### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As Christmas draws nearer we turn our thoughts to the "Festive Season" and all the involvement of this time of the year. We plan where and how we will spend Christmas and with whom. It is a family time, so our thoughts go back to other years and our memories are mixed - some happy, some sad - yet all with that special emphasis we are not likely to forget. These days many families are separated by thousands of miles as travelling overseas has become an everyday event. For others there will be great rejoicing as plans are made to "go home" for Christmas.

Yet in many homes Christmas is a time of dread and of sorrow. Mothers will struggle to give their children a "happy Christmas;" some will long for young sons and daughters who have left home and not been heard of again. Fathers unemployed, frustrated that there will be few joys in their homes. Lonely young people, too afraid or ashamed to return to their families - most unemployed since leaving school - their future bleak and empty.

On the evening of 1st September Council members met with their guests at a special reception at 139 Castlereagh Street, Sydney. Warm fellowship around a delightful buffet meal was enjoyed by all. Many strong links of friendship were formed during those days.

SEPTEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

The programme for the September Council meeting was varied and interesting. An international visitor, Mrs. Vasiti Raiwalu, Area President from Fiji of the World Federation of Methodist Women, brought a devotional greeting. Her message was based on St. Paul's words in 1 Cor. 1:5: "That in everything we are enriched by Him in all utterance and in all knowledge."

A letter of thanks together with a cheque for \$187.50 was received from the New Zealand women who visited Australia as an ecumenical group (see separate report).

Another item of interest was the firm desire expressed to bring to Australia a selected candidate from Burma as a Winifred Kiek Scholar.

Reports were received from several Branches and these are summarised separately.

Miss Christina Richards, a representative of Trading Partners, had quietly arranged her display of attractive goods at the back of the meeting room, so that when the appropriate time arrived the ladies turned their chairs around to view a variety of goods for sale. These were presented in a charming and informative way by Christina who sold \$269.40's worth to those present, thus helping women in underdeveloped countries. Tea was served by the Churches of Christ ladies at the conclusion of activities.

A worthwhile time of discussion followed the luncheon after the Fellowship Day service. The committee shared in the planning for the World Day of Prayer service held at the Roman Catholic Church. Miss Violet Bredt (nee Sampa) has returned to Zambia from Germany to a very busy ministry. Miss Malini Weerasinghe has returned to a very full programme in Colombo, teaching and training Sunday school teachers.

Pray for Deaconess Sala Kavarac as she completes her course at Alcorn College in Brisbane and later returns to Fiji.

An applicant from Korea has been chosen for next year's W.K.S. Pray she may get a visa and suitable arrangements may be made for her training.

The N.S.W. Unit is hoping that some means may be found for the applicant from Burma to be sponsored for training, as the Church in Burma needs trained women leaders. It was my privilege to meet Mrs. Lillian Tin Oo at the International W.W.D.P. meetings in Tutzing. She is one of the leaders in the Church in Burma and works in the University in Rangoon. Pray for her and her ministry on behalf of the W.D.P. She was delighted to hear the A.C.W. ladies were praying for Burma.

FELLOWSHIP OF THE LEAST COIN

Many prayers are offered by individuals and groups as "least coins" are set aside during the year. They are dedicated at World Community Day Services in October then sent to an international fund belonging to Christian women who participate in the ecumenical movement of prayer called The Fellowship of the Least Coin.

Applications are received from all countries by the International Committee based in Asia, which approves grants in the name of the whole Fellowship. Grants are allocated for: the International Committee's administration; block grants to regional ecumenical organizations of women; projects to any ecumenical group of Christian women; emerging opportunities; and emergency grants for unforeseen natural disasters.

The Committee may take the initiative in making allocations, but usually does not favour giving grants for buildings. Normally the grants allocated to any single project will not exceed US\$6000 and are usually non-recurring. The Fund supports programmes which promote evangelical and ecumenical concern for world peace and reconciliation.

Priority is given to programmes enabling women to come together internationally and ecumenically. Grants are given in many areas of the world to "Conferences of Churches" and the International Committee of World Day of Prayer. The total given this year is US\$251,700.

The luncheon on October 6, by the Ukranian Women's Association of N.S.W. (Lidcombe Branch) was a friendly gesture towards many women's organisations to avail themselves of the opportunity to learn something of the Ukraine, its history, its people and its culture. In 1983 they will be celebrating 1,000 years of Christianity.

The parade of national costume as worn by past royalty, nobility, the married and unmarried women of lower class varied from richly embroidered and jewelled brocades to equally colourful hand woven woollen and cotton materials of most feminine design. Tiny dolls were on display wearing replicas of the dresses, also boxes finely carved and attractive plates where each colour of a flower was baked separately.

All the food spread out on the table bore a flag proclaiming its name. Most present took a little of all and the variety and flavour were quite an adventure because one had no idea what it contained.

Donations given were presented to the National Council for Women, whose President, Mrs. Peters, expressed the gratitude of the Council and conveyed the delight of all present of the warmth of the hospitality extended by these women who are so anxious to share with other women's groups the rich culture they are preserving and the uniqueness of their nation's history.
