THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th March, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

Writing to you at the beginning of Holy Week and thinking over the events of the first Palm Sunday, prompts me to say that even in these modern days there is still to be found a good deal of the original Palm Sunday religion. It was then, and is now, a sentimental, mass-emotion religion that judges by numbers, parades its popularity and shouts "Hosanna" on the way to Calvary. It is a religion of pleasant emotions which you must not disturb, a kind of "no trouble" faith, which resents any demands being made upon it. Never, I believe, has the Christian Faith been faced with such terrific antagonisms as she is to-day—fierce nationalism, fanatic communism and stark paganism. The Church cannot meet these things with emotional "Hosannas," with luke-warm convictions and half-hearted loyalties. The only religion that will meet the demands of our times and that will satisfy our hearts, is a commanding, challenging, incredibly difficult faith, that convinces the mind, captures the heart and transforms the life—the religion of Jesus Christ.

So many of us are more attracted by the idea of Christ as a Leader than as a Saviour. Like the people of His own day we are more anxious to have Him on our side, to bolster up our own ideas and projects than we are to be on His side. Material prosperity, economic security and national sovereignty—these are still the things which attract us most. These are the things we want, and we frequently mistake them for the things we need. Any leader who will promise to lead a crusade to secure them, we will readily accept and welcome. What we find it hard to accept is the truth that our deepest need is not material prosperity but spiritual renewal. What will save our world is not a crusade for economic security, essential though that may be; what we really need is a crusade for righteousness. What the people of our Lord's day failed to realise, and what we often fail to realise, is that Christ is concerned not merely with the enemies which assail us from without; He is primarily concerned to deliver us from the enemies that are within our own hearts and minds. We need to pray "that we may know Him and the **POWER** of His Resurrection," for it is only through the power of the Christian Faith that we can hope to solve the almost overwhelming problems of our day. Easter Day is the assurance that through pain and sorrow, through failure and death, through loss and defeat, God can bring the good cause to victory for those who trust Him.

Once again we have decided to use the box method of reducing our Parish Hall debt. Boxes will be available on Easter Day, April 6, and will be recalled on our Consecration Festival Sunday, August 17. The Churchwardens ask the co-operation of **ALL** parishioners. We commend this appeal to our younger people who have the benefit of a particularly spacious hall for all youth activities, and who should, therefore, shoulder some of the responsibility of helping to pay for it. We also ask the co-operation of the youth of the parish in keeping the Hall in good order and condition, in view of the fact that it has recently been painted throughout, at considerable expense.

