Thousands flocked to hear him daily and listened with rapt attention to his message. It was the old, old story of God's love to man, revealed in Christ. The Canon applied the message to every phase of human life in plain, simple language. I feel sure that much good will result from his visit to Sydney and that many have been brought into vital touch with Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

We are looking forward with great expectation to the 48th Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints' Church. Special services will be held on Sunday, 19th August. At 8 a.m. there will be Choral Communion. Denman, Rector of St. Clement's, Marrickville. Do make a point of coming to the Services and bring your friends with you. The Services present an opportunity for thanksgiving to God for the ministrations of such a beautiful church as All Saints'. Former parishioners will be heartily welcomed. The festival will be followed by a Tea Meeting and Concert on the following Wednesday evening.

NEWS OF THE RECTOR

Dear Friends at All Saints',

Since my last letter we have not done so much moving about as heretofore. Much as we enjoy "goin' places and seein' things," it is a welcome change to be able to "stay put" for a while and not to have to bother about packing up, disposing of luggage and the reservations for coach journeys, which, for long distances, must be done well ahead, as coach travel in England is very popular.

We have been in Essex again, where I took over the parish of Holy Trinity, Springfield, Diocese of Chelmsford (where I assisted during Holy Week and Easter) whilst the Vicar, the Rev. A. L. Whitehorn, was absent for his summer holiday. We enjoyed being at Trinity, sharing the worship, the fellowship and hospitality of its friendly people. Whilst at the Vicarage, I had an opportunity of seeing the relations of four of our own parishioners and friends in Sydney, who live in Essex; so we have seen quite a lot of that county.

Essex has been called a flat, uninteresting county: it certainly is flat, but it is never uninteresting, for the story of Essex is older than Christianity and there is much that is most engrossing. Leaving out London itself, there are only two other counties so crowded with people as Essex is; its proximity to London has made it so; it comes after Yorkshire and Lancashire, third county in population. There are over a million people in eight Essex towns alone, yet rural Essex remains much as it was, an agricultural county, with shallow seas breaking in where pleasure resorts and pleasant little towns have grown up.

Springfield is really a suburb of Chelmsford, the county town, being but ten minutes' easy walk from the Cathedral Church of St. Mary. Chelmsford Cathedral is a comparatively small one, not much larger than a big parish church. In fact, it was the parish church until 1914, when it became a cathedral. Looking down on the altar is a statue of its

first Bishop, John Watts-Ditchfield, whom some of our senior people will remember, as he visited Australia many years ago, in the interests of the Church of England Men's Society.

Before going to Essex, we had the privilege of staying at Lambeth again, and, while in London, of attending the great service in St. Paul's Cathedral, on Sunday afternoon, June 17, to mark the 250th Anniversary of the S.P.G. (Society for the Propagation of the Gospel) at which Her Majesty The Queen and Princess Margaret were present. (H.M. The King was to have attended, but, at that time, was not permitted by his physicians; we are glad to hear he is better.) It was a wonderful Service. The preacher was The Archbishop of Rupertsland (the Most Rev. L. R. Sherman) in whose inspiring address, from Psalm 20, verse 5, "In the Name of our God we will set up our banners," he aptly likened the work to five arches, each arch representing 50 years of the Society's work: 1. Beginning, 2. Testing, 3. Expansion, 4. Upheaval and 5. Opportunity. The Service concluded with the singing of the Te Deum by the choir, with a fanfare of trumpets woven into the melody, the trumpeters being in the chancel high above the singers.

Next evening was the S.P.G. Rally, in the Albert Hall—a memorable occasion! The Albert Hall is huge: the central seating accommodation is elliptical in shape, not unlike a big circus ring. Rising from this, in a gentle slope, are 12 rows of seats; above these, two tiers of seats something like "boxes" in a theatre and above these again, right at the top, a gallery ("the gods"!). Visualise all these, excepting the last-named, well-filled and you will have some idea of the crowd; one speaker estimated there were 7,000 present! In front of the organ stood a huge Cross, beneath which sat the robed choirs on each side of the Home Bishops. In front of them were large cut-out maps of North and South America, Africa, India, S.E. Asia, the Far East, and Australia. Preceded by flags and a processional Cross, the representatives from these countries entered (in the foregoing order) as the choir sang, and sat "round" their respective countries, making a striking and very effective picture. There were some very good addresses. In my opinion the best missionary appeal was made by the Rev. Basil Manuel, an Indian priest, who described himself as "a fourth-generation Christian." The whole Rally was very thrilling and brought before one most vividly the world-wide character of the Christian Church and of the privilege of belonging to it.

By the time you read this, you will be preparing for our Consecration Festival, on August 19th. I trust you will, with interest and enthusiasm, make it a good one; first by your own attendance, and secondly, by inviting others to come to the Services on that Sunday.

At present I write from the Chaplaincy of the Almitt Hospital, Goring Heath, near Reading, where I am relieving the Chaplain for three weeks. The Chaplaincy is a fine, comfortable house situated in a lovely part of the Thames Valley.

