The Work-meeting is still held at All Saints' Parsonage on Fridays, from 2.30 to 5 o'clock, and orders for work are gladly received either by Mrs. Baber or Miss C. L. Baly, Chalcott, Marrickville; and new subscribers' names by Mrs. Parnell, Roslyn, Belgrave-street, Petersham.

In January last the working members of the Branch, hearing of the probable deficit in the church accounts at Easter of £200, held a meeting and talked the matter over; and feeling that the burden of a Sale of Work fell on a few only, it was decided to ask 200 friends of the church each to contribute or collect a pound, and so meet the deficiency. This plan has been tried and the result has been so far satisfactory as that £125 16s. was placed in the offertory on Easter Day, which with £41 annual subscriptions from the Handi-work Branch members placed the sum of £166 16s. at the service of the church wardens. They are most thankful for the result of the effort which has been much preferred by all to a Sale of Work. There are yet some cards to come in, and they trust therefore that the sum will be further increased. They feel that they must not in any way relax their efforts, but must earnestly go forward in the good work of augmenting the means for carrying on God's work in the parish.

The Incumbent's Address to the Easter Vestry.

Gentlemen of the Vestry. —

It will be more convenient for me to give my address at the beginning than at the close of our meeting, and with your permission I will do this now.

Easter has come to us once more and is well nigh over, and that means that another year has gone out of our church life, and is passed from us beyond recall. You and I, and all others whom it concerns, would do well to consider whether we have used our opportunities as members of this church as gladly and diligently as we might have done; and if we find, as I have no doubt we shall do if we deal truly and honestly with ourselves, cause for regret in this respect, let it be ours to amend our ways between this Easter and the next. My aim has been to carry on the ministrations of religion in this parish on the lines laid down for us in the church of our fathers; and if in pursuance of this intention I have seemed to some of my friends needlessly to multiply services and to give myself unnecessary trouble, they must do me the justice to remember that I did not invent these days and seasons, and that they are a part of that system which, as it seemed to me, I was bound if possible to follow out. It has appeared to me also that the form of Christian character that is bred and fostered on these old Church lines is about the finest and most enduring of any that I have known. I feel, I trust, as intensely as any can do, that Christ and Christ alone can move and stir the heart and mould it into goodness and beauty, and that He must be lifted up if all men, or indeed any men are to be drawn to Him. But he who follows the Church's lines and teaching cannot fail, if he be true to the same, to make much of Christ in his ministry: for He is brought before us in our Church services and sacred seasons in every aspect of His character and in every portion of His work. Our teaching and preaching must be evangelical in the true sense of that word, if we faithfully follow in the lines of our Prayer Book; and that I repeat, is what I have endeavoured to do, and will do, God being my helper.

I have again to thank my friends the clergy who are resident in this parish, for their kind and ready assistance in the public ministrations of the Church. They have helped me not a little with an ungrudging readiness of service, which I should be ungrateful not to acknowledge. The parish also has been ably and diligently served by the curate, the Rev. F. W. Reeve. He has helped me in the schools and in visiting the people in their homes, and, above all, in the work at the Mission Church. There is a feeling in the parish, I understand, that the Mission Church ought to contribute a certain portion of the Curate's stipend, and I cannot say that the feeling is at all unreasonable; but I hope the Mother Church will still show its kindness to its little daughter by letting things remain as they are for another year. If Church matters progress as they seem likely to do at the Mission Church for another year, the debt on the Bank will be nearly if not entirely extinguished by next Easter, and the little Church may be able then to take up some part of the burden which is borne by the Mother Church at present in the matter of the Curate's stipend. I am

most thankful for the measure of success that has so far attended our efforts to gather the Church people of that part of our parish into their proper fold. We have no very great successes to tell of as yet, and what remains to be done is far and away in excess of any present achievements; but we have no cause for despondency as regards this matter but have every reason, on the contrary, to thank God and take courage.

