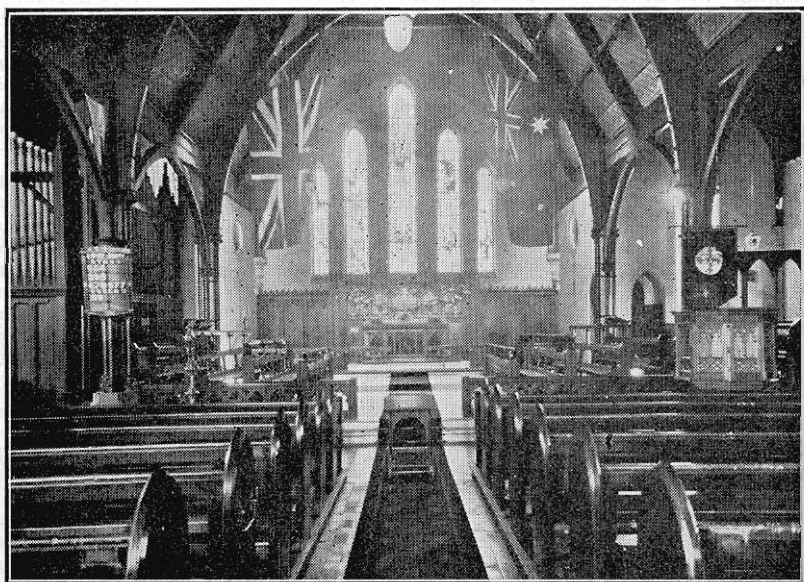

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

26th July, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

This month the thought of the Church, our own Parish Church in particular, will be uppermost in our minds, for we commemorate on August 17, the Forty-ninth Anniversary of its Consecration, when we come together for special Thanksgiving Services, recalling the vision and faith of those who built it 81 years ago, those whose lives of service and devotion have hallowed it, and whose gifts have enriched it.

Notwithstanding the indifference of many to the Church, there is still a considerable body of people in this country familiar through their upbringing with at least something of the Christian tradition. William Temple, the late Archbishop of Canterbury, has written, "If it seems to you that the Church as organised has somehow lost sense of proportion, remember that only through the Church has the Gospel ever reached you, and that only through the Church can it reach the ages far ahead. And you will do more service to the cause of Christ by bringing in what reality you can into its life than you can ever render by staying outside and doing what seems possible to you, or you and your few friends, in isolation."

Twenty years ago it was a comparatively easy matter to make this Festival a time of Re-union of past and present parishioners, and to observe its "Back-to-All Saints'" character. Many of the senior people who delighted to come back to their old Church have passed away; yet there must still be some who would welcome the opportunity of renewing old associations; and we ask that you will send any former parishioners the invitation in this paper to join with us in prayer and praise on August 17. You can help also by praying for our services on that day and by inviting all present parishioners to come, especially those who do not come very regularly and those who do not attend at all.

This year the Sunday School Staff is co-operating with me in an endeavour to make the 11 o'clock service on that day a **Family Service**, when parents are specially invited to attend and sit with their children. Surely there must be some in this Parish who would be willing to try to revive the old custom of fathers and mothers coming to Church with their families—a custom which has been lost largely through sheer apathy and indifference, resulting in grievous loss both to the Church and the nation. I quote again Archbishop Temple when I write, "If ever you catch yourself saying, 'I got no good from it, so I gave up going,' remember that only proves you were coming in the frame of mind in which you were not likely to get much good."

We hope that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally on August 17; but if this should be impossible, will you please send your box by some friend, or leave it at the Rectory **before** the Festival? An envelope for your special offering is inserted in this issue for the convenience of those who have no box. The laudable desire to decrease our interest bill (expressed at last Vestry Meeting) can be realised only insofar as we give liberally and enable the Churchwardens to do this.

With your co-operation we hope to maintain the high standard of the Parish Festival Tea on August 20. Donations from parishioners, who may be willing to give a table or a portion thereof, and gifts in kind will be most welcome. Tickets (costing two shillings and sixpence, admitting you both to the Tea and Social Re-union) are now available, and may be obtained from your District Visitor, from Women's Guild Members, and at the Rectory. The early purchase of tickets will be appreciated, for ticket-sales help the organisers to approximate the numbers for whom it will be necessary to make provision.

By the time this letter reaches you, Confirmation Classes will have commenced. Regularity in attendance is essential, and all candidates must be willing to place their preparation for Confirmation before all other engagements. Confirmation will (D.V.) be administered by Bishop Pilcher on Sunday morning, October 26, and the Confirmees will make their First Communion on Sunday, November 2, which will be our Patronal Festival.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Consecration Festival will be very acceptable, and should be left at the Church not later than Saturday morning, August 16.
