THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
Feast of St. Peter, 1942.

Dear People of All Saints':

About this time of the year we begin to think about preparation classes for Confirmation. As we have had a Confirmation in our own Parish Church for ten successive years, and as there may be only a few candidates this year, there will be no Confirmation Service in our own Church in 1942. However, if you wish to be confirmed this year, please hand your name and address to Mr. Nicholls or to myself not later than the 31st of July. We shall then form classes early in August, and present the candidates for Confirmation at St. Andrew's Cathedral at a convenient service, probably about the end of October or early November. As a general rule, candidates should be 14 years of age before the date of Confirmation. Any adult parishioners who have not yet been confirmed can also be prepared, and later presented at the Cathedral. Will any adults who wish to be prepared for Confirmation please get in touch with me before the end of July? Those who would prefer to be confirmed in their own Parish Church, can be assured that, all being well, there will be a Confirmation at All Saints' in 1943.

May I say, at the outset, to prospective candidates, that unless you are prepared to be reasonably regular at Holy Communion after your confirmation, it is of little use presenting yourself for preparation. If you are going to be like some I know who are so lacking in loyalty that they attend once or twice and then drift away; or allow someone to persuade them to desert their own Church for that of another denomination, then it would be better not to be confirmed at all—it is only making a mockery of a very sacred and solemn rite. It is far better to have six who are really in earnest about their confirmation than sixty unreliable ones to whom it obviously means nothing.

"Time and tide wait for no man," and we are rapidly approaching our Consecration Festival. Will you help by getting in touch with former parishioners and asking them to join with us in the Services being arranged for August 16th, to mark the 40th Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints? Of course, owing to the war, all arrangements made now


can be but conditional, but we hope to have the Annual Tea Meeting and Re-union of parishioners, past and present, on Wednesday, August 19th. Full details of our plans for the Festival will be given you in next month's "Chronicle."

On our Festival Sunday—August 16th—the boxes now in use (in lieu of a fete) will be returned and presented. Parishioners who hold these boxes are reminded that there now remain but six weeks in which to conclude their efforts for the Parish Hall Fund. For those who have no box (and there are fewer boxes issued this year than last) there will be a special envelope (in the August "Chronicle") which you will please use. We must have the co-operation of **ALL PARISHIONERS** if this annual effort for our Parish Hall is to be successful. The younger people of all organisations who use the hall must shoulder at least some of the responsibility of paying for it.

In the last issue of the "Church Standard" there appears the following, under the heading of "The Secret of Victory":—"We shall win the war," writes the Bishop of Southwell (the Rt. Rev. F. R. Barry) in a message to his diocese, "when we deserve to win it, when we do and endure enough to win it, when we put forth sacrifice and effort commensurate with what the hour demands. If we are any of us content to sit back and let somebody else win it for us, we shall all go down together. That is sober truth, though it may not be popular. If the cause of freedom were to be overwhelmed, it would be because the citizens of free countries had not been willing to pay the price it costs. The secret of victory is in our people's soul, baptized in the fire of faith and consecration. The Russians (and in their own way the Germans) are utterly certain what they are fighting for. They are possessed by passionate conviction, and everything makes clear that 'Democracy' can only survive in the strength of a living faith. Secularized Democracy is obsolete. Our future is bound up with faith in God. So then, just because things are now so grim, this is the time when, if never before, the soul of the nation needs to be rekindled, to hear the prophetic trumpet of conviction and to gather itself into a flaming sword of re-awakened spiritual loyalties. And in truth the issues of this war are spiritual. But how can the defence of the Christian inheritance be achieved except by a truly Christian nation? How can we win it without faith in God and self-dedication to the cause of Christ?"

As we work and pray for this freedom, we must be careful to remember that freedom is **not** the right to do what we like, but the privilege of glad self-discipline in a high cause, lest we become slaves to our lower and selfish impulses.

Congratulations.—Wednesday, June 24 (the Nativity of St. John the Baptist), was the 20th Anniversary of our Archbishop's Consecration. The Rector was present at the service of Holy Communion in the Cathedral, and afterwards offered His Grace the congratulations of the people of this parish.

Congratulations also to the Rectors of our neighbouring parishes, who have been appointed to Archdeaconries: Canon S. H. Denman, of St. Clement's, Marrickville, becomes Archdeacon of Redfern, and the Rev. John Bidwell, of St. Andrew's, Summer Hill, Archdeacon of Parramatta.

CENEF.—During the last three months we are sorry to report we have lost three members, the Misses Glanville, Ridley and Hole, owing to their removal from the district.

On March 25th, Mrs. Jones and Miss Sands took charge of the stall in the Cathedral grounds to receive papers and magazines for the various camps, but owing to the inclemency of the weather very few were handed in.

On May 15th, National Comforts Appeal Day, Mrs. Reilly and Miss Carolus sold buttons for same. Miss Carolus also the week previously, sold buttons for same here in our midst, the sum of 18/- being raised, which was credited to our branch. On June 19th, Prisoners' of War Day Appeal, Mrs. Hayne represented our branch. On April 16th, a lantern lecture was given by Mrs. H. W. K. Mowil, the proceeds from same being £4, which was handed into CENEF for the extensions to the Cathedral Hut Fund.

