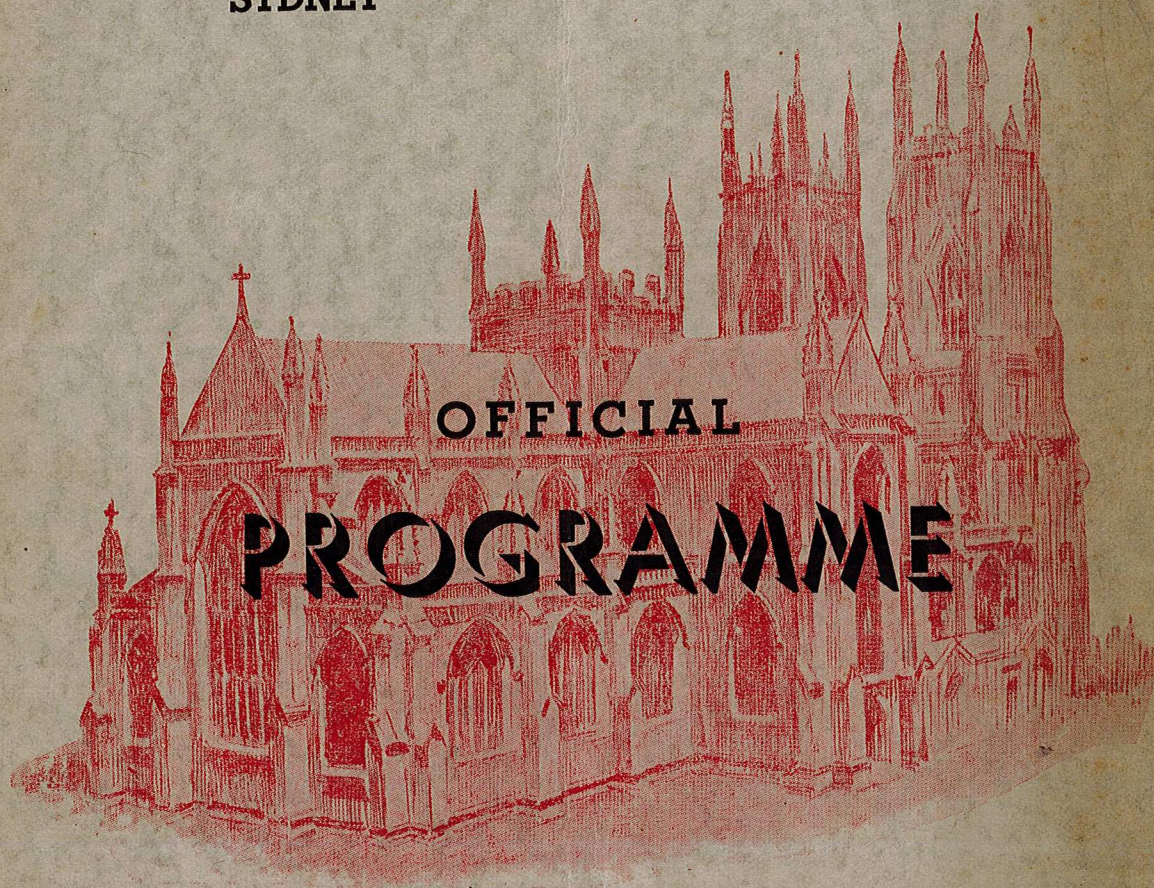

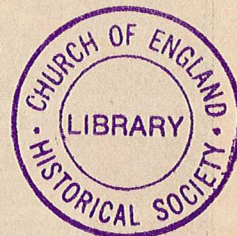

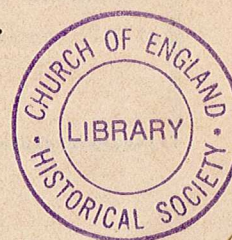

Sunday, May 16

The actual Centenary Day falls on Wednesday, May 16. It will be a great day in the Cathedral. The Archbishop of Melbourne has accepted the invitation to be the preacher. In the afternoon there will be a service of a very special character. It will be one of commemoration of all those to whom memorials have been raised in the Cathedral or who have laboured during these hundred years in connection with it. On the list of such persons are many names of outstanding men who have occupied high office in Church and State and served faithfully in their day and generation. A list of the memorials will be published, and it will bring before the present generation an inspiring company of great men who helped to make Australian history.

