THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
 26th July, 1937.

Dear People of All Saints',—

The month of August brings with it the Thirty-fifth Anniversary of our Parish Church, which we look forward to commemorating on Sunday, August 15th.

It was in May, 1870, that the foundation stone of the present church building was laid, but the origin of the church dates further back than that, when, according to records, the first service was held in a tiny schoolroom (which had been built three years previously) on Sunday, April 15th, 1860. The Consecration Festival therefore has nothing to do with the age of the

church. When churches are erected, they almost always carry some debt in the process. When a church is completed and opened for public worship it is **dedicated**, and, as the years go by, and the debt is finally wiped out, the church is then **Consecrated**. It is a wise provision made by the Church of England that no church should be consecrated until it is free from debt.

This year our Festival falls upon the identical date of the original Consecration—August 15th, and it is a most fitting day for parishioners—both Past and Present—to come together to remember with deep thanksgiving those who laboured here in days gone by; to consecrate ourselves afresh to the task of helping to build Christ's Kingdom in our own day and generation; and to do our utmost to hand on a brightly burning torch of vigorous church life to those who shall come after.

That is why we always observe our Consecration Festival as a "Back-to-All-Saints'" Sunday and we cordially invite those who in the past have in any way been linked with All Saints' to come back and worship here with us, in their Mother Church.

I earnestly ask the support and co-operation of each one of you, not only in the matter of inviting former parishioners, but in getting in touch with present parishioners, particularly with those who are not regular attendants, and extending to them a special invitation to be present at our Festival. Whether we have large congregations both morning and evening will depend very considerably upon the amount of enthusiasm and keenness **YOU**, personally, put into this occasion. Particularly do we ask that all the men who are Communicants will attend the early Celebration on that day, and the Men's Communion Breakfast which follows. Please read carefully page 6 of this issue, where you will find particulars of the services and the music being arranged for them. Bishop Pilcher has kindly consented to preach at the Morning Service, and Canon E. Howard Lea in the Evening.

Will those who have collecting boxes which we have been using for the past sixteen weeks (in lieu of a fete) please return them on Sunday, August 15th. For those who did not have a box, there is a special envelope issued with this "Chronicle," in which we ask you to place your special offering, representing what you would have expended if a fete had been held this year.

We continue our Festival by holding a Parish Tea and Social Reunion on Thursday, August 19th. This was so wonderfully successful last year that we are encouraged to look for even greater things on the 19th. Donations are requested from those who may be willing to give a table, or share with others in so doing, and promises of donations in kind will be most welcome. Admission to the Tea and Social Reunion will be by ticket, which will cost one shilling, and may be obtained from the District Visitors or any of the Church Officers. You will understand that only by the sale of tickets can we approximate the number for whom we shall have to provide. If, therefore, you intend coming to the Tea—as we hope you do—will you please purchase your ticket as soon as possible.

Confirmation Classes commence on Tuesday, August 3rd., for girls, and for boys on Thursday, August 5th, both classes being held at the Rectory and commencing at 7.30 each week. It is imperative that candidates for Confirmation should attend **regularly**, not allowing anything to interfere with their preparation.

It is just twelve months since our beautiful Memorial Side Chapel was dedicated by His Grace The Archbishop. It has proved a great boon—not only enhancing the beauty of our church, but for week-day celebrations,

Wednesday Evensong, and other small services. We hope some day to complete the screen, and would suggest this as a worthy objective to any who may desire to place a memorial in our church.

I am grateful to the Revd. E. Pattison Clarke, to Mr. A. T. Pattison for "keeping the flag flying" during my absence. We wish Mr. and Mrs. Clarke every blessing in their new work at S. Mary's, Waverley. I was glad to know that some of our choir members and parishioners were present at the Induction Service.
