THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th September, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once again we are looking forward to our Confirmation Service. The parents and friends of the candidates will, of course, wish to be present at the Service on Sunday morning, October 27, at eleven o'clock, when His Grace The Archbishop will administer the Sacred Rite of Confirmation. Where it is possible, I would like the Godparents of the candidates invited also, so that they may witness their Godchildren assuming the responsibilities which their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. If the Godparents are unable to be present, they would, I feel sure, like to know the date and hour of the Service, so that they may remember their Godchildren and the other candidates in prayer at the actual time of the Confirmation Service.

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the eight o'clock Celebration on Sunday, November 3rd, which will be our Patronal Festival, as it falls within the Octave of All Saints' Day. On that Sunday morning they are invited to attend the Communion Breakfast which is a fellowship meal arranged to welcome them into full membership in God's great family—The Church.

Parents! These young people of yours who will, by their Confirmation shortly be entering into full privileges in their Church, will need all the help and encouragement you can give them. They have to go out and bear their witness in a world where there is a tremendous lot of indifference, and even hostility, to spiritual values. The image of gold is set up in shops, offices and factories, and if they refuse to bend before it, things can be made very hot for them; the lash of sarcastic tongues will burn them as a fire. Anyone can go with the crowd, but it takes real character to march in a procession of **one**. These young people will require every ounce of moral courage they can obtain. They know they cannot be true to their vows and uphold their standard of life in their own strength; and you can help them by encouraging them to be regular in their Church attendance, particularly in making their Communion, and you'll help them best by **coming with them**.

We shall endeavour to make our Patronal Festival—November 3rd—a Reunion of all those confirmed here during my incumbency of All Saints'. I want each one whom this invitation concerns to keep the Festival as a Day of Special Remembrance and Fellowship—remembrance of their own Confirmation, and fellowship with those who, on that day, will be receiving Holy Communion for the first time.

After more than eight and a half years' faithful and loyal service. Mr. A. B. Kerrigan has been compelled, owing to the pressure of professional work, to relinquish his post as Organist and Choirmaster of this parish. We deeply regret his going, for we realise how much we, as a choir, owe to his careful training and his comprehensive musical knowledge. He has given us not only a real appreciation of English Church music, but he has taught us to sing it, and has ever kept before us a high standard, together with the ideal of making **all** choir-work an Act of Worship. Mr. Kerrigan takes with him the best wishes of both choir and congregation. We take this opportunity of congratulating him upon his appointment as Chancellor of the Diocese of Newcastle, in succession to the late Sir John Peden. Mr. W. Rowland Eagar succeeds Mr. Kerrigan, and we extend to him a sincere welcome and trust he will be very happy in his work amongst us.

Our good friend, the late Caroline Jupp, left instructions to her daughter that the sum of ten pounds was to be handed to the Rector for any Church fund he may choose. This is typical of the late Mrs. Jupp who was never

so happy as when she was doing something to help All Saints' Church. We acknowledge receipt of the above amount which we have allotted to our War Memorial Fund, for which an appeal will shortly be made.

The New C.E.N.E.F. Memorial Centre.—The building at 201 Castlereagh Street, which is being rebuilt as the new C.E.N.E.F. Memorial Centre, is a hive of industry. The old building, purchased at a cost of £25,000, is being completely transformed, and it is hoped that by October 24, which will mark the Seventh Anniversary of the commencement of the work of the S.D.C.A. (Sydney Diocesan Churchwomen's Association), the building will be sufficiently advanced for the official opening. On that day in the Sydney Town Hall, their Royal Highnesses, the Governor-General and the Duchess of Gloucester, will declare the Centre open, and the Duchess will receive on the platform of the Town Hall gifts of £250 and upwards from individuals and groups. All the rural deaneries are co-operating to make this day in the Sydney Town Hall a memorable one. To mark the special work of C.E.N.E.F., all countries of the Empire will be represented in costume on the various stalls. It will be a colourful pageant and it is hoped that the gifts brought in, on or before October 24 will enable the new building to be opened free of debt. The total cost is now estimated at £60,000.

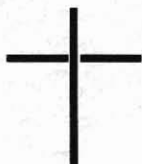
