

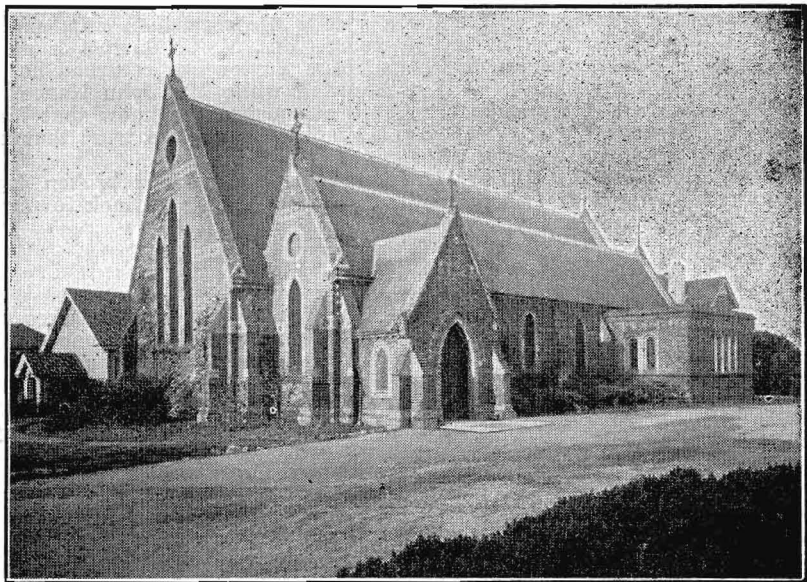

Lenten Services:

MRS. HILDA MAY MUDFORD

The following tribute from the Rector's Warden of Mrs. Mudford's former parish of Tinonee is being printed in "The Chronicle" as it unfortunately did not reach the Rector until just after the funeral service he conducted for Mrs. Mudford on 12th December.

Dear Rector,

Our townsfolk here were grieved to learn today of Mrs. Mudford's sudden passing. You would know that until very recently, she was a resident of our little town, and had for many years played a leading role in our public life, more particularly with our P. & C. Association, Red Cross Branch, and School of Arts Committee. She was a life member and Patron of each, was a past President and former Secretary of the P. & C. Association, and served for many years, until only a few months ago, as Secretary of the Red Cross Branch. She also served as a delegate to the P. & C. District Council, and was a delegate to, and member of, the State Executive of the P. & C. Federation, for many years. She helped bring that body into being.

Mrs. Mudford was a faithful member of our congregation at St. Luke's, Tinonee, and only this year relinquished the Presidency of the Ladies' Guild.

As one associated with her in each of these activities in our community, I would respectfully ask that you would, in your address, please offer profound sympathy to the bereaved, on behalf of the Tinonee P. & C. Association, Red Cross Branch, the Rector of Wingham, and members of the St. Luke's Ladies' Guild and Vestry, Tinonee Memorial School of Arts Committee and Tinonee Progress Association.

I might add that Mrs. Mudford was a former member of Tinonee and District Soldiers' Memorial Fund Committee, which set up a memorial for the fallen of the two World Wars. The name of her elder son, Clifton, who died in Malaya, is engraved on this memorial stone, and his mother never failed to place a floral tribute, in his Unit's colours, on Anzac Day each year.

I would like to say that we hope to have a memorial service in St. Luke's, to coincide, if possible, with your service at All Saints', and that in place of floral tributes, we hope to place a memorial book or books in the library of our school, whose interests she served with such devotion for so long.

May light perpetual shine on our old friend and fine citizen. May she rest in perfect peace.

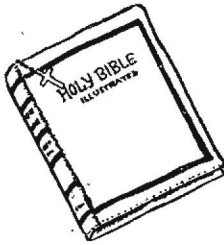

THE EPISTLE TO THE EPHESIANS



The letter of Paul to the Ephesians begins by setting out Christian ideas and lines of thought which are almost unique in the New Testament. It then proceeds to very practical matters of Christian living.

This letter is related to the Epistle to the Colossians and both letters have as a central theme, the unique place of Christ both in the created universe and God's told plan of redemption. In the first part of the letter, the main thought is set out in the ninth and tenth verses of the first chapter where Paul

speaks of 'God's hidden purpose planned beforehand in Christ, to be put into effect when the time was ripe, the purpose, namely, that the whole universe, both in heaven and earth, might be brought into unity in Christ'. Here Paul sees the eternal Son of God as the centre in which the whole creation unites, and the living bond of unity between all men and all nature.

As Paul goes on to speak of Christian redemption he first deals with man's living link with the risen Christ through the gift of the Holy Spirit. Man reconciled to God is reconciled within himself and consequently reconciled to his neighbour and to the world around him. Through man's union with Christ he is being brought near to God, he and his neighbour are being made into a new society.

The barrier that stands between Gentile and Jew, and between all men has been broken down. God, in Christ has laid the foundations for a new society in which all men, forgiven and transformed, will be brothers.

The Epistle goes on to deal with practical problems of daily living. Paul urges his readers 'to live up to their calling', to tender heartedness, generosity in their personal relationships. He deals with the basic areas of human concern, husbands and wives, children and parents, employers and employees. The Epistle moves to its conclusion with the powerful section, so often quoted, where we are encouraged to find our strength in the Lord and in His mighty power and to put on all the armour which God provides.

The Epistle to the Ephesians is unique in the New Testament writings. Like a vital piece in a jig-saw, it provides pattern and meaning for the whole. It lifts our minds as high as they are ever raised in the New Testament and yet concerns itself with the common responsibilities under which our daily service to God is given.

Young Churchmen's Institute (Y.C.I.):

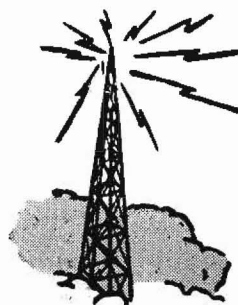

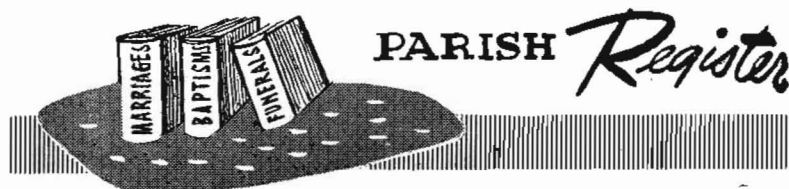
