THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
27th March, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints',

This letter will come to you some time during Holy Week. As we draw near once again to the Commemoration of the Great Sacrifice, I do most earnestly ask that, so far as it is possible, you will endeavour to keep the few days preceding Good Friday free from social engagements, in order that you may be able to come together for prayer and meditation.

It must be very puzzling for Christians from other lands ("foreigners," I suppose some would call them!) who come to Sydney and observe the manner in which thousands of its citizens keep Good Friday. Some years ago one such did come, and what he saw so amazed him that he wrote to one of our daily papers. This is part of what he said: "I came to this mighty continent with full confidence that it was a Christian country, and that Christianity had a strong hold on the people. Indifference towards such a solemn occasion as Good Friday gives a great shock to one who was once a heathen, but is now a Christian believer, visiting his fellow-Christians in another country. It appears to him to be a mockery of a noble religion to make the anniversary of the death of its Founder a day of pleasure."

Naturally enough, this man expected to find definite proofs of the faith we profess, but we failed him. We must go on reminding people that there is **one reason**, and **one reason only**, why they get a holiday on Good Friday—because our Lord died for us on that day.

The Cross arose out of a real human situation. It was set up by real human hands, from real human motives, out of an evil determination to rid the earth of this disturbing Jesus. Nevertheless, Jesus went to the Cross quite deliberately, always the Victor, never the Victim, and He did

so for the same reason as in the first place He left the carpenter's shop and went out to preach, to teach, and to heal—that He might win men to God by **showing to them** how wholly worthy of their trust and devotion God eternally is. On the Cross, against the dark background of men's sin, Jesus was able to live out the love of God in such vivid colours that, ever since, men have been unable to mistake it or escape it.

Your Church makes ample provision for all who desire to spend Good Friday quietly and thoughtfully in a corporate act of penitence and thankfulness. I wonder what your own personal response will be to the opportunities afforded? His Grace the Archbishop asks our co-operation in the Procession of Witness being arranged for the afternoon of Good Friday, and to which reference is made elsewhere in this issue.

The best preparation for our Easter Communion is a thoughtful observance of Holy Week and Good Friday, so that we may really enter into fellowship with our Risen Lord, and know something of the power of His Resurrection.

There is no need to enumerate the services for Holy Week, which were recorded in the March "Chronicle," but if you have not kept your copy, a re-print of those services is obtainable.

I would just remind you that the celebrations on Easter Day are at seven o'clock, at a quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service.



Gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival will be most acceptable, and should be left at the Church on Saturday morning, the 8th April.

Mr. Gardner joins me in wishing you all a Holy, Happy Eastertide.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

The Choir.—Stainer's "Crucifixion" will be sung on Good Friday at 8 p.m., when the soloists will be **Mr. Raymond Beatty** (bass) and **Mr. Lance Jeffree** (tenor). The Choirmaster will be pleased to hear of any who may wish to join the Choir. Parents of boys aged from nine to eleven are advised that vacancies exist, and that such boys will be required to attend only on Sunday mornings for rehearsal and service, and not the evening practice and service, if their parents so desire.

Easter Vestry Meeting.—The Annual Vestry Meeting will be held on Wednesday, April 26th, at 8 p.m. We trust we may see a representative attendance at this important meeting.

Women's Guild.—The Annual Meeting of the Guild was held on Thursday, 23rd March. Owing to the wet, boisterous weather, the meeting was not as largely attended as usual. The Rector presided. Both the Secretary's and Treasurer's Statements showed a year of progress, and 1938-39 was a time of good fellowship and happiness amongst all Guild members. The Treasurer's Statement showed that £100 had been collected in various ways by the Guild during the year.

It was with regret that Mrs. J. Gray, owing to ill-health, had to resign from the position of Secretary, which position she had held for the past five years. Miss Adams voiced the wishes of the meeting by saying that it was hoped that Mrs. Gray would still be connected with the Guild, as her work was valued. Mrs. Gray has consented to act as one of the Vice-Presidents. Mrs. Reilly was unanimously elected to the position of Secretary. All other office-bearers were re-elected.

The Chairman welcomed Mrs. Hacking (formerly of the Parish of St. Andrew, Lismore), who, by reason of her experience in Church work, will be a valued member of our Guild.

After discussion regarding the syllabus for 1939, and various diocesan and parochial matters, the meeting closed with the Benediction.

On Monday, March 27, Miss Jean Arnot, of the staff of the Public Library, was the guest speaker. She chose as her subject "The Library Movement," and gave us a most comprehensive and interesting talk on libraries in other lands, together with a vivid insight into the many and varied activities of the Public Library in Sydney. It was voted a talk quite "out of the ordinary," and we are very grateful to Miss Arnot.

