



RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

We had a splendid working bee on 15th June (Queen's Birthday) when the third and last aisle of the Church was reconcreted. It was a treat to have so many willing workers and to all who came and helped we say a sincere "thank you". The new carpet will, D.V., be laid about the second week in August.

The Consecration Festival Services will be held on Sunday, 16th August the preacher at 11 a.m. will be the Rev. A. P. Wade, Rector of Coogee and at 7.15 p.m. the preacher will be Bishop Wilton, of Cobbitty. Both are well known to many of us. The Festival Tea to be held in our Parish Hall, will be on Wednesday, 19th August. The special speaker will be Canon H. M. Arrowsmith, M.B.E., Commonwealth Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. The Canon is a very gifted speaker and I am sure will have a worthwhile message on that occasion. Tickets for the tea 5/- each and will be on sale shortly. Please help us by buying your ticket early as it helps us in arranging food and accommodation for the Tea.

On Sunday, 12th July, we are to have a visit from the Rev. J. Coad, who is Warden of the Church Army Training College at Newcastle. Mr. Coad will be conducting a Mission in this Parish from 11th October to the 18th. I arranged over a year ago for this mission, before I realised what an impact the Billy Graham Campaign would have on Church life. However, it will be a good follow up to have this Mission in our Parish in October.

Confirmation classes have begun. I have about thirty names of young (and not so young) people who wish to be confirmed on Wednesday, 28th October in our Church. I am asking all candidates to attend the 11 a.m. services on Sundays when I give a short address to them on relevant subjects. Typed notes are given to all candidates. Bishop Hilliard will D.V. conduct the Confirmation Service.

You will be pleased to know that Mr. M. Boyle, who was recently knocked down by a motor bike and put in hospital, is now home again.

On Sunday, 14th June, at Evensong I was pleased to dedicate a pair of brass vases given by Mr. and Mrs. Ricketts in memory of their

son, Fred, who died a year ago. On Sunday, 21st June, I dedicated a new Lectern Bible, the gift of the relatives of little Warren Alexander Kidd, who died in June last year. Little Warren was a nephew of the Rev. A. E. C. Gardner, our Honorary Assistant. To those who gave these lovely gifts for use in God's House we offer our sincere thanks.

Contributors to the Weekly Envelope Scheme may find they have a new number in the July-September quarter. We have had to re-arrange numbers so please do not think a mistake has been made. 

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THE MOWLL MEMORIAL VILLAGE

The property, which has been purchased by our Church at Castle Hill, will be developed as a Memorial Village for aged people as a Diocesan Tribute to the late Archbishop and Mrs. Mowll.

A large home and six cottages, together with many other useful buildings, stand in lovely surroundings in the Hills District area. The Village is only 17 miles from Sydney and 7 miles from Parramatta.

The Mowll Memorial Village will be open for inspection each Saturday until further notice. Those wishing to visit the Village may go by bus from either Parramatta, Eastwood or Pennant Hills railway stations. Times of departure of buses may be found by telephoning as follows:

From Eastwood—Glenorie 81
 From Pennant Hills—YL 8632.
 From Parramatta—YY 1259.

Group inspections may be made during the week by 'phoning the Superintendent, Mr. Wilson (YA 2250).

The committee dealing with the Village had occasion to borrow £68,000 to complete the purchase of the property; but a condition of the loan is that it be repaid within twelve months. Negotiations with the Federal Government for the usual subsidy are well advanced. A further £35,000 is needed to cover our share of the cost of purchase, conversion and furnishings of the buildings to make them ready for the first fifty or sixty inhabitants. The Federal Government gives £2 for £1 on the capital cost of buildings and 1 acre of land for every twelve inhabitants. The cost of furnishings and running expenses is the responsibility of the organisation.

Parishes, parish groups, individuals, business firms, etc., may help to perpetuate the memory of our late Archbishop and Mrs. Mowll and at the same time provide a comfortable home for aged people in pleasant surroundings.

Donations to the project are allowable deductions for Income Tax purposes and may be forwarded to The Hon. Treasurer, The Mowll Memorial Village, Church House, George Street, Sydney.