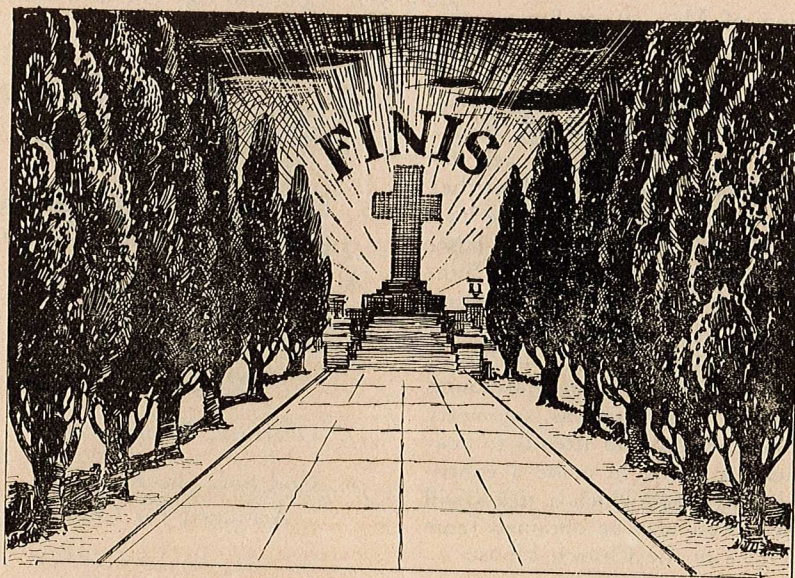

THE CORONATION LECTURE

TUESDAY, MAY 18, at 3 p.m. — Doors open at 2.15 p.m.

By Archdeacon S. M. Johnstone, M.A., Fellow of the Royal Historical Society, England; Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries, Scotland.

The main purpose of the Lecture is to show, with short comments, the portraits in color of the Kings and Queens of England.

It was originally intended that the scope of the Lecture should be limited to the Monarchs of England from the time of the Norman Conquest onward. It has been decided, however, to include several of the Kings of England before that date. The portraits of these will be mostly in black and white, and are derived from drawings in a History of the Kings of England, published in the reign of King James I. (1603-1625) and from reproductions of coins in the British Museum, unless otherwise stated in brackets.

Monarchs of England from the Norman Conquest:

Here we shall see the Conqueror who won the battle of Hastings, and William Rufus who

was slain in the New Forest; Henry II., who was the first of the Plantagenets, and in whose reign Thomas a'Becket was slain; Richard Coeur de Lion and his unworthy brother King John; Henry III., who built Westminster Abbey, and Edward I., who took the Coronation Stone from Scotland; Edward III., who founded the Order of the Garter; Henry V., who, as Prince of Wales, was committed to prison for insulting one of his father's Justices, and Henry VI., the founder of Eton College; Henry VII., the first of the Tudors, and Edward VI., the founder of many Grammar Schools. Mary I., in whose reign Archbishop Cranmer and Bishops Latimer, Ridley, Hooper and Ferrar suffered martyrdom, and Elizabeth, whose navy defeated Spain's "Invincible" Armada; James I., in whose reign the authorised version of the English Bible was published, and Charles I., who was beheaded; William III., in whose reign came the famous siege and relief of "Derry," and George III., in whose reign Australia was colonised; Victoria the Good, Edward the Peacemaker and George the Beloved, will all be seen, and many other kings beside.

**The installation of the new organ in St. Andrew's Cathedral, and rebuilding of the
Organ in Christ Church Cathedral, Newcastle, was executed,

NEW VENTURES.

One hundred years seems a lengthy period in the life of a Society. While we are being reminiscent we may remember that the New South Wales Auxiliary of the Bible Society was commenced in Sydney in 1817, at a gathering presided over by Governor Macquarie. Dean Cowper in his "Autobiography" speaks of his father, William Cowper, "I have never forgotten the joyous spirit in which he came home from the public meeting at which the Bible Society was inaugurated. He seemed as glad as though he had found a great treasure." William Cowper was appointed to the office of secretary. The Rev. Samuel Marsden was there also, and he had the honour of giving an address at the meeting.

The feeling of affection for the Society has been a factor in the growth of the work, not only in New South Wales, but throughout the

Commonwealth. Decision was made recently to reach across the sea to Oceania, and a colporteur named John Soloman has been appointed to work in Fiji among the native people. We want our friends in New South Wales to take an interest in the Bible Society "Packman," and to contribute toward his support.

