## THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,  
August, 30, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints',—

As we look back upon the Consecration Festival of 1937, we realise that we have much for which to thank God. The Sunday Services were most inspiring and encouraging, and we are indebted to all who contributed to their success; particularly to Bishop Pilcher and Canon E. Howard Lea for their most helpful sermons, and to the organist and choir members for their consistently good work throughout the day. I was glad to have the assistance of the Revds. David Creighton, and A. H. Kirk at the early celebration, and we thank Mr. Kirk for his appropriate message at the Communion Breakfast, at which it was good to see such a splendid attendance of Y.C.I. men.

For some time now I have been convinced that fetes, bazaars, and sales of work do not yield anything like an adequate return for all the work they entail; hence the Box Appeal this year in lieu of a fete. Many, I think, were a bit dubious about its success, but I felt sure that it would bring in at least as much as last year's fete, and in this I was not disappointed. The boxes and envelopes have returned £132/0/7, and there are still a few boxes out-

standing. We would be grateful for their return as soon as possible, so that the appeal may be finalised. The Rector and churchwardens desire to thank ALL who responded to this appeal; and we are sure you all feel that this is by far the better way—from every point of view—of getting what we need for our Parish Hall debt.

The Festival Tea was again an unqualified success, and proved a great time of fellowship and reunion. I know it is simply "not done" in the "best parishes" to mention one's own, but I am sure you will forgive me saying that the success of the Tea was largely due to my sister's work and her flair for organisation; backed up, of course, by the gifts of parishioners and the untiring efforts of Women's Guild members and their helpers.

Our guests at Tea included The Venerable Archdeacon and Mrs. Wade, the Revd. G. P. M. and Mrs. Ware, Revd. David and Mrs. Creighton, Mrs. E. Cranswick, Revd. H. J. and Mrs. Lofts, and Revd. F. H. Meyer. Apologies were received from the Rectors of Holy Trinity, Dulwich Hill and St. Andrew's, Summer Hill, and Mrs. F. H. Meyer.

After Tea, Evensong was sung, when the choir rendered Hollins' "O Worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness." Messrs. A. E. Y. Benham and John Gilding were the soloists, both in church and at the social reunion in the hall where they were assisted in an excellent programme by Mr. Fred Cross. We were pleased to have with us Archdeacon and Mrs. Wade, both at Tea and afterwards, when the Archdeacon in a happy speech made reference to the pleasure it gave him to visit the parishes in his Archdeaconry. Other speakers were the Revds. C. C. Dunstan, David Creighton, Alderman Humphrey Earl, Mr. E. C. King and Mr. T. A. Willmott, who most interestingly took us back to the "old days," when, as a boy, 55 years ago, he lived in the old rectory during the locum tenency of his uncle, who took duty for the then Rector (Revd. Charles Baber) during his absence in England. Mr. Willmott has since written to say how much he enjoyed coming back to All Saints', and has expressed his appreciation in a practical way, as you may see elsewhere.

Altogether, our 1937 Festival was a wonderful time, for which we do "thank God and take courage," and from which, I trust, we may go forward to even better things in the future.

Winter conditions and sickness have taken the usual toll of our congregations (especially the evening) but I hope with the coming of warmer weather we shall soon build up again. Absence of this kind prompts me to again urge the value of the envelope system of offertory. The wardens know its value when they receive perhaps a whole quarter's envelopes from parishioners, who though prevented from attending, never forget their Church, and put aside, in scriptural manner, their offering each week. A good opportunity to make up what the Church has lost through your absence will be given you on **September 26**—the next quarterly offertory. The matter of securing a good congregation is not something which concerns only the Rector and his assistant—it concerns YOU. Are you doing your part; first, by being present yourself; secondly by influencing others to come with you?

We live in troublous times. On top of the unsettled conditions in Europe comes the trouble between China and Japan, and we begin to wonder to what it may all lead. We might even be tempted to despair at the seeming hopelessness of world affairs, but for the knowledge that this is our Father's world, and because He is infinite Wisdom and Power—as well as infinite Love and Mercy—nothing that either man himself or the forces of nature can do, is able to frustrate finally His Fatherly purpose. It is true that man has the gift of free-will, and it sometimes seems as if this endowment is a danger, and gives him the power constantly to thwart God's Will and to mar the design He seeks to weave. The question for each one of us is whether we shall in our daily lives work against God's purpose and so hinder and delay the coming of His Kingdom, or shall we seek in all our actions to know and do His Will? Ultimately He will achieve His gracious

and loving purpose, and it is surely wiser to co-operate with Him, and so at last share in the joy of the fulfilment of His purpose.
