



RECTOR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

On Sunday, 12th July we had a visit from the Rev. G. J. Coad, of the Church Army Training College, Newcastle, who was our special preacher at all services and speaker at the Tea in the Parish Hall. The Tea was really a welcome to many who had made decisions at the Graham Crusade. In all just over 100 people attended. The Tea arrangements were in the hands of the Young Marrieds and Friends Club, who did the job very well.

Captain Coad gave an outline of what he hoped to do during the Mission to be held in this Parish from 11th October to the 18th. Above all he stressed the need for Christians to pray for its success. A copy of the prayer for the Mission will be inserted in this Chronicle.

Our next important service will be Education Sunday, 2nd August, when at 11 a.m. the special preacher will be Mr. L. Snape, Headmaster of Stanmore Public School and Mr. Winston, Headmaster of Petersham Public School will read one of the Lessons. I hope there will be a good attendance.

Confirmation lectures are now being given each Sunday during the 11 a.m. service. The Confirmees are asked to be regular. If there are any adults who would care to be Confirmed this year I would be pleased to hear from them.

The Tea will be followed by an organ recital in the Church and shortened Evensong at 8 p.m., the special speaker will be Canon Arrowsmith, M.B.E., Commonwealth Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Canon Arrowsmith is well known as an interesting speaker.

We offer our sincere sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Evans, of North Street, Marrickville, in the loss of their little son aged two weeks. A short service was conducted in All Saints' Church on Wednesday, 29th July.

A further improvement to our Church property is the recent low concrete wall across the frontage of the grounds thirteen feet from the front fence, giving us more car parking space. We hope cars will not park on the lawn in future. We offer our thanks to all who helped with this work.

Many parishioners will regret to know of the passing of Miss Alice Mary Spencer on 22nd July. I conducted the funeral service at the Rookwood Crematorium on Thursday, 23rd July. Miss Spencer was a regular worshipper at All Saints' for many years.

May I thank those who have sent in gifts for the White Elephant and other Stalls for the Fete in November. It is a help to get gifts early, especially things like clocks, which need repairing. We hope this year to wipe out the remaining debt on the Parish Hall. Please help us make a success of this function.

Classes are held each Monday night, commencing at 6.30 p.m.