Further, the Commonwealth Council has undertaken the support of six colporteurs in Japan. The sum of £70 is needed to finance one colporteur in Japan, but in New South Wales we should like to be responsible for two. The Bible Society asks friends and supporters, because of their love for Christ, and because of their affection for the Society, to help in this advance.

The General Secretary, at the Bible House, will be pleased to hear from friends with regard to these new ventures.

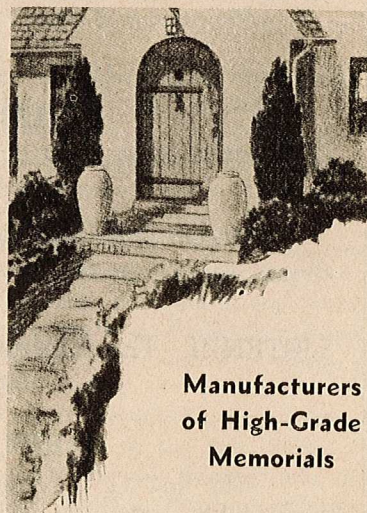

HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

"Some Features of the Past."

In 1830 and soon after the arrival of Archdeacon William Grant Broughton a Society known as "The Sydney Diocesan Society" was established to represent in Australia the "Society for the Promotion of the Christian Knowledge" and the "Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts." This Australian Society did splendid work for the Church by aiding in the erection of Churches, establishing Day Schools, assisting Clergymen in various ways and in the circulation of the Scriptures. In 1856 it was dissolved and a provincial Committee consisting of Bishop Barker, Archdeacon Cowper, Canon Allwood, Sir William Denison (Governor), Mr. Justice Dickinson, John Campbell, Esq., and J. P. McKenzie, Esq., was appointed to frame rules for a new Society to be called "The Church Society for the Diocese of Sydney." It took no less than seven meetings to complete the task of the Provisional Committee, and on the 20th May, 1856, a public meeting of members of the Church of England was held in St. James' Schoolroom, Castlereagh Street, at which Bishop Barker presided and Sir William Denison, the Governor, moved the first resolution. Archdeacon Cowper, Canon Allwood and

others also addressed the meeting. The report of the Provisional Committee was adopted, and the Church Society for the Diocese of Sydney was formed, with Sir William Denison as Patron and Canon Allwood and the Rev. Edward Synge hon. clerical secretaries. The month of May this year will therefore mark the 81st anniversary of the Society.

The first grant given was to the parish of Yass and consisted of £50 for purchase of land for erecting the church.

At the first Annual Meeting of the Society, held on 6th May, 1857, the report was submitted by Canon Allwood, and it was seen that great progress had been made. The number of subscribers had reached nearly 5,000, and there were 44 branch associations. Both town and country were interested and associations were formed in such places as Bathurst, Canberra, Orange, Bombala, Braidwood, and other well-known country centres. In the city large support was given from St. James', St. Philip's and St. John's, Parramatta.

In 1860, because of the withdrawal of Government aid to chaplains in the gold fields, a fund was inaugurated by the Society, and in twelve months £842 was subscribed. Later the fund was merged in the general fund of the Society.

In 1862 the Church Society united with the Diocese of Victoria in the establishment of an

Aborigines Mission at Yelta on the Murray River, and continued to support work amongst aborigines in various parts until 1896.

A Church Endowment Fund was originated in 1860 and in 1880 to commemorate in a practical way the 20th year of Bishop Barker's Episcopate, there was inaugurated the Church Buildings Loan Fund.

The passing of the Act for the withdrawal of State aid from the several parishes of the Diocese upon the decease of the then incumbents, caused a severe strain on the funds of the Society. But the difficult times found the Society pushing forward under the leadership of Bishop Barker, supported by a strong committee, which included the Governor and men in high commercial and professional positions. They deemed it a great honour to assist in any way in sending living agents to proclaim the Gospel Message and charged to administer the Ordinances of the Church.

At the first Synod of the Diocese convened on 5th December, 1866, the following resolution was adopted: "That this Synod, recognising the great benefits that have been conferred on the Diocese by means of the Church Society, adopts it as its agent for the promotion of the great objects for which it was instituted."

