In the evening, a challenging message of personal consecration was given by the Rev. A. H. Funnell Rector of St. Andrew's, Summer Hill. The Rector was taken ill early in the afternoon and regretted that he could not attend. Mr. Grant and Mr. G. Bloomfield took the service on behalf of the Rector.

HOW TO COMMIT SPIRITUAL SUICIDE

This may seem a strange subject for a Church paper but every day of the week thousands somewhere in the world take their own life, because they have lost hope. For them, life no longer holds any attraction, they feel it is a failure.

Actually, life is still attractive and holds much for those who learn its secret, but they are like a child who has been given an expensive mechanical toy. They do not understand it; they play around with it for a time and when they fail to get it working, blame the toy, not themselves, and smash it up. If only they had appealed to someone with more understanding to explain what to do and then had done as they were told, they would have enjoyed their possession, but pride prevented them asking anyone for advice. Pride is often the basic cause for discontent in this life, people hate to be thought ignorant.

There are millions of professing Christians like the child with the toy. They have such a limited knowledge of spiritual things that they hardly know what to believe. They were brought up in homes where religion was very formal; they went to Sunday Schools where the teachers had a limited knowledge and seemed to lack the desire to increase their knowledge of God. Their parents and their teachers did not often worship God in the public services of the Church and so the children grew up in the same apathetic way.

Then when life's problems hit them hard, as they do at times, they were overwhelmed. They felt, metaphorically speaking, they did not have a leg to stand on. Just at the age when they should have been growing in knowledge and the grace of God, they "gave up the Church".

There are many ways of committing physical suicide as we learn from the daily papers, but to commit spiritual suicide, the easiest way is simply to do nothing about one's soul. Spiritual death is the result of neglecting the three things—Prayer, Bible Reading and Public worship.

The reason why you should do these three things is because they are meant to prepare you for God's presence above. If you despise God's House on earth you would certainly not be happy in the Heavenly Home. If you want to destroy your soul, all you have to do is to neglect the things through which God reveals Himself to man. The result will be certain—Spiritual suicide!



FETE SUCCESS PREDICTED