We offer our congratulations and good wishes to our Archbishop upon his restoration to health and strength after his recent operation. Many hundreds of people, clergy and laity, came together in the Cathedral to render thanks for the recovery of His Grace, and afterwards in the Sydney Town Hall to join in a public welcome.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Women's Guild.—The Quarterly Rally was held on Thursday, 13th March, in the chapel and afterwards in the Parish Hall. Miss Nora Dillon was the guest speaker who spoke on her war years in China and the wonderful way in which they had been led and their prayers answered during all that troublous time. It was intensely interesting to all present to listen to such first-hand knowledge about those dark days for our missionaries and to hear how God's guiding hand had brought them safely through. At the conclusion of the service, afternoon tea was served by Mrs. Sinclair's group in the Parish Hall. On Thursday, 27th March, the Annual Meeting of the Guild was held. There was only a fair attendance, as many of the members were away through illness or else on holidays. The Rector presided. All the retiring officers were re-elected. The secretary's report showed a year of steady work, both for parochial and outside interests. By the financial report over £200 had been raised during the year, which had been disbursed in various ways, leaving a credit balance of over £20. The Rector thanked the members for their continued loyal support to their church and its requirements and wished the Guild every success in the ensuing year. Two new members were welcomed to our fellowship—Mesdames Cameron and Houston—and we hope that many more women of the parish will join up with this important part of our church's life. We are pleased to report that the Mesdames McLean, Brennan and Grant, who have all been ill, are much better, as also the Misses Humphries and Mottram. There is a warm welcome awaiting them on return to our ranks. The meetings for April are: 10th April: Social Evening, when the special speaker will be Miss L. King Kemp, who is always a welcome visitor; and 24th April our **Annual Women's Luncheon**. Keep this date well in mind. This year it is to be an Australian Luncheon. As you know, at these luncheons our president launches an appeal for £100 for missions. This year we want to raise this £100 towards training an aboriginal girl as a nurse to work amongst her own people, following in the footsteps of Nurse Muriel Stanley, who is doing such fine work in this direction at Yarrabah, North Queensland. As the Church Army sponsored Nurse Stanley's training, we have asked Captain Cowland to be our guest speaker on that occasion. He writes to say that he will be most happy to come and hopes to bring an aboriginal trainee with him. Will you help make this luncheon a wonderful time and show this remarkable people from whom we took the land, and have done very little for them down the ages, that we really do want to help them? You know our slogan for the past four years—**£1 per family**—the whole amount to be handed in on Advent Sunday. (See how much you can save towards the appeal by 24th April.) The Sunday School.—Come along to the Parish Hall on Friday, 18th April, at 8 p.m., and see our own Sunday School children on the screen! The films will include various aspects of our parish activities such as the children on their way to church on Harvest Festival Sunday, "shots" of the Annual Picnic at Watson's Bay, and of our cricket teams; to which several cartoons will be added, thus making an interesting programme. The "man at the door" will relieve you of one shilling if you are an adult, and half that amount if you are a child—all in aid of Sunday School funds. We are sorry to hear of Miss Belfield's illness and trust she may soon be able to resume her work amongst the senior girls.—D. E. MULDOON, Secretary.

Y.C.I.—This organisation of men has its own Club Room in the Parish Hall building, and meetings are held there on alternate Friday evenings. All men of the Parish are invited to join. The Y.C.I. Syllabus covers many interesting meetings, including "Manuscript Journal" Night, Impromptu Speeches, Discussions, Club Room Nights and Reminiscences of Sport. The Y.C.I. also has Guest Speakers from time to time, and members have had the privilege and pleasure of hearing many well-known personalities. The

Y.C.I. was founded on the 21st November, 1910, and it has functioned continuously since that date. It has long since outgrown the Boys' Club stage and is essentially a Men's Institute, as evidenced by the fact that twenty-six members served with the Forces in the Second Great War. Ex-Service men of both Great Wars constitute more than half of the present membership. The Y.C.I. offers good fellowship, and new members will be cordially welcomed. L.H.M.U.—The Rector presided at the Annual Meeting of the Ladies' Home Mission Union held on Tuesday, 11th March. All officers were re-elected, with the exception of the Treasurer. We received Miss Darke's resignation as Treasurer with deep regret. Miss Darke has held office for 24 years and has been a most loyal supporter of all L.H.M.U. activities. We welcome Mrs. Cameron in her place. We were very grateful to Sister Symons who told us of the work of the L.H.M.U. nurses among the old people in the poorer parishes. Home Mission Society.—The General Secretary writes: "The work of the Parish Nursing Service has been going on now for over three years and the work has increased very largely, as is borne out by the fact that in the first year 900 odd visits were made, whilst in the third year there were over 2,700 visits. They have been caring for aged sick folk in the poorer parts of Sydney and have been doing truly remarkable work. The Home Mission Society Council feels that the time is ripe for the establishment in Redfern of a headquarters for the nurses and a hostel where a limited number of these aged sick people could be taken and more adequately cared for. To this end the land has already been purchased on a very suitable site adjoining St. Saviour's Church, Redfern, and it is hoped to establish a building there at a cost of something in the vicinity of £20,000." (Petersham Branch of L.H.M.U. has already raised over £51 towards this fund and is still working for it.)
