THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

Writing to you on the above Festival prompts me to say that I know the mere mention of angels to some people at once suggests unreality—ethereal beings in white, with an aura and wings, the creation of the artist and the poet. As though anything that is artistic or poetical must, of necessity, be abnormal, out of touch with the practical concerns of life and, for that reason, not of any serious account! However, it is good for us to bear in mind that the Bible observes no such reticence on the subject of angels as we ourselves commonly and mistakenly do. Both in the Old Testament and in the New it tells freely of their activity as the messengers and agents of Heaven, the Divine Emissaries who bring the help of the Lord to His people, "the ministers of His who do His pleasure." Many of its most vivid stories are associated with their activity and some of its most encouraging promises also.

In the world about us there is indifference and apathy towards the highest and noblest things on the one hand; and, on the other, a fierce antagonism born of individual and national selfishness. The power of evil seems so huge and crushing. The Church seems so small and weak. We who believe passionately in goodness, truth, peace and love appear to be hopelessly outnumbered; so much less sagacious, less effective, less successful in our efforts, compared with those who oppose us. Day by day we hear of fresh onslaughts upon righteousness, goodness and truth, and it has always been so easy to be aware of the hostile forces arrayed against us, and yet to be so blind and insensible to the spiritual allies that stand waiting to do God's bidding. In these days when material things loom so large, this Festival brings a timely reminder of the reality of the unseen power of God round about us, bidding us keep our faith and courage in times when it is perilously easy to lose both.

Parents! these young people of yours who have already entered into the full privileges of the Church or who will, by their Confirmation, shortly be doing so, need all the help and encouragement you can give them. They go out to bear their witness in a world where there is a tremendous amount of indifference and even hostility to spiritual values. They know perfectly well that they cannot hope to be true to their vows and uphold the Christian standard of life in their own strength. You can help them best by encouraging them to be regular in their church attendance, especially in making their Communion, and what better way can you do this than by coming with them?


The Confirmation Service is at eleven o'clock on **Sunday, October 26**, when the parents and friends of the candidates are particularly requested to be present. Where it is possible the Godparents of the candidates should be invited also, so that they may witness their Godchildren assuming the responsibilities their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. If by reason of distance this is impossible, I hope the Godparents will be advised of the date and time of the service, so that they may remember the candidates in prayer at the actual hour of their Confirmation.

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the eight o'clock Celebration on **Sunday, November 2**, which is our Patronal Festival. On that Sunday morning they are invited to attend the Communion Breakfast, which is a fellowship meal arranged to welcome these young people into full membership in God's great family—the Church.

We shall again endeavour to make our Patronal Festival a Reunion of all those confirmed here during my incumbency of All Saints'. Will each one whom this invitation concerns endeavour to keep the Festival as a Day of Special Remembrance and Fellowship—**Remembrance** of their own Confirmation and a re-dedication of themselves in the service of Christ and His Church; **Fellowship** with their younger friends who will, on that day, be receiving Holy Communion for the first time.

My sister and I are most grateful to the members of the Women's Guild (and their helpers) who so kindly and efficiently carried out the arrangements for our Rural Deanery meeting in our Parish Hall on Tuesday, September 16, which, we are glad to hear, was so successful. His Grace the Archbishop writes: "We had a splendid gathering in the Parish Hall, and your ladies were most kind in providing us all with supper afterwards. Will you express my sincere thanks to them? It made all the difference to the evening." Archdeacon Bidwell (Rural Dean of Petersham) also kindly wrote, expressing his appreciation and thanks.