The 3 to 5 Fete, which was held on the 30th of May, proved a great success, despite it falling on the same day as the air-raid test; £21/11/6 was realised; £10 was paid into CENEF and 15/9 to our own funds, and the balance to the Women's Guild. Many thanks to all who helped by giving in kind, and donations of money. A box of comforts has been sent to the Rev. Hulme Moir, to be distributed amongst the boys who returned from the Middle East, also parcels to some of our own church lads.

A Gift Evening was held during the month to receive goods to be stored in our cupboard should the necessity arise, our Parish Hall being a rest centre. Several tins of cocoa, milk, coffee, etc., were donated.

We would be grateful for any pieces of material that could be made into patch-work quilts, or old blankets, etc., to help our rest centres.

Medical Missions.—July is the month for the annual appeal for Medical Missions. We shall have a visit from the Chairman of The Australian Board of Missions (the Rt. Rev. G. H. Cranswick, formerly Bishop of Gippsland), who will preach at the afternoon service (4 p.m.) on July 19th; and the following Sunday morning, at 11 a.m., the preacher will be the Rev. L. J. Harris, C.M.S. missionary recently returned from Groote Eylandt. Medical Missionary Appeal Envelopes will be available, and should be returned by July 26th.

Archdeacon W. L. Langley.—All Saints', Petersham, people will regret to know that the Rector of All Saints', Woollahra, has resigned owing to ill-health. The Archdeacon was taken ill last December and, although he is much better, he has not yet recovered sufficiently to undertake parochial work. His Grace the Archbishop preached at a service held at Woollahra on Sunday morning, June 28th, to mark the close of the Rector's ministry, and two of the Archdeacon's former curates (the Rectors of St. John's, Darlinghurst, and All Saints', Petersham) took part in it.

We deeply sympathise with the Archdeacon and Mrs. Langley in having to give up the work which they love; and pray that freedom from responsibility will prove a big factor in aiding his restoration to health. Archdeacon Langley was always a welcome visitor to this parish, and our people will remember that he performed the opening ceremony of our Kindergarten, just two years ago on the 20th July.

An Appreciation.—On Sunday morning, June 21, Robert L. Calver, as was his custom, attended the early celebration of Holy Communion. Four days later his children were called to his death-bed and he passed peacefully away whilst prayer was being offered for him and his loved ones. For almost 50 years he was closely associated with this Church, and we are going to miss him from its life and fellowship. He was interested in all aspects of church life, but particularly in the work amongst the children and the young men. He was one of the vice-presidents of our Y.C.I., to which his youngest son—our churchwarden—has given so many years' outstanding service as its enthusiastic secretary. It was in memory of his life's partner and her love for the children that Robert Calver generously gave us a very substantial start for our Kindergarten Building Fund; and no one was happier than he when, on June 1st, two years ago, he laid the foundation stone of one of the best Kindergarten Rooms in this Diocese. Others helped, we know, but it was his gift that gave us the necessary start, and turned a probability into a possibility. In days when so many men, yes, even so many good men, neglect altogether attendance at church, and take no part in its fellowship, we clergy appreciate the loyalty of men like Robert Calver; without him and others like-minded, it would be very difficult for the church to carry on. The passing of the more senior members of our congregation constitutes a very real challenge to the younger men of the parish to take from their hands the torch of church life and to keep it burning brightly, until in the process of time they must hand it to those who come after.

In offering our deepest sympathy to his family and their relatives, we would say:

"For all those humble and true-hearted souls who have made life happier and smoother for others; for those who have inspired us by their example and encouraged us by their friendship, we thank Thee, Lord."

Missionary News.—We have agreed to include, from time to time (so far as space permits) certain items of Missionary News supplied by the Australian Board of Missions. The following news paragraph has come to hand for this issue:—

Native Girls' Reaction to Bombing!—From Fauabu (British Solomon Islands) comes the encouraging news of the helpful reaction of mission-trained native girls to the uncertainties of their present life. The hospital has been overcrowded, and the number of out-patients has increased tremendously, but the hospital staff has suddenly realised that a band of girls has settled in during the excitements and become nurses. These girls are now looking after the women and children and the maternity work. One girl is being trained as a theatre nurse.

Visitors!—On their way to various training schools fourteen Melanesian lads have been staying in Sydney. Two of them are destined to be teachers or priests; two have already been assistants at the Government Wireless Station, Tulagi, and are going to Suva for further training in radio technique. The remaining ten are to be medical students at the College for Natives at Suva. Most of the latter are already experienced as hospital orderlies. At the conclusion of their training they will be at the disposal of the Bishop of Melanesia or of the B.S.I. Government.

[The Editor has, at the moment of writing, just met two of these boys; and fine types of lads they are! They had been watching our Junior C.E.B.S. in action!]

Front Door Missionaries.—An opportunity may be presented to you in your district for extending the right hand of Christian fellowship and hospitality to some of our coloured brothers. Various regiments of the Negro Labour Corps of the U.S. Army are in Australia, and are not always receiving treatment which is free from colour bias. Do your bit as a missionary of the Love of God to make their stay in our land happy, with memories of friendship.
