THE RECTOR'S LETTER

As from All Saints' Rectory, 21st May, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

At the moment of writing this letter I am some hundreds of miles from home; yet the rapid passage of time reminds me that another issue of the parish paper will soon be due, and that "time and tide wait for no man!"

This time last year we were celebrating the cessation of hostilities in Europe, and, a few months later came the end of the Second World War. Yet, we all realise we are very far from real peace, and that in twelve months we have not come very far along the road to that peace, security and freedom for which men fought and died, for which others endured all sorts of privation and hardship, and for which we all hoped


As far back as 1780 Benjamin Franklin wrote: "The rapid progress true science now makes, occasions my regretting sometimes that I was born so soon. It is impossible to imagine the height to which it may be carried in a thousand years, the power of man over matter . . . O that moral science were in a fair way of improvement, that men would cease to be wolves to one another, and that human beings would at length learn what they now improperly call humanity!"

Franklin has been called "the most civilised man of his day," and in considerably less than a thousand years his words have come true—the power of man over matter *has* reached undreamed of heights; but man has changed surprisingly little. Twelve months ago we rejoiced that we had, as we thought, emerged from the Valley of Suffering, but we know very well that we are not out of the Valley yet. There is staggering devastation, dislocation and poverty; and the problems that face us—international, political, economic, moral and spiritual—are tremendous, and they are not nearly solved yet. Men have not ceased to be wolves to one another, and human beings have not learned the true meaning of humanity. Will the experience of the past six years remain simply one of horror and loss, part of a new Dark Age, or will it, in Hosea's words, become "a door of hope"? Progress, you know, is not inevitable; and humanly speaking, the hopeful view seems to me to depend on two things, the re-awakening of hope in the souls of men, and the learning of the moral lessons of our bitter experience. When people were fighting with their backs to the wall, when death rained down upon them, they began to see what *really* mattered. It was not possessions, though their loss was sometimes heart-breaking, it was not leisure and comfort, but life itself and freedom and standing together in unselfish service. "Here, methinks," says Bunyan of the Valley of Humiliation, "one may be thinking what he is, whence he came, what he has done, and to what the King has called him." It is in that spirit, I hope, we shall come together for the Special Victory and Thanksgiving Services on June 9th, realising that *only* the Power of Christ and His Resurrection can change men, and dedicating ourselves afresh to the re-building of our world, which depends on the re-building of our character, if we are to make any worthy and lasting contribution to world peace and security.

Soon we shall be thinking again of preparation for Confirmation. Classes will be formed during the first week in August, and I would like to have the names and addresses, not later than the end of July, of those who desire to attend them. It is necessary for Confirmation Candidates to supply the date of their Baptism; so if you wish to present yourself for Confirmation, please obtain this information NOW. I sometimes meet adult parishioners who have not been confirmed and there are occasions when young people come along to be married when I find that one or the other (sometimes both) has not been confirmed. I have frequently pointed out that one is never too old to be confirmed; and if any adults are diffident about attending a young people's preparation class, I shall be happy to form an adult class, should the numbers warrant it.

I am grateful to Mr. Chapple for his ministry during my absence, and I would thank all those upon whom additional duties have fallen during this period.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Women's Guild.—Once again the Women's Annual Luncheon arranged by the Guild was an outstanding success, although, owing to colds and 'flu which are so prevalent, the attendance was not so large as last year. There were a little over one hundred women present; and also four MEN.

Being near Empire Day the decorations were all in a red, white and blue scheme, and the thanks of the Guild members goes to Mrs. Messer for her lavish donation of flowers in these colours. The members were congratulated on all sides on the splendid menu, which left nothing to be desired. Miss Adams presided and Miss Margaret Young gave a very thought-provoking talk concerning our sisters in other lands, which should spur us on to greater missionary efforts. (At these luncheons, for the last three years, an appeal has been launched for £100 annually towards helping to re-build New Guinea. The sum of £330 has been forwarded, through your generosity, to A.B.M. for this scheme. As a parish we simply must not "go back" in our giving, for the advance of Christianity in the Pacific. Our appeal this year is for £100 towards sending the Christian message to Japan. The latter is such a colossal task, but it has to be faced by the people of Australia, not only for our safety and that of generations to come, but greater than all to be able to say as individuals and as a parish "we have done what we could". No one who is sincerely trying to follow "In His steps" could refuse to help this appeal.)

The musical programme was most enjoyable, songs and duets being contributed by Mesdames Reeve, Thompson and Madgwick. We were pleased to have amongst our guests, Sister Madeline of the Melanesian Mission, Miss Alice Hann, lately of the Forrest River Mission and Miss King Kemp, Secretary of the Sydney Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to A.B.M., who spoke in support of the appeal.

Telegrams bearing good wishes for the luncheon were received from the Rector who is on holiday in Melbourne, and also from the Guild Secretary, who was unable to be present. The singing of the National Anthem ended another happy time.

Personal.—There passed away during the month one whose association with All Saints', Petersham goes back many, many years, and whose service for Christ and His Kingdom will ever remain a source of inspiration to all who were privileged to know her. Lizzie Neill was one of the saints of common life, whose devotion to Christ and His church bore fruit in practical service in many and varied ways, not the least being her teaching work in the Sunday and day-schools, for which she was so particularly gifted. There are grown men and women to-day who remember with thankfulness her instruction in their youthful days, and who gladly acknowledge all they owe to her careful teaching, and to her fine example in living out in her daily life the faith she taught. She was, moreover, one of the most humble, self-effacing Christians it would be possible to meet, and no one can ever know the extent of her many acts of generous helpfulness and self-sacrifice. Knowing *how much she had done*, it was a really humbling experience to find her, a few days before the end, after some years of patient suffering, regretting that she had done so little. We are the poorer for her passing, but infinitely richer for her life and example. Lizzie Neill will live in the memory of many people; and "to live in the hearts of those we love is not to die."