Next to the clergy who have helped me so willingly in my work, the lay officers of the Church deserve our sincere and earnest thanks for all they have done for the Church during the past year. The senior churchwarden ought especially to be thanked for his work in banking the offertories and keeping the Church accounts, and for the unfailing faithfulness and accuracy with which he, for something like thirty years, has carried on this work for the parish. If our friend wishes, and he has often expressed to me his earnest desire to be relieved of the work that he has so long and faithfully performed, I do not think the vestry ought to impose the duty upon him any longer against his will, if some other younger man, well approved by the Vestry, can be found to relieve him of the work. I shall have much pleasure, when the time comes in again, of nominating my friend, Mr. Alex. Richardson, as clergyman's warden, he having kindly consented to fill the office once more. Our thanks are due to the hon. Choir Master; to the Organist, and to the ladies and gentlemen who form our Church Choir for the pains they have been at to render our Church services bright and efficient. I greatly regret that while the Choir has not fallen off in the efficiency of its performance in proportion to its strength, its power as regards numbers has been weak of late, and is so still. There ought to be no difficulty, in a congregation such as ours, in keeping up the numbers of the Choir to its full force. The Mission Church Choir—which is almost entirely drawn from the parts surrounding the Church—is at the present moment stronger as regards numbers than the Choir of the Mother Church. Surely those of the congregation who have power to help us in the most important portion of our common worship will come forward to our aid.

The thanks of the Parish are especially due to the ladies of the *Handi-Work-Branch-of-Church-Workers* for their zealous efforts to extinguish the very serious deficit that existed in the current accounts. Their plan of sending out collecting-cards to friends of the Church within the Parish—and in some cases outside it, with the request that the person to whom it was sent would do his or her best to collect or find at least one pound, if possible, towards the Church debt—has been so far successful that, on Easter Sunday, they were able to place £125 16s. as the result of that effort. They also handed in at the same offertory £41, as representing the £50—their ordinary quarterly offering; for, owing to the removal from the Parish of former subscribers to their fund, the lack of orders for the weekly sewing-class, and other causes, they were not quite able this year to do as they had done before. In respect to the collecting-cards and the deficit, it is satisfactory to find that, while a good many who were appealed to have not responded to the appeal as yet and, perhaps, will not respond at all, nearly one hundred of those that were appealed to have made reply with such results as I have mentioned. We began last year with a deficit of £107 in our current expenditure. We shall begin this year, I trust, with the debt almost—although not altogether, I fear—extinguished. Thanks, I may say, to the busy workers, and to all who aided them so well, for all that has been done; and it is only fair that I should add that the Honorary Secretary and Treasurer of the movement—whose name I am not at liberty thus publicly to disclose—toiled more than they all, and is well entitled to the short holiday she is about to take upon the Mountains. The particulars of the collection will appear, with the other Church accounts in our monthly paper for April, which will be issued to the congregation, I trust, next Sunday.

I feel that I ought not to detain the Vestry much longer from the special work of this evening—the passing of the Church accounts and the election of wardens for the ensuing year—but I cannot conclude without expressing, as I was able to do last year, my thanks to the God of Peace for that measure of agreement which he has accorded to us during the year. We have had no dissensions, and I trust we shall not have any. We are learning more and more, I trust, to bear and forbear towards each other, to see the good that there so often is in those who are not entirely of our way of thinking. Let the good feeling go on. Let us strive after the things that make for peace and the things whereby one may edify another; and that, so doing, we may prove ourselves to be Christ's disciples indeed, even as he has told us: "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples—if ye have love one towards another."

After Easter Vestry the outgoing Churchwardens were re-elected, and the following gentlemen were chosen as sidesmen:—COPE, JAKES, CLOSE, SEEVERS, KENNEDY, KEMP, WISE.

The Annual Vestry Meeting of the Mission Church was held in the vestry on Easter Tuesday; notwithstanding the wet evening 14 gentlemen were present, the Rev. F. W. Reeve occupied the chair. After the annual statement of accounts had been read and adopted the following gentlemen were elected Churchwardens for the ensuing year:—Messrs Nortridge and Neilley, Mr. W. Bucknell having been already nominated by the incumbent as clergyman's warden; Messrs Little, Brown, and Norman were then chosen as sidesmen. A Committee of 10 gentlemen was appointed to assist the Churchwardens to thoroughly canvass the Mission Church district with the view of enlisting the co-operation of the parishioners to systematically reduce the debt on the church by regular monthly subscriptions.