Our time in England is lessening with amazing rapidity! We hope to visit Scotland, and plan to commence this, our final tour, on August 25. All being well, we are to sail by the "Otranto," on September 29 (Michaelmas Day), being due in Sydney on November 5. I shall, therefore, not be home for the Patronal Festival Sunday, but look forward to being with you on the Sunday within its Octave.

It is with great surprise and even greater regret I have received news of Miss Margaret Young's resignation as Warden of The House of The Epiphany. I can only begin to say how sorry I am, and I know All Saints' people will share my regret. Miss Young has done a fine work, she has been a great help to me personally and to the parish generally, so loyally and willingly giving assistance wherever it was needed, but especially in the work in the schools, that it is sad to realise she will not be there

when we return. Words are poor things at times, but, underlying these inadequate ones, there is a very real appreciation of her work, her loyal co-operation and her fellowship, together with an assurance that she takes with her the good wishes of all those parishioners who are privileged to know her.

May God bless you all and prosper all you do for His Kingdom.

CANON CALLS FOR REBIRTH OF SPIRIT

"I don't want all the holy people in Sydney coming just for another wallow," said Canon Bryan Green, Rector of Birmingham, yesterday, when he announced the final meetings of his mission at a lunch-hour address at the Town Hall.

Speaking to an audience mainly of people aged 40 or more, who packed the main hall and overflowed into the basement, the Canon said: "We don't want rows of saints coming to these meetings without bringing some sinners. We don't want the smug churchgoers without the people who do not go to church."

"So do your stuff and bring in some of these others, in particular those young men and women who haven't been coming to church."

Canon Green said that if people really believed in God their attitude had to be one of unconditional surrender to the demands of God. These had to be placed before the good things of life, the family, the State and even the Church.

"In the world as it is now moving, with its struggle between a secular, atheistic, totalitarian society and Christianity, neutrality is becoming impossible," he said.

"We have got to come down on one side. There are far too many people sitting on the fence. They are really dishonest people, because they are living on borrowed capital, on what Christianity has done for them in the past."

The demand of God through Christ did not entail an abdication of living, however.

"We should not avoid politics because we think it is a dirty game," said Canon Green. "Of course it is a dirty game, but it won't be so dirty if we get into it."

"Common Ground"

At a meeting later with Anglican trade-unionists at the Cathedral Chapter House, Canon Green said the trade-union movement was on common ground with the Church in its struggle against the rise of totalitarianism.

"If there is not a spiritual rebirth among the people, we shall see an atheistic, totalitarian, ruthless, secular State evolving, in which the people are crushed. You don't need me to tell you that even trade-unions can be crushed in an atheist secular State.

"Unless we get this rebirth of spiritual values amongst us soon, I do not see much hope for the future."

Later in the evening, Canon Green preached at St. Andrew's. A verger described the attendance as an all-time record. The Cathedral was packed, with people sitting on the floor of the aisles; the overflow was accommodated in the Chapter House, where the Canon was heard through loud-speakers.

MISSIONER TALKS ON GOD AND MAN

The Rector of Birmingham, Canon Bryan Green, said in Sydney yesterday, that man faced two alternatives—a spiritual rebirth or complete materialism and atheism.

Canon Green, who is conducting a week's mission in Sydney, was addressing a lunch-hour audience of more than 2,000 in the Town Hall.

Canon Green said that to a large degree man did not believe in God, he did not trust his neighbours and neighbouring countries, and, therefore, he was a frustrated creature.

He said many people believed they could manage their lives and their businesses without religion, but the truth of that depended on what people thought their lives and successes were meant to be.

All of man's plans and the new systems he was trying were collapsing on the rock of human nature. It was human nature, in the long run, that mattered, and, unless man was conscious of this, all his plans would fail.

Four Points

Four points to remember were: Man was what God made him; man was what society made him; man was what he made himself; and man could be re-made by the spirit of Christ.

Canon Green said man had a great dignity and had been born with a God-shaped plan in his heart. The personal life of man was not the product of material emotions.

Man, however, was conditioned largely by his struggle for existence and circumstances and modern society undoubtedly influenced him.

Man also had a free will and, to a certain extent, was responsible for shaping his own life. When man was not true to his own nature he became diabolical.

At Overseas Club

Later, addressing the N.S.W. branch of the Overseas Club, Canon Green said that the totalitarian State was gradually and insidiously creeping into the democracies.

When it came it would be a humanitarian form of totalitarianism but there would still be frustration of the truth and real knowledge.

Initiative would be crushed by "little managers," and the only answer was for the Church to get the people to come over to the Christian side of the fence.

If War Came

Canon Green said that if war came within the foreseeable future, Britain would be an immediate target for atomic bombs.

If Britain won the war she would be battered and broken, and would have to rely almost entirely on the United States.

However, Britain might lose the war, and it was a pity more people were not awake to that genuine possibility.

If she did lose the war, she would then become a Communist State—a ghastly tragedy.
