OUR PRESIDENT WRITES

What a wonderful God we serve. A God who is Father and Lord, who is the creator and sustainer of life and has created all of our world and yet knows us individually as if there were only one to know.

We serve a God who has given us life and through His son has given us Life Eternal. He has given us a life to enjoy each other and especially to enjoy Him and all the gifts He has for us.

There is sometimes much debate in the Christian Church (and this debate has been around for quite a number of years) as to the gifts and fruits of the Spirit, which are available to all believers. If you are a reader of Selwyn Hughes' devotional help Everyday With Jesus, you will be following his writings on "The Harvest of the Spirit". The title of this study alone gives us an insight into some of the studies. Up till now (at the time of writing) we have looked at Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness and Goodness. Selwyn Hughes has brought out to us the many aspects of each of these fruits that we are to bear within ourselves as children of our God. When we, as believers, demonstrate these fruits, our not-yet-Christian friends, family and neighbours will see that God truly has done a wonderful work in our lives. Selwyn Hughes writes: "When the Holy Spirit is allowed to have His way in the life of a Christian, it is inevitable that they will want to live more righteously, be more godly. Imagine the impact in society if all Christians were to demonstrate in their daily relationships the nine qualities of the fruits of the Spirit. It might not in itself produce revival, but it would most certainly give the world a clear picture of what it means to be a Christian. We would not need to pray for a revival, because the wonderful signs of revival would already be apparent."

As I meet and join with the women of Australian Church Women I am constantly blessed and encouraged by the wonderful sharing of faith and witness that is very apparent in your lives. May you know and experience the constant love and fellowship of God's spirit as it is harvested in and through your lives in your area of ministry for Him.

October is a great month for sharing with other believers in ACWC gatherings and for joining together in World Community Day services. I am looking forward this year to sharing with Launceston (Tasmania) and Dee Why (Sydney) members as we celebrate the wonderful work of ACW.

ASIAN CHURCH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE (ACWC)

Pat Walker our Representative to ACWC writes in her Report on 2004. "This year I have been trying to encourage Australian Women to join more fully with our Asian sisters through ACWC. Subscriptions to ACWC Newsletter have increased, but it would be good if **each women's group** could get a copy of the newsletter to hand it around among their members.

Since the "War on Terror", persecution of Asian Christians has increased. There has been violence in Indonesia and in many other Asian countries. Would we be brave enough to acknowledge Christ in these places?

Many countries have been ravaged by floods, typhoons and by diseases and have needed our prayers. But ACWC still continues to provide scholarships and projects for the betterment of women, to help them take a more equal place in their churches and to help provide a livelihood for the poor.

Much of the money to do the work of ACWC comes from the Signature Campaign, from Annual Affiliation fees and from donations. We have collected signatures in each state to combine with the annual collections from World

Community Day, so these collections should be sent to ACWC Treasurer as Signature Campaign.

This year we were privileged to meet together in Myanmar for the Executive and General meetings. These meetings forge deep friendships between us as Christians and as women.

Don't forget that in the new year (2005) you will be asked to nominate delegates for the 2006 ACWC Assembly. You will need a new Australian Representative and three other delegates. Bear in mind that **one of the four should be either indigenous or under 40.** " (A challenge for ACW. Ed.)

President Coralie Wright sent National Executive her report of attendance at the National Council of Churches of Australia (NCCA) Forum held in July. Coralie was privileged to attend, representing ACW as an Observer throughout the Forum. She writes " This five day gathering of delegates of the 15 participating Church bodies and a number of Observer groups was held at Lincoln College, Adelaide.

Visitors included the General Secretary of the World Council of Churches (WCC), leaders of Councils of Churches from the Pacific, Asia, New Zealand and other Australian churches as Observers, who all addressed the Forum. A highlight was Sunday Evening Evensong at St. Peter's Cathedral with the formalisation of the Covenant of Commitment by 15 heads of churches, which had been signed on the Sunday afternoon during the Forum.

One of the overseas visitors was the General Secretary of the Pacific Conference of Churches based in Fiji. This Tongan woman, the Rev. Valamotu Pala was a most interesting person to talk with. Vala is also the International President of the Fellowship of the Least Coin. She was very interested to hear about ACW and in particular our National Conference in 2005."

Coralie's report gave a good overview of many of the reports presented to the Forum. In particular, one of the recommendations took my attention. I quote:- "Decade to Overcome Violence. (DOV) 1. The Forum urges member Churches to engage in active peacemaking, sharing with the DOV Working Group initiatives undertaken:-

2. That Forum members commit themselves and take every opportunity to ensure their Churches are committed to cultivating a CULTURE OF PEACE.

3. That the Forum encourages the Executive to continue the position of DOV Coordinator from January 2005 for up to 3 years, subject to funding availability."

SPECIAL DAYS

By the time you read this, both our Special Days for 2004 will be over. Fellowship Day service, written by the New South Wales Unit on the theme 'My Peace I Give to You' was a lovely service. I particularly liked the final blessing : May God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through.
