SECRETARY'S REPORT

It is my privilege to present the 85th Annual Report of the Mothers' Union in the Diocese of Sydney.

The Triennial elections this year saw a great number of changes and we welcome new Vice-Presidents, Deaconess Mary Andrews, Margaret Hilliard, Molly Gilchrist, Edna Edgar, Dorothy Bremner and our Senior Vice-President, Rae Mortley, who begins a second term of office.

At the Council meeting in October presentations were made to retiring office bearers. Joyce Hayman completed nine years as Convenor for Social Responsibilities and also handled Publicity for some time. Under her wise and zealous care this department grew to be a very vocal force and we shall always be grateful to Joyce for the tremendous amount of time and effort she gave on our behalf. Mary Horsley who has held many positions and given untiring service over many years retired as Vice-President. In recognition of her valuable work to Mothers' Union in this diocese she has been made a Life Vice-President and we shall continue to look forward to her for wise counsel in the years ahead.

As wives and mothers we are committed to our families and their needs; for this reason we accepted with regret resignations from two new Heads of Departments during the year. Vera Dykes, Convenor for Social Responsibilities found herself deeply involved with her husband's work in the Missions to Seamen, and felt unable to give the necessary time to such an important department. We are still seeking the right person to undertake such vital work, and ask for your prayer support in this matter. Similarly Carol Collis, for family reasons resigned as Head of Hospital Visiting and has been replaced by Jan Berkley. We welcome Jan to this position and extend our sincere thanks to the other ladies for the work carried out while on the Executive Committee.

Margaret Cox was welcomed back to Executive as Head of Overseas and Outreach.

The Australian Commonwealth Council met in Melbourne in October and I was privileged to attend as a Delegate from this diocese with Rae Mortley, Rosemary Davies and Janet Harrison. Lorna Oates and Joyce Bragg attended as Commonwealth representatives. We are delighted to welcome as our new Commonwealth President Margot Sanders, formerly Editor of Mia Mia. Our new Diocesan President Lorna Oates was re-elected to the position of Senior Vice-President of the Commonwealth and Joyce Bragg was elected as Commonwealth Convenor of Social Responsibilities. Sincere congratulations are extended to both these members from our diocese.

To Joyce Allen, who resigned from National Council of Women we offer our sincere thanks for her many years of devoted service as our Delegate. We thank her for her most able reporting to the Mothers' Union Council on many matters of vital concern to our members and wish her well in retirement. A welcome is extended to our new representative on National Council of Women, Ann Coventry.

The Annual Report this year does not contain a letter from our Patron as Lady Cutler has resigned her patronage because her husband's term of office has been completed. Our grateful thanks to Margaret Hilliard must be recorded, for the beautiful piece of petit point she so ably worked as a gift to Lady Cutler from the Mothers' Union in this diocese.

Many of our members participated in the Mothers' Union World Tour, attending the Passion Play at Oberammergau. During the tour, members were able to visit with Link branches, thus strengthening their relationships and forging closer ties of loving concern.

The Wave of Prayer said daily in the office has proved a source of joy as we have had opportunity of sharing with members from New Zealand and United Kingdom. An especially happy occasion was the visit of Jumoke Bako from our Link diocese of Lagos, who shared prayer time with us.

During this year we hosted the Provincial Council meeting and welcomed delegates from the other N.S.W.

dioceses, with the exception of Riverina. It was a profitable time for all concerned and from our discussions came a resolution to hold, within the next couple of years a Provincial Live-in Conference open to all members.

This year saw an overwhelming response to our Day Conference at Mowll Village - over 700 women attending to hear Dr. Clair Isbister. The Holiday Conference later in the year proved very popular also. It is hoped that such functions may become regular features in our programming as we seek to reach out to the women in our community.

A new venture, in the form of an evening meeting for both husbands and wives was held at Eastwood and very well received. The new Director of Anglican Marriage and Family Counselling Centre, Rev. Michael Corbett-Jones and his wife Christine spoke on Marriage Relationships. The success of this meeting encouraged the Executive Committee to plan further evening programmes for the coming years.

It was my privilege in December to attend a luncheon at Bowral, with Olive Beverley, when a presentation of a golden posy was made to Lady Hoskins in recognition of her membership in Mothers' Union for over 60 years; truly a great record.

During this year, while without a Convenor for Social Responsibilities the members of Executive Committee have been alert to the many social issues and acted on your behalf. Submissions have been sent to the appropriate government authorities on Rape Reform, Privacy Bill, Lotto and Pinball parlours. Members have also attended the Women for the Family in Society Conference, seminar on The Child in Conflict and United Nations Disarmament Conference.

This year the Justice Department opened a new court at Cobham and we are very grateful to the ladies at St. Stephen's Penrith for undertaking the full responsibility of maintaining the Tea and Sympathy service.

With the change in the name of H.M.S. Counselling to "Careforce" the Children's Court worker's job has an altered emphasis. This work that members support so well, is now spread over a much wider field as several social

workers now move out to the various decentralized centres, established to meet changing needs. The needs are still the same and are often much more demanding than in the past - it is only the name that has changed.

