THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

1st February, 1943.

Dear People of All Saints',

The month of February usually sees us getting into the customary round of parish activity—organisations which had gone into periods of recess commence their year's work. We sometimes find people coming to Church who "don't know anyone" and who feel somewhat lonely in consequence. To such we would commend our various Church organisations, where they would find a warm welcome and much opportunity for happy fellowship. You may feel a bit diffident about making a start, but you will find it worth while. You will find no better way of forming friendships in the Church's life.

Some people are very depressed about the future, however confident of victory they may be. But we should remember that the record of those years is still unwritten, and they will be what **WE** prove competent to make them. Shall the primitive instinct of self-seeking, or the Christ-passion of Service, be the guiding star in man's approach to life? The answer to this question depends upon you and me and upon those young people growing up in our midst. While there is much that we deplore, there is still much Christian idealism in this country. But let us beware of thinking that this Christian idealism will continue if people neglect the Church of Christ. The heart grows by what it feeds on. And if the hearts of masses of Australian people are not drawing their inspiration from the Christ who has made us what we are—imperfect as that may be—we cannot hope to maintain, far less to increase, the honest purpose and sympathetic service of men and women. Decline of spiritual zeal is bound to set in if we neglect God.

In front of the Viceroy's house in New Delhi stands a column on which are inscribed the words:

"In thought Faith,
In word Wisdom,
In deed Courage,
In life Service.

So may India be great!"

In quoting these words in a speech before the University of Oxford, Lord Halifax said: "No one of us could offer for our country and our commonwealth any better prayer to-day."

Under the inspiration of the motto "The Church Looks Forward" the Australian Board of Missions is organising missionary interest to face up to the Church's obligation to the future world of the Pacific. I am most anxious that our parish shall be well represented at the great meeting in the Sydney Town Hall on March 8th. I am giving you good notice, so that you may plan well ahead to be present; and in any case the next issue of the "Chronicle" will be too close to the meeting to be of any practical value. I want every adult organisation of our parish represented; and that means from Senior C.E.B.S. boys upwards. I have guaranteed at least 60 people from this parish. Please don't "let me down"! Already fifteen members of our choir have intimated their willingness to join the choir of 300 voices at that meeting. Elsewhere in this issue you will find details of the meeting on March 8th; regard it as a privilege and an honour to represent your parish at this meeting, which will be an event of historic importance in the life of the Australian Church.

We are planning to have our Harvest Festival Thanksgiving Services on Quinquagesima Sunday, March 7. Of course we realise our harvest gifts will neither be so plentiful nor so easy to obtain as in former years, but, if each one helps, I am sure we shall have a worthy offering, which will, as usual, be given to the Home of Peace.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

The Challenge to the Australian Church.—Writing in the last issue of the "A.B.M. Review," the Chairman says:—

"... Even a cursory review of the kind of challenge that may come to us almost takes one's breath away.

"Within the sphere of Australian authority there are Papua and New Guinea. In the former we know there is a great population of untouched native life stretching out through the highlands to the north-west as far as the Dutch border. In neither territory does it seem likely that the large numbers of German missionaries will be allowed to remain. If this

is so, a call for help on a wide scale may indeed be sent to the Australian Church. Within the sphere of British, French and American authority there are the wide spreading areas of Melanesia and Polynesia. In the former, evangelisation has more or less covered coastal villages, but in the interiors of the islands there is much work to be undertaken still. Polynesia has always been a sadly undermanned diocese. Within the sphere of authority to be determined by the decision of war there are the islands of the Japanese Mandate, which, if God gives us the victory, may well become a new responsibility for us Australians. Within the sphere of Chinese authority and restored (as we hope) Dutch authority, Christian help may be asked for. In case it is, we ought to **try to be ready.**"

[We can't be ready unless we are informed, and we can be informed and inspired by attending the meeting in Sydney Town Hall on March 8th.—Editor.]
