THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
27th November, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once more the hurrying months have brought us to the Advent Season. We are to prepare our hearts again for the Christmas message, and remember with glad thanksgiving that epoch-making event of nearly two thousand years ago, when God revealed Himself in a new and unique way by coming to this earth in the person of our Lord Jesus Christ. While the Advent season should gladden our hearts with the glorious message of what God has wrought in Christ, thus setting in motion those forces which must ultimately lead to the complete sovereignty of Christ in every realm of human life; at the same time Advent brings home to our hearts the consciousness of our own slackness and indifference. How little we have done to prepare the way of the Lord; how frequently our selfishness and cowardice have hindered the progress of God's Kingdom. Hence the timely challenge of the first Sunday in Advent, with its insistent call to **Awake** out of carelessness and out of the indifference which makes the religion of many people so ineffective. We have lived so long upon the collective experiences and traditions of the past that in many cases we seem to have forgotten what first-hand experience is. We have, within easy access, churches built by our ancestors, and we are lulled to sleep by the triumphs of saints and martyrs, till we imagine that there is some virtue and power we can claim without the **effort** to win it. That is why the urgency of the Advent call is so real in these anxious, unsettled days, summoning us back to the source of our strength and telling us that nothing can come to us from the past that does not face us with the necessity of making it our own by a solemn re-dedication of our lives to Christ.

We would remind you that the words printed at the head of this letter are as true to-day as the day they were uttered. We are approaching the joyous season of Christmas, when we shall meditate thankfully upon all that Christmas means to the world. It stands for the birth of Divine life in human conditions, the light of heaven breaking through the darkness of earth, the possibility of real contact with God, not only in our exalted moments, but in the difficult business of everyday life. Unfortunately, there will be many who will celebrate Christmas with little or no thought of the central Figure of the Festival. It surely must be obvious that there can be no **real** Christmas without Christ.

"Because there was no room for them in the inn," wrote Saint Luke, the first Christian historian. How is it with you and me? A. M. Buckton concludes a very beautiful nativity play, called "Eager-heart," with these words:

"Say, gentle listener, at this Christmastide,
Is **your** hearth ready? Are **your** doors flung wide?
Hath He come in, with you to make His stay,
Or hath He passed already on His way?
Nay, let us enter in, before we part
And pray together here with Eager Heart,
That never, O Thou Son of man, may we
Weary of search, or miss the sight of Thee
In every human form, and human dress
The homeless Child of Peace and Righteousness."

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Advent and Christmastide.—The times of the services arranged for Advent and Christmastide will be found elsewhere in this issue. We draw your attention to the time of the **second Celebration on Christmas Day**, i.e., 8.15 a.m. (**not eight o'clock**), and we ask you to note that Matins that morning will commence at 10.30 a.m. (**not eleven**).

There will be no Evening Service on Christmas Day. We shall have the usual Watchnight Service on New Year's Eve, commencing at 11.15 p.m., followed by a Celebration of Holy Communion.

"The Messiah."—In the City of Dublin, on the 13th of April, 1742, Mr. Handel's new oratorio, "The Messiah," was performed under the direction of the composer. The work (which took Handel only 24 days to write), is now regarded as one of the greatest of all choral compositions. It is difficult to conceive a musical work more worthy of the story of the life of our Saviour on earth, and I have no doubt that somewhere, for the past 200 years, in a Christian Church all, or some part, of this masterpiece has been performed at the Christmas season. There is no more worthy paean of praise that a Church choir could offer than to perform some parts of this work each year. The technical difficulties to be overcome in learning to sing this music are enormous; but with perseverance they can be mastered. The choir of All Saints' has been very busy during the past few months preparing parts of this work for performance in the church on Sunday, December 19, at 7.15 p.m. First rate soloists have been engaged, and it is hoped that you will all do your part in this great act of devotion by being present yourselves, and telling as many of your friends as possible of the performance, so that together we may again offer to God our thanks and praise for the gift of His dear Son, our Redeemer and Saviour—ROWLAND EAGAR, Organist and Choirmaster.

Advent and Missions.—The Chairman of the Australian Board of Missions writes:—"Wherever you look in the South-West Pacific to-day the missionary vision is expanding fast, and the Home Church is expected to become missionary-minded to a degree never before thought of.