We were delighted to welcome Mrs. Olwyn Jull, our Commonwealth President to Sydney in May, and thanks to the members at Thornleigh a delightful evening was arranged, so that many members had an opportunity to hear Mrs. Jull speak.

As I complete my first year in this position my thanks go to the members of the Executive for their loving help and encouragement and especially to Lorna Oates for her wise counsel and generous support. To Iris Langshaw my assistant and Minute Secretary, without whose help I would never have accomplished so much, a sincere thank-you.

I would like to thank the many hostesses for their generous help in the office throughout the year and especially to our Office Secretary, Flora Rowe; thank you all.

As we go forward into the new year let us be daily reminded of Mary Sumner's personal prayer:

"All this day, O Lord, let me touch as many lives as possible for thee; and every life I touch, do thou by thy spirit quicken, whether through the word I speak, the prayer I breathe, or the life I live."

We continue to be affiliated with the National Council of Women and receive resource material etc. from the Festival of Light.

We wrote to the A.N.Z. Bank protesting at the advertisements encouraging belief in Astrology as a directing force in life.

As usual we were delighted with the amount of money and the large gifts of food and toys sent to the office for the families of prisoners. We are also grateful to the Rectors who assisted in this by encouraging appeals to be made to the whole parish, not just our own members.

PRAYER DEPARTMENT

The work of the Prayer Department has continued throughout the year with many encouragements. An increasing interest has been evident in the Bible Study Notes and also in the Intercessory Prayer Circle.

Intercessory Prayer Circle: Mrs. Kath Hoare who is in charge of this section of the Department reports a good year. During the year she visited eight branches, which resulted in six new Friends of IPC and many new members with a much greater enthusiasm for the work at branch level. Some \$34 has been paid into H.Q. for postage, and while there has been a loss by death during the year of some eighteen members, we have been able to welcome nineteen new members and six Friends. This is very encouraging. Letters, Prayer Leaflets, etc. have gone out regularly, and many letters of appreciation been received. In addition a telephone link has been maintained with many of the Friends. Thanks are due to those who have assisted in seeing that programmes have run smoothly. Invitations to speak on IPC at branches is always welcomed.

The Lone Members: Under the keen guidance and enthusiastic interest of Mrs. Grace Robson this part of our work has also met with considerable success, although we would be glad to know of others who would like to be joined with us in this fellowship of the Mothers' Union. We believe the effectiveness of the Lone Members' Branch could be greatly

increased if branches aware of members moving into areas where no Mothers' Union branch exists would contact us and help us to establish new Links. We held two special functions for Lone Members during the year, one at the home of Mrs. Robson which proved to be a very happy gathering; and an end-of-year gathering when members were invited to join with St. James' King Street, Sydney, for their Christmas meeting and lunch. This was a tremendous success, and thanks are due to the St. James' branch for including Lone Members in this tremendous occasion.

Bible Study Notes: As already reported, there has been an ever increasing demand from branches and individual members for these, and it was decided by Executive towards the end of the year, that these Studies should be included in book form. This has been done and is in the hands of the printer under the title of "Water from Many Wells". We understand copies will be available for sale by March-April this year. We would commend these to all members as a very worthwhile book of devotional studies; simply expressed, Scripturally based, and dealing with normal, every-day problems in a practical and challenging way. The Studies, Questions and Comments have been produced by Dorothy Hulme-Moir, and will be available, through the Literature Department at a reasonable price. Please support this outreach by the Prayer Department by your interest and your prayers.

PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

1980 was a busy, challenging, and, we trust, profitable year for the Mothers' Union in our diocese. Some of the activities arose out of our conviction that during the year we should pursue two main emphases: (1) consideration of family relationships (2) outreach to the community. Highlights in this regard were: - The Picnic Conference at Mowll Village on May 30, when Dr. Clair Isbister spoke on "The Give and Take of Marriage and its Effect on Children". It was a wonderful day with more than 700 in attendance, nearly all Mothers' Union members, from all parts of the diocese. - An open evening meeting at St. Philip's,

Eastwood, on Saturday November 1, when Michael and Christine Corbett-Jones opened up and explored the topic "Perfecting your Partnership". It was our first attempt at such a meeting and the response was very pleasing.

It is our intention to pursue these emphases further in 1981, giving particular attention to making provision for husbands and other members of the family to share in our activities.

Other special occasions were as follows:

- The Diocesan Festival on March 25 in St. Andrew's Cathedral (attended by over 500)
- An Ideas Day (another first) on March 12
- A 2½ Day Live-in Conference at "Cilbulla" (September 23-25) when we were delighted to have Mrs. Mary Fewchuk to lead our Bible studies.

We have planned a new means of communication to come into operation at the beginning of 1981. This will take the form of a new-look new-style NEWSLETTER to be received by all members three times during the year. In this way members will be regularly "in touch" and receive personal information about Mothers' Union matters. We trust that this will lead to a deepening of interest and a fuller and more meaningful participation and involvement in our activities.
