LENTEN AND EASTER SERVICES

Please study the list of Good Friday and Easter Day Services, published on the back page of this "Chronicle"; as you will see, there are a number of Special Services on both of these days, and we commend them to your careful, prayerful consideration. In particular, we would stress that Good Friday is set aside as a Holy Day, not a holiday, and therefore hope that all parishioners will make a special effort to be in Church at least once on that day.

May we also remind you of the special mid-week Services that the Rector has arranged at 7 a.m. and 7.30 p.m. each Wednesday during Lent. Holy Communion is celebrated at the morning Service, while in the Evenings, the Rector is presenting a series of studies on "The Lord's Prayer".

GOOD FRIDAY PROCESSION OF WITNESS

All Anglicans are invited to take part in this great procession held to protest against running of a pagan-type carnival (the "Royal" show) on one of the most sacred days of the year—a day which the Church got set aside to mark Christ's crucifixion. At the same time, you have the opportunity of witnessing your Christian faith to the world at large.

If you can't march in the procession, you may still attend the great Service of Witness in Hyde Park South (opposite Mark Foys) at 4.55 p.m.

The procession leaves the Archibald Fountain at 4.15 p.m., and proceeds via St. James's Road, Market Street, George Street and Bathurst Street to Hyde Park. Marchers will be eight abreast, instead of six as in the past, to cater for the growing numbers taking part.

The Archbishop will address the Service of Witness from a specially constructed pulpit. There will be seating in the Park for elderly folk.

ANZAC SERVICES

Special Services will be held at All Saints' on 25th April, which is Anzac Day.

The Petersham District Service will be held in the Town Hall on the following Sunday, 2nd May at 3 p.m. The Rector will be taking part in this Service.

Then, on the next Sunday, 9th May, two new memorials will be dedicated at All Saints'. The oak panelling around the Second World War Memorial will be dedicated in memory of Mr. T. H. Bosward, a lifelong parishioner of All Saints' who served in the first World War, and who was associated with the local Returned Soldiers' organisation for many years. The memorial lamp which has been erected on the panelling will be dedicated at the same time, in memory of Major Ayrton. A large congregation is expected for this Service, which will be held at 11 a.m.

SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS

Kindergarten Leader: Due to the retirement of the Kindergarten Leader, Mrs. Quelch, we urgently need a lady for the position as Leader. The principal duties of the leader are overall supervision, and the conducting of the opening and closing Service. The Rector, Mrs. Quelch, Mr. Jones or myself will gladly answer any inquiries from ladies who believe that they can help us in our time of need.

New Scholars: We are very pleased to see that three new scholars were enrolled in March. This was, I am sure, a result of the notice in last month's Chronicle. I would like to remind you again that we would like to see more new scholars any Sunday at 9.45 a.m.

Children's Service: Children's Service, held once a month, is taken by some scholars as a signal to stay away. Children's Service is held to help the scholars to understand the Church service. We urge the parents to see that their children attend this service.

Rural Deanery Conference: The Petersham Rural Deanery Conference was held on the 16th March at St. James', Croydon. The speaker was the Rev. A. A. Langdon, B.A., Dip. Ed., Dip. R.E. BOOKS OF THE BIBLE
JOB

The Book of Job is the story of a "righteous and upright" man, prosperous and secure in love of his family, on whom falls one personal disaster after another until, ill and destitute, he endeavours to find an answer to the deepest of his needs, how can God permit disaster of such a terrible kind to fall on the outwardly righteous in heart and in life.

The Book of Job is not set in any particular time or place that we can identify with certainty, but this is not relevant for Job's problem is that of the sufferings of the man of integrity in every time and place.

The bulk of the story consists of a dialogue between Job and his so-called comforters, his friends who endeavour to help him find an answer to his own sufferings, and God's justice in allowing these things to fall upon him. The speeches of Job and his friends are set in verse and the whole encounter or discussion gives the impression of a dramatised tale.

Job's friends take the standpoint of the orthodox Jew of their day and make suffering and disaster the inevitable consequence of sin, both secret and open. If Job has endured such adversity, he must have in some way sinned against God. Job hurls their arguments aside, he defends his own integrity and places himself on equal terms with God and demands from God an answer. Fluctuating between despair and faith, he asserts on one hand that God's ways are incomprehensible to men and on the other that God will yet vindicate him.

The climax of the book occurs when God Himself answers Job and in a series of powerful chapters (38-41) the wisdom and majesty of God are revealed to Job, who finds not the explanation of his suffering, but a quietness of mind issuing from a personal understanding of God and submission to Him, and His personal control over the lives of all men.

At the close of the book, Job has moved from an understanding of God based on self-sufficiency to a relationship based on repentance, personal trust and surrender. The words of his friends, secure in their own prosperity, and assured in their orthodoxy, where prosperity and adversity are rewarded by God as the due consequence of good and evil, brought no answer to Job's suffering. Only by the word of God, where God's true character was revealed, was Job led to a true understanding of his own needs and by this to quietness of mind and assurance of God's goodness and power.

Our competition teams have played two rounds so far. The side in the "A" Section is doing very well, being up amongst the leaders, and having won both matches.


Our other team, while not being so successful, have not had much luck, but have tried very hard.
