Miss Min, whose Christian name is Catherine, had her training at the Presbyterian Seminary and the Anglican Seminary, and then taught in a Bible High School.

She has worked as a councillor to the patients, as a Bible Study Leader to the staff, and has conducted Services in the Chapel of the Hospital.

Catherine has a wide range of interests. Whilst working at Masan about 70 km from Busan she helped a student group with Bible Study, held services for the farmers and had classes for musical appreciation.

Her Church at Masan had a Social Outreach in providing accommodation for twelve factory girls at "Holy Labours House". Catherine was their councillor. She says 'women's education influences not only children but the future of the country'.

Since 1979 she has been serving as Catachist for the Mothers' Union in the Anglican diocese of Busan.

Catherine is in residence at St Barnabas College in Adelaide where she is studying various aspects of Christian Education to keep her in her future work as a Bible Teacher with women and children.

WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLARSHIP

The purpose of this Scholarship is to offer supplementary training for a Christian woman who has already received her basic training, and is intended for those who give leadership in church life, and for those who need strengthening as Christians for their work in the world.

The terms will be determined by the needs of the applicants defined by their sponsoring bodies, and considered by the Scholarship Committee, in conjunction with the National Committee, within the following guidelines:

- a. Tenable for one academic year.
- b. Intensive courses for shorter periods, or
- c. Longer periods when particular qualifications are sought.

Awardees must plan to share the benefit of this training with their own people.

No age limit is set, but it is preferred that applicants be between 25 and 35 years.

The Scholarship covers the provision of return fare to the selected place of study and financial assistance with fees for (tuition), personal expenses and accommodation.

A. C. W. MEMORIAL BURSARY to the value of ^{100 -} ~~\$50.00~~ is awarded to each Scholar, this amount to be applied to the purchase of books. This award is made as a tribute to Australian Church Women who have given distinguished service to A.C.W.

Issue of Application Forms is handled by the Convener of the W.K.S. Committee (through the Overseas Mission Boards of various denominations and several other specific bodies).

In accordance with a policy introduced in 1975, three defined areas will be invited to submit applications in rotation.

- Area 1 East Asia-Burma through to Indonesia, excluding Japan and the Philippines
- Area 2 India, Pakistan, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka
- Area 3 Pacific Islands, Papua-New Guinea and Solomon Island.

WINIFRED KIEK VISITING FELLOWSHIP

The purpose of this Fellowship is to benefit Australian Church Women by giving them inspiration, knowledge and leadership from our Christian sisters of other nations, thus promoting knowledge and support of Australian Church Women programmes and projects.

Funds shall be available triennially or at the discretion of the National Working Committee, to provide fares, honoraria and accommodation costs for:-

- a. A distinguished overseas Christian Woman, or
- b. A Christian Woman scholar already studying in Australia.

Awardee of the Fellowship would tour Australia speaking to church and community groups, promoting an understanding of the work of the church in other nations.

Finance to maintain the Scholarship and Fellowship is provided by offerings received on A.C.W.'s Fellowship Day held in July each year. A Scholarship Investment Fund was opened with an initial donation of \$200.00 from the Reverend Winifred Kiek, the interest being applied towards the maintenance of the Scholarship.

Donations to the Winifred Kiek Investment Fund or to the A.C.W. Memorial Bursary Fund may be made at any time. All donations should be forwarded through your State Treasurer with specific details. (see page 4).

The Reverend Winifred Kiek, B.A., B.D., is honoured as a pioneer in the fields of particular interest to church women. She was the first woman to become an ordained minister in Australia, and her work for the World Council of Churches concerning women in the churches has had far-reaching effect.
