THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory.
26th July, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

The Forty-fifth Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church will be commemorated on Sunday, **August 15th** (which is the actual date of the Consecration in 1903) and the social aspect of that Commemoration will be marked by the Annual Festival Tea and Reunion on the following Wednesday, August 18th.

We again invite you to make our Consecration Festival a day of real Thanksgiving and Dedication. Thanksgiving for the vision and faith of those who built our Church, whose devoted lives have hallowed it, and whose gifts have enriched it; Dedication of ourselves to the work of further enriching our wonderful heritage, and handing it on to those who shall follow us, even greater than we found it. In these days men may, and do say, that they reverence Christ but reject the Church; yet in point of fact, how would they have known Christ had it not been for the Church's witness to Him? If to-day we feel in any way that He is of decisive significance, if we honour His Cross as our highest symbol, surely this is only because the Church has kept Him always in men's minds. Still to-day she is as active as ever in commending Him to men, offering Him to every people in their own language, so that often the Gospels are their first printed book. We are not attempting to excuse or to gloss over the sins and failings of the Church. We know that in days gone by, she has been guilty of religious persecution; she has impeded the growth of knowledge and failed to raise her voice in protest against injustice. Yet, in spite of her faults, she is still our mother, and we may not disown our mother for all her failings, just because we owe her so much. We should love our Church for what she may become, if she will but yield herself to God's direction and stand wholly at His service. In order to do this she needs your help and mine.

As the years go by, it is not so easy to preserve the "Back-to-All Saints'" character of our Festival. So many who delighted to come back to their old parish have passed on; yet there are still some who would welcome the opportunity to worship with us on that day. Please send any former parishioners you know a copy of this paper, drawing their attention to page six. You could also help considerably by inviting present parishioners, especially those who do not come regularly, and those who do not come to the Church at all. Above all, please remember the Festival Services in your daily prayers.

We ask that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally on August 15th; but if this is not possible, will you help by sending your box by some friend, or by leaving it at the Rectory **before** the Festival? An envelope for your special offering is included in this issue for the convenience of those who have no box. Last year we attained our objective of £200 for the Parish Hall Fund, and if we secure the co-operation of **ALL** our people, we shall do so again.

We hope, with your help, to maintain the high standard of our Annual Festival Tea on August 18th. Donations from parishioners who may be willing to give a table or a portion thereof and gifts in kind will be very welcome. Tickets (costing one shilling and sixpence, admitting you to both the Tea and Social Reunion) are now available, and may be purchased from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild, and may also be had at the Rectory. The early purchasing of these tickets will be appreciated, for it is by ticket-sales that the organisers estimate the numbers for whom it will be necessary to make provision.

I am receiving enquiries regarding Confirmation Classes; which point to the fact that some have not seen the statement in the July "Chronicle" to the effect that owing to the Archbishop's and Bishop Hilliard's absence at the Lambeth Conference, it is desired that as many Confirmations as possible shall be postponed until 1949. Although there will be no Confirmation at All Saints' this year, I shall be glad to have the names and addresses of those who intend to present themselves for preparation in 1949.

I am very grateful to the Revd. A. V. Hatters for his ministry during my absence, and to the Ven. Archdeacon North Ash, who assisted him; also to the Rectors of Christ Church, Enmore, and St. Augustine's, Stanmore, for their kindly assistance.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Consecration Festival, will be most welcome, and should be left at the Church not later than Saturday morning, August 14th.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

The Women's Guild.—On July 8 our meeting took the form of a Social Hour and was held at the Rectory. On July 22 the Rector led us in a Bible Study, "The Red-letter Saints' Days in June—a comparison"; bringing out interesting contrasts in the characters of St. Barnabas, St. John Baptist and St. Peter. This study was preceded by a short business meeting to make preliminary arrangements for the Festival Tea in August. It is the unanimous desire of Guild members to endeavour to carry on as our late President would desire, and we have therefore decided to organise the Annual Parish Tea. On August 12th there will be a business meeting to make final arrangements for this function, and also to bring in the results of our Two Shilling Trading venture. We hope the trading is successful beyond all expectations, for the proceeds are for our quota for the Parish Hall fund, for which we have raised £60 per annum for many years. Please note the date, August 12, at eight o'clock, and be sure to be present! All members will assist at the Parish Festival Tea on **Wednesday, August 18**. - (a) From Mr. W. G. Nutley, 15 Charlton Avenue, Dover, Kent:

"I write to thank you and the parishioners of your Church for their kindness and generosity in sending to my family a very much appreciated parcel of food. How much these parcels are appreciated you have probably already learned, and yet I do feel that the efforts made by you good folk should be made the subject of a really sincere expression of thankfulness on the part of the recipients; and I assure you that to receive such a parcel has been a great joy, and a good deal of relief to my wife. The fact that there are people to-day who are prepared to give both time and money to assist others, thousands of miles away, whom they have never met or known, does give one a little more confidence and assurance in a world which puts self first nearly all the time. During the war I had the good fortune on a number of occasions to be stationed on R.A.F. aerodromes in company with R.A.A.F. air crews, so that I have had some personal contact with your countrymen. May I take the opportunity of extending Christian greetings to your Church from the one here in Dover of which I am a deacon—the Congregational Church, High Street, Dover. . . ."

- (b) From Mr. H. F. F. Holt, 11 Squires Way, Buckland Estate, Buckland, Dover, Kent:

"My wife and I wish to convey our heartfelt thanks to your parishioners of All Saints', Petersham, for the wonderful parcel they sent. During the war I was with your countrymen in the Royal Air Force and they were a grand lot of fellows. Once again thanking you all for your great kindness."

- (c) From Miss Ellen M. Peirce, 16a York Street, Almshouses, Dover:
 "Will you please thank your parishioners for the lovely food parcel they so kindly sent, which was most acceptable. I am looking after my mother, an old lady who was 91 last January. She is quite early-Victorian, with white curly hair, and wears a bonnet. I take her to church every Sunday morning when the weather is fit. She has been living in these Almshouses for 22 years. Again thanking you for the lovely parcel. . . ."

"The Answer is There."—The London Annual Report of the British and Foreign Bible Society for 1947, entitled "The Answer is There," contains striking records of its expansion and work in all parts of the world. An excellent photo of Their Majesties, The King and Queen, Patrons of the Society, with the Royal Princesses, graces the opening pages of the book, under which is a quotation from Her Majesty's speech, on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the Bible Reading Fellowship at Westminster last year. This reads: "If through prayer and Bible reading we learn to live each day in the strength and power of God, we may well go forward with confidence and hope. . . . These are challenging days in the history of the world. A new era is struggling to be born, and what sort is it to be? We in our nation and Empire are called to give a moral lead to the world, and we can only do this if we are true to our great Christian traditions."

U.N.O. Children's Appeal.—The United Nations Appeal for Hungry Children was launched in churches of all denominations on Sunday, July 25. The Commissary, Bishop C. Venn Pilcher (in hoping that the Diocese will take its part in this Christian effort and will make a worthy response to this most urgent appeal) writes as follows:—

"As you probably know, the Australian National Committee for the United Nations is organising an appeal for money to help to save the needy children of the world. At the present moment thirty million children are facing death by starvation; another hundred million are stunted, undernourished, cold and homeless. The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund is asking Australia to contribute one million pounds. "In order to give you some idea of the need, I am copying a letter which I have myself just received from Germany. It was sent me by a family which has been ousted from its home in the east of Germany and is now living as refugees in the Russian Zone in the centre of Germany:—

"Eisenberg, 9/5/48.

"Dear Sir,—Kindly forgive my writing to you in this unwarranted manner, but our need is so great that I have overcome every reluctance of doing so. Trusting in the kindness of your heart I appeal to you in the name of our Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, to help us by sending us a little parcel of food. We have lost home and country and everything else we possessed this side eternity and are now fugitives living in the most primitive circumstances. We are short of food and clothing. Our little family consists of three: my mother, aged 75, is suffering from an inflammation of the nerves in both feet and hardly able to walk. I am at present laid up with inflammation of the gall bladder, from which I have suffered, off and on, now for five years, and my brother, who is a machine worker at a factory, is becoming wan and tired with over-strain and under-nourishment. His health, too, is beginning to be impaired. For mercy's sake, do not let me plead in vain.

"May I also, in the name of humanity and charity, solicit your kind help on behalf of two young friends, girls of 16 and 12, whose father has been missing for years, and whose mother, worn out with grief and care and underfeeding, is quite unable to cope with her work and her responsibility. The children are by nature healthy and active, but the hunger is beginning to tell on them, and alarming symptoms of decline are beginning to show.
