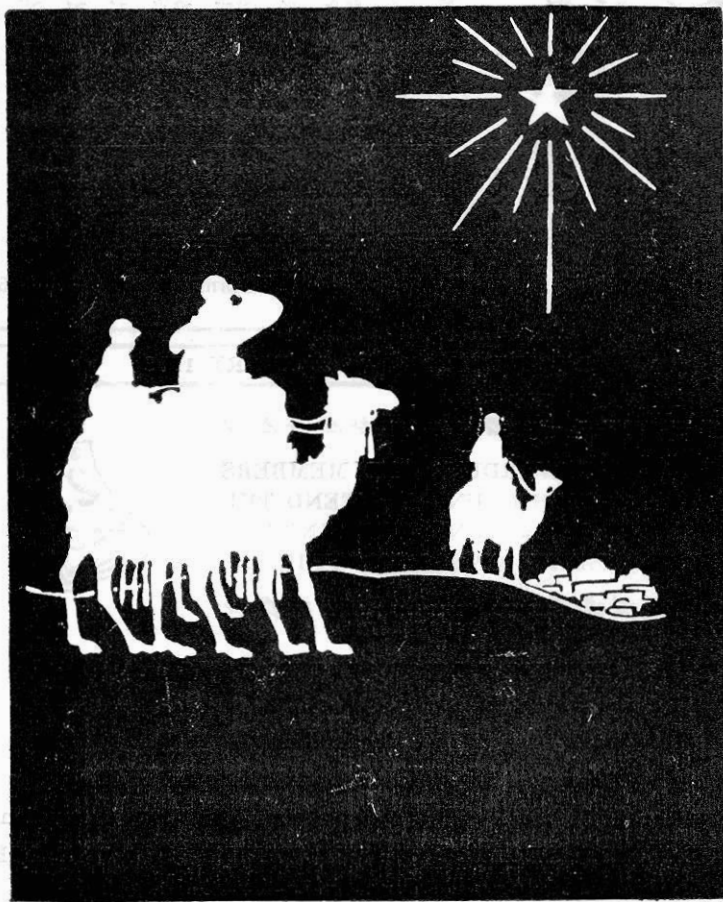

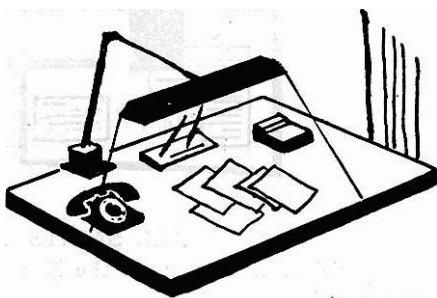


THE MESSAGE OF CHRISTMAS

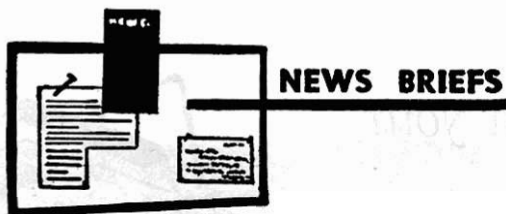

GIVING AROUND THE WORLD

Charitable giving in the United States in 1977 rose to 35.2 billion,
\$16.54 billion (47 per cent of it)—the biggest chunk—went to religion
according to *Giving USA*, a publication of the American Fund-Raising
Council. Next came Health and Hospitals (\$4.7 billion) and Education
(\$4.66 billion).

In Britain, Church authorities have begun a drive to increase vol-
untary giving by parishioners. According to a recent report in the
Church Times the average Church Member's weekly contribution was only
about two shillings (the price of a loaf of bread).

Members of the Church of England are being asked to consider giv-
ing a pound for every thousand pounds of annual income, each week.

One novel approach to giving was noted recently by the Rev. T. T.
Halls, rector of St. Phillips Church, McCallums Hill, one of Sydney's old-
est Churches. In the early days of the Parish on the occasion of the
Church anniversary, each Parishioner was invited to give one shilling for
every year of their life.

The response by parishioners was overwhelming. It was calculated
that some members were either two hundred years old—or very generous.

UNEMPLOYMENT CONFERENCE

As a result of a motion passed at the recent meeting of the Diocesan Synod, a special conference will be held in February, 1979 on unemployment. More details will be included in the next Chronicle.

The Conference, which is being organised by the Diocesan Social Issues Committee will relate to four main areas:

- The facts about unemployment in Australia.
- A Christian understanding of work.
- The needs of unemployed people.
- Strategies for helping unemployed people at the local level.

Each Parish in the Diocese is being asked to send representatives and it is hoped that as a result Church people will be better informed about what has become a major social question, and that Parishes will be encouraged to take initiatives to meet the needs of people in their districts who are out of work.

CHRISTMAS ACCORDING TO LUKE

The Birth of Jesus

At that time Emperor Augustus sent out an order for all the citizens of the Empire to register themselves for the census. When this first census took place, Quirinius was the governor of Syria. Everyone, then, went to register himself, each to his own town.

Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee, to Judea, to the town named Bethlehem, where King David was born. Joseph went there because he himself was a descendant of David. He went to register himself with Mary, who was promised in marriage to him. She was pregnant, and while they were in Bethlehem, the time came for her to have her baby. She gave birth to her first son, wrapped him in clothes and laid him in a manger—there was no room for them to stay in the inn.

The Shepherds and the Angels

There were some shepherds in that part of the country who were spending the night in the fields, taking care of their flocks. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone over them. They were terribly afraid, but the angel said to them: "Don't be afraid! For I am here with good news for you, which will bring great joy to all the people. This very night in David's town your Saviour was born—Christ the Lord! This is what will prove it to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloth and lying in a manger."

Suddenly a great army of heaven's angels appeared with the angel, singing praises to God:

Glory to God in the highest heaven!

And peace on earth to men with whom he is pleased!"

When the angels went away from them back into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, that the Lord has told us." So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and saw the baby lying in the manger.

When the shepherds saw him they told them what the angel had said about this child. All who heard it were filled with wonder at what the shepherds told them. Mary remembered all these things, and thought deeply about them. The shepherds went back, singing praises to God for all they had heard and seen; it had been just as the angel had told them.
