of whose Flesh though art,  
And to thee is my Promise given,  
For I am the Son and the Holy Ghost,  
And thy Father Who art in Heaven.'"

Then in October 1941, he wrote:


"When one can no longer plan for one's existence on earth,  
there comes a time when one starts planning for eternity."

These words now appear prophetic, for on 28th November, 1941, H.M.A.S. Parramatta was struck by torpedoes and sank. Twenty-five survived the sinking: The ten Officers and one hundred and thirty-six Others of the Complement including Able Seaman Goldie, are dead.

Thus, on the 11th November, let each one of us stop for a short time and think of those words given to us by one who, indeed, was aware of his possible fate and yet had Hope and not Despair and truly must have believed that portion of the Naval Prayer which reads in part:-

". . . Be pleased to received into thy Almighty and most gracious protection the persons of us thy servants, and the Fleet in which we serve. . . ."


Some people get lost in thought because it is unfamiliar territory. "Feeling deeply" may sometimes mean "in your pocket."
