THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

As from All Saints' Rectory,
Petersham.
21st June, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints',—

Although at the moment of writing I am 500 miles away, "time and tide (and, one might add, parish papers!) wait for no man," not even for a rector on holidays! So I hasten to post this to Mr. Pattison, upon whom will fall the responsibility of the publication of this issue.

It is at this time of the year that we begin to prepare for our Consecration Festival in August. I hope you will commence now, to get in touch with past parishioners and invite them to keep August 15th free, so that they

may be able to observe that day as a "Back-to-All Saints" Sunday, for we hope then to commemorate the 35th anniversary of the consecration of our parish church. We hope too, to have the usual tea meeting and reunion of parishioners past and present, on Thursday, August 19th. This is but a preliminary intimation of our plans for the Festival; full details will be given in next month's "Chronicle."


It is on August 15th that the boxes we are using in lieu of a fete will be called in and presented. I would remind box-holders that from the issue of this paper until August 15th there will be but six weeks in which to fill any stray corners! I am very hopeful that this effort will be very successful, and that it will obviate all the work inevitably associated with fetes. If you have not been able to assist in the box scheme, we will present you with an envelope in which you may place your special offerings on August 15th.

May I again express the wish that parents and friends of our young people will do their utmost to assist them in coming to a right decision regarding Confirmation. It is, of course, impossible for you to decide this question for them, but you can, by your sympathetic understanding of the problems of young people, be a tremendous help to them at this time. It is quite possible, on the other hand, by your lack of interest, to give the impression that Confirmation does not matter very much; and thus, quite unintentionally, it may be, you would be the cause of preventing a decision being made for Christ and His Church. I find it necessary to remind parents sometimes of the solemn injunction given at the Baptism of their children: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop **TO BE CONFIRMED BY HIM.** . . ."

I would refer to the paragraph published elsewhere in this issue regarding the envelope system of offertories. There still seems to be an objection to the system by some who are under the misapprehension that in taking envelopes the extent of their offering is known. May I again point out that this is not so? The officer who opens the envelope certainly knows what each envelope contains, but he does not know from whom the envelope comes. Another officer enters up in a book the return of each envelope, and he certainly knows from whom the envelopes come, but he does not know what they contained, for the simple reason that the officer who opened them does not in any way mark the contents of the envelope. I need hardly say how valuable to those who are responsible for the finances of the church, are the regular gifts, and the offerings "made good" through envelope subscriptions, when one is absent from worship.

We again commend to your practical sympathy and support all efforts for the Kindergarten Building Fund, especially the sale of "bricks" for this purpose.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THE SENIOR GIRLS AND BOYS.

Dear Girls and Boys,—

Very soon after you read this letter, I hope to commence Preparation Classes for Confirmation. It is necessary therefore to ask those who are fourteen years of age, and over, to face up to this important question.

It really demands very serious thought about religion, and religion is a way of living. It is your way of living towards God and towards your neighbour. The choice you make **now** is a very vital one, for you must choose between two ways of life—between life for God and life for self. If you choose the former you will find you have chosen the harder way, and a way that needs a constant effort of will to put your choice into practice. Your Church knows the difficulties of choosing the unselfish way, and after your Confirmation admits you to Holy Communion by which you will obtain greater strength and courage for the difficult task which faces you.

The twelve weeks' preparation for Confirmation must be a special time of thought and earnestness of will. You must come to a definite decision about God, and Jesus Christ, and the meaning and purpose of life.

I earnestly ask you to carefully think about this important question of Confirmation, praying that the Holy Spirit will guide you in your choice. No one else can really make the decision but yourself. Whilst parents and friends may (and I hope, will) advise you in this matter, the desire for Confirmation must come from **YOU**, if it is to be of any value in your life.

The Archbishop desires that all candidates for Confirmation should be not less than fourteen years of age, but if you will attain your fourteenth year before October 31st (the day of the Confirmation Service) you will be eligible for preparation. It is necessary that you should be able to say when and where you were baptised. It would be a help if you can obtain this information before you come to the classes.

If you decide to attend the preparation classes—as I hope you will—it is most essential that you should attend **REGULARLY**.

I hope to commence classes during the first week in August. You will hear the exact date given in the notices in church. If you wish to attend the Confirmation classes please give your name and address to Mr. Pattison, or to me, before the thirty-first of July.

May God the Holy Spirit especially guide you in this important decision.