Ten years prior to this, in October, 1856, the Society engaged rooms at 152 George Street, known as "Lyons Buildings," and on 4th January, 1858, the Society removed to the building in Phillip Street known as St. James' Grammar School. This was the headquarters of the Society until 1885, when the offices were

removed to the new Chapter House, which had been built to the memory of Bishop Barker. The work was administered here until the new offices were taken, in more recent times, in the Diocesan Church House.

In the Jubilee Year of the Society the organization known as the "Mission Zone Fund" was begun and worked by a sub-committee of the Society. The Rev. R. B. S. Hammond (now Canon Hammond) was the organiser for a considerable time and, as is known, did remarkably good work. In 1911 The Ladies' Home Mission Union was formed and has proved a real strength in our tasks.

In 1917 through the action of Synod the Society became known as the Home Mission Society.

In making this short review of the past, we might well think of the Society as "the Church in Action," for its witness has been the means of enlarging and building up God's Kingdom in our midst.

The Society appeals for the help of all Churchpeople. Its present commitments are heavy. It supports Living Agents in the Church in city and country; helps with Church Buildings; supplements pensions; has a Church at Happy Valley Unemployed Camp; supports Chaplain at Children's Court; maintains a Missioner and launch on the Hawkesbury River, and in other ways carries forward the work of the Church.

The Council of the Society is looking forward to a successful gathering in connection with the 81st Anniversary on Tuesday, May 18th.

This will be held in the Town Hall on the evenings of May 20, 21 and 22, and (for children) on the afternoon of May 22. It has been specially written by Bishop Pilcher. The pageant last year represented scenes in the early history of the Church in England and in Australia. The present pageant will take a more general view. Stirring scenes in the Apostolic Age, and in the centuries immediately following will be presented by a cast of about 700 performers drawn from many of our city and suburban parishes. The arrangements are in the hands of Mrs. Mowll, assisted by a strong pageant committee.

Mrs. Baily, who was Mistress of the pageant for the Broughton Centenary, will fill the same office on this occasion also. The theme of the pageant will carry us up to the foundation of the Church in the British Islands—the point from which we began last year. In view of the fact that the St. John Ambulance Association is now commemorating the jubilee of its foundation in Australia, and in view also of its close historic association with the Church of England, one scene in the pageant will present an aspect of the history and work of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. Then because we are celebrating the Centenary of the Cathedral, a scene towards the end will show us Sir Richard Bourke laying the foundation stone 100 years ago. In all we shall have a happy combination of the beauty of form, colour and motion, the beauty of music and, above all, the beauty of devotion, heroism and service inspired by the Christian faith and expressed in its history. The greatest pains have been taken to ensure historic accuracy and histrionic attractiveness.

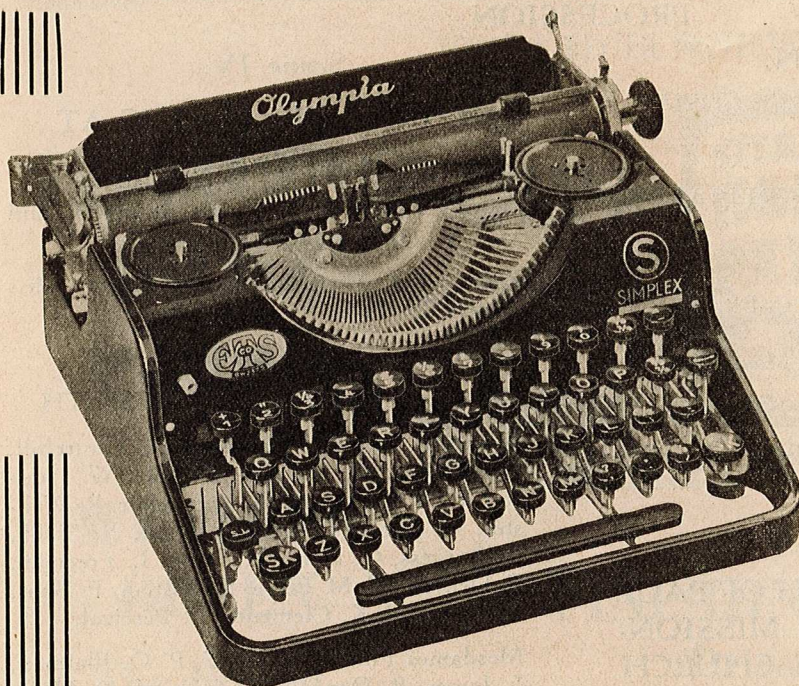