Y.P.U.—On Sunday, 19th March, the Society's banner was dedicated by the Rector at the evening service. The Missionary Evening, to be held somewhere near the end of May or beginning of June, is in aid of the C.M.S. Annual Medical Appeal for Missions.

District Visitors.—At the conclusion of another financial year the splendid work of this loyal band of Church women deserves special mention. During the year ending 31st March, 1939, they have collected £226/15/7 for the General Fund, and £47/13/- for the Curate Fund, making a total of £274/8/7. (A further £12/13/- for the latter fund was secured from evenings organised by Miss Adams, assisted by members of the Women's Guild and the Girls' Club.) Even more valuable than the financial side of their work—useful as that undoubtedly is—is the service rendered by our Visitors (who

are not merely "collectors") in keeping in touch with people, welcoming newcomers to the Parish, reporting cases of illness or trouble (of which the clergy might not be cognisant), and generally rendering a service which can never be evaluated in terms of £ s. d.

Mrs. Brennan has resigned on account of indifferent health, but we are pleased to be able to report that Mrs. W. W. Browne has sufficiently recovered to resume portion of her district, and Mrs. Reilly has kindly consented to undertake the balance. Now that the cooler weather has come, Miss Ockwell feels able to continue her district, so that our staff of Visitors is now complete.

Mr. Wm. Davis, of the Sydney Industrial Blind Institution, was the guest speaker at the second March meeting. Mr. Davis dealt with the social work in which he is engaged among the blind of the State, helping out his general theme with many personal and witty anecdotes. The speaker also touched on his experiences in England, where he gained his teacher's diploma. Not only because of the unique nature of the subject, but also because of the personality of the speaker, the talk was generally voted among the best yet given to the Institute members.

Members and friends of the Institute are reminded of the Bridge and Dance Evening, to take place in the Parish Hall on Saturday, April 15. The proceeds are in aid of the Parish Hall Fund, and it is hoped that the function will receive generous support. Parish Hall Fund, 1939.—The boxes, which we again propose using in lieu of a fete, are now available, and we are relying on the co-operation of all parishioners in this effort for our Parish Hall Fund. Anzac-tide, 1939.—On Anzac Day, which is also St. Mark's Day, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. at All Saints'.

On Sunday, April 23, a Service of Commemoration (conducted by the Ministers' Fraternal) will be held at the Petersham Oval at 3 p.m. The address will be given by the Rev. F. H. Meyer, Th.L., Rector of St. Augustine's, Stanmore. A very cordial invitation to all our people is extended by the R.S.S.I.L.A., Petersham-Marrickville Sub-Branch, to join with them in this annual Anzac Service.

Good Friday Procession of Witness.—His Grace the Archbishop writes: "I am sure we all desire that our **Good Friday Witness** this year will be an effective protest against the commercialising of this day, sacred throughout the ages as commemorating the atoning sacrifice of the Redeemer of the world."

We rely on All Saints' people to do their part in co-operating in this Act of Witness. It has been so arranged that it will be possible for you to attend your Parish Church services, which no doubt you will desire to do.

The arrangements are similar to those of previous years. We shall assemble in the Domain, at the rear of Sydney Hospital, in ample time to be in our places and move off at 4.30 p.m. The Procession is expected to reach the Cathedral at about 5 p.m., where a brief service will be held. Parishes will be grouped according to their Rural Deaneries. All Saints' is in the Rural Deanery of "Petersham."

An appeal is made for motor cars in which to convey the more elderly people, who would find the march too fatiguing. Will any car owner who would be willing to help please communicate with the Rector **immediately?**

Proposed Chapel for R.P.A.H.—The Archbishop draws attention to the proposed new Chapel for the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, and suggests that we might subscribe to this worthy object "as a practical expression of our thanksgiving to God for recent bounteous rains." If you have not the opportunity of helping with the retiring offertory, the Rector will be pleased to accept donations and to forward them to the Archbishop. His Grace writes as follows:—

"May I make a short reference here to the proposal of the Royal Prince Alfred Hospital Board for the erection of a more suitable Chapel within the precincts? Two designs have been submitted for public consideration,

and I trust that the appeal for whichever is chosen may receive a generous response. Such a building has immense possibilities for good. It will serve not only the staff and convalescent patients who are able to attend, but will provide a sanctuary for anxious and bereaved relations in the hour of their trouble and grief. It will be used by all denominations."
