My Dear Friends,

Greetings and best wishes to each of you. How lovely the rain has been that has fallen on so much of our land in recent weeks - refreshing, life-giving rain to a dry and thirsty land. We lift our hearts in thanksgiving. I pray that you have also known the showers of God's blessing upon your soul.

I recently took an afternoon to visit the Art Gallery to view the Archibald Exhibition. I was fascinated by the different approaches taken by the artists to portray their subjects. Some were very real to life - almost like a photograph. Others were more abstract, the artist having chosen to depict certain qualities or characteristics of the subject rather than a real-life likeness. A number were self-portraits and many of these were subject to the interpretation of the viewer.

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### ASIAN CHURCH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE:

A report has been received from *Pat Walker*, National Convener for ACWC, documenting her trip to Cambodia in May for the Executive Committee Meeting of ACWC, which consisted of 9 executive members. A tentative program was drawn up for the quadrennial General Assembly to be held in Malaysia in October 2006. Other business dealt with included Scholarships, Tsunami Relief projects for Sri Lanka and India, healing and trauma counselling, disaster management and preparedness, the re-orientation of Tsunami victims to earn a livelihood, and other welfare concerns.

The final two days afforded opportunity to take part in a seminar for women on Micro Finance. The FLC program seemed to form quite a big part of this time. The following day was spent focussing on Gender Justice, particularly in relation to the fact that women are often denied their rights to equality before God, and also suffer domestic violence. The ladies were encouraged to read their Bibles as a love letter - not a newspaper. Jesus loves us. Our churches should be healing communities empowering women to take part in the ministry.

In ACW National News, mention is made that two ACWC Executive members have met with the women of Mongolia where they discussed the possibility of developing a relationship between the women of that country and ACWC. They were able to meet with key pastors of the Mongolian Evangelical Alliance.

On the home front, readers, I ask you to please ensure you have Sunday, September 25<sup>th</sup> marked in your diaries, when this year's Pleasant Sunday Afternoon is to be held at the Northside Baptist Church at Crows Nest. Government Bus Number 273 stops right outside the Church. For those coming by car, free parking is available all day Sunday in the Council Car Park behind the Church. Access to this Car Park is from Holtermann Street. The closest railway station is St Leonards but that is quite a distance to walk to the church. Afternoon Tea will **precede** the program at 2.45 pm.

### PAN PACIFIC & S.E. ASIA WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION:

At the President's Luncheon in April the speaker was *Sara Gaunt* from Oxfam (which now incorporated Freedom from Hunger and Community Aid Abroad). It is PPSEAWA's program each year to honour the International Year, and 2005 is the Year of Microcredit. Sara told of the work of Oxfam in times and places of disaster, especially since the Tsunami last December. By early February, Oxfam had raised over \$20 million. The short-term aim was to provide water, sanitation, food and shelter. The mid-term aim was primary health care, food and water. In the long term, the aim is rehabilitation - schools, roads, bridges etc. Sara spoke of the impact of the tsunami on women - many more women and children died than men.

In May, the speaker was *Jennifer O'Halloran* from NATSIEC. She works for the National Council of Churches, and spoke about Reconciliation, its history, needs and future paths. The three main projects of NATSIEC are 1. *Theology* - to explore Christianity from the perspective of Aboriginal people. 2. *Women* - attempting to develop resources to help Aboriginal women access help to further their communities. 3. *Youth* - to organise meetings to encourage the interchange of ideas and to look for future leaders.

Jennifer has held a series of talks, the first one in Redfern, entitled "Hearts Are Burning", to re-ignite and further the flame of reconciliation. She concluded her most interesting and challenging talk by saying that Reconciliation is important, because if we can't deal fairly with this country's original people, how can we deal fairly with others, such as refugees and people of different religions?

The speaker for the June meeting was to be *Linda Bartolomei*, whose subject was to be "Refugees in Australia" but this report is being written before that date.

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### **SPECIAL DAYS:**

For World Community Day in October, half the offertories are allocated to fulfil our Australian commitment to Asian Church Women's Conference. The other half of the offertories, will be shared between two Special Projects which have been selected by the National Executive, and these are as follows:

1. *Retreat Centre Parakaleo* in Sheffield, Tasmania, which offers Christian-based counselling and support to Tasmanians struggling with issues of suicide. Parakaleo means "to lift someone up and move them forward in a positive direction". The Centre receives no Government funding.

2. *After-School Programs for Indigenous Children* in Broken Hill, NSW. The Aboriginal Church connected with the Baptist Church wish to commence programs to provide useful activities as opposed to unhelpful free time.

One of the Special Projects for 2004 was *Kairos Prison Ministry* and a letter of thanks says "Please accept our appreciation and thanks for the kind donation in support of Kairos Prison Ministry. The money will assist us to sponsor guests at the next Kairos in Goulburn Correctional Centre in July and at the Kairos Outside in Canberra in October. Your donation makes a big difference. It will be spent entirely on providing for our guests, as team members will be self-funding. It will allow us to offer the program at no cost to our guests, as many could not afford to attend otherwise. The awareness that they are receiving the program as a gift facilitated by the wider Christian community helps them to appreciate that they can be loved by people they do not know and this can be a rare and precious experience. Your generosity will remind them that they are not truly alone and help them to celebrate this time with dignity."

### **SOCIAL ISSUES:**

*Fairtrade* Coffee (and Tea) are available at all Oxfam shops. When we buy this, the small scale farmers who grew it get a decent return for their work, unlike others who get paid 30% less than they did 15 years ago. Buying *Fairtrade* products helps them to afford the basics of life - food, shelter, health care and education for their families. Oxfam shops are listed in the telephone directory - there is a convenient one in Centrepoin in Sydney.

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### **A PLACE OF HOPE FOR DRUG REHABILITATION:**

For more than 20 years *John and Honi Reiffler* have been running a marvellous Christian program known as *SHERWOOD CLIFFS COMMUNITY CENTRE*, just 25 minutes from Coffs Harbour in northern NSW. The Centre takes men along with a family or two who come for long-term rehabilitation in a self-help farm location. Cows are milked, hens are raised, sugar cane is grown, along with horses, fruit trees and vegetables. The project even runs their own school so that staff members' children can stay at home. This has been referred to in an earlier Newsette. There has now been a new development. *Carol and Ian Harrigan* have taken over the running of Sherwood Cliffs, as John and Honi have moved to establish a similar centre for women on a property just 5 kilometres away. Because of the quality of their activities, there is usually a very long waiting list of people wanting to enter this remarkable community.
