

Mission – Into all the world

Greg Anderson begins at Moore College this year as Head of the Department of Mission, the position Mike Raiter held until he became Principal of the Bible College of Victoria a year ago.

Greg and Mike have a number of things in common. They both have a strong commitment to world mission. They are both married with four children. They both served on Huskisson SUFM team in the early 1980s. But there are also some differences. Greg notes, “Mike has a wonderful gift for humour; I still remember how much we laughed during his Bible studies at Huskisson. He’s also taller. I’m still desperately searching for a joke book as I unpack the removal boxes. Mike served two stints as an overseas missionary; the furthest I’ve been offshore is a holiday in New Zealand twenty years ago.”

But Greg does come to Moore with a mission background. He has just returned to Sydney from the Northern Territory, where he was a CMS missionary for twelve years. For the first half of his time in the north he taught at Nungalinga College, the combined churches’ training college for the indigenous

churches. “The College is a diverse place,” Greg says. “During my time there, we had students from traditional Aboriginal and Islander backgrounds, as well as indigenous people from urban and rural areas. The theology teaching staff came from the Anglican, Uniting and Catholic churches. Most of the time we got along together very well, and were enriched by mixing with different people.”

From 2001 Greg began a new position as Aboriginal Ministry Development Officer in the Diocese of the Northern Territory. This involved travelling regularly out to the six Arnhem Land churches which were formerly CMS missions, and working with church leaders and others. There was something of a gap following the deaths, retirement or chronic illness of most of the Aboriginal ministers who had been ordained in the 1980s. “It has been a great encouragement over the last couple of years to have had godly people stepping forward, though often slowly, to accept responsibility for the spiritual care of their people after a process of thinking together with their whole church about what it means to be a Christian leader,” Greg said.

“So why come to Moore?” Greg acknowledged two particular motivations. **“First, there is a whole world out there that needs the good news of the executed but alive Jesus.** There are so many opportunities: evangelism, church planting, ministry training and theological education, pastoral ministry, Bible translation, caring ministries, student work, for ordained and lay people. It would be wonderful if Moore could ‘tithe’ (or double-tithe!) its graduates (even its Faculty!) for missionary service beyond Sydney. Secondly, there is a sense in which all Christian ministry must have a cross-cultural edge, not just across ethnic lines, but recognising that even within an apparently homogeneous community there will be many differences which we need to be aware of, and engage with, as we undertake gospel ministry.”

Please pray for Greg, his wife Annette, and their children, Paul, Zac, Lucy and Jane, as they settle into this new phase of life.

WHAT ARE THEY GOING TO DO?

JOHN WOODHOUSE – PRINCIPAL

What are the graduates from Moore College going to do? I can find no better way of putting it than this: Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ. (Colossians 1:28)

Him we proclaim. Our graduates go to proclaim the person of Jesus Christ. This is not simply an intellectual matter. We will only have proclaiming Christ at the centre of our thinking if we ourselves know him, love him, and trust him. Therefore the extent to which our graduates see these things properly will be reflected in their prayer life. To know, love and believe the Person of Jesus Christ will draw us to pray to him.

...warning everyone. There will be an urgency to it, for hostility to Christ, alienation from Christ, is all around us. What a solemn and serious thing we do! In a society that has embraced extreme relativism, in a climate of religious confusion and fear, in a time of anxiety about so many things from terrorism to climate change, in a church distracted by many things: Him we proclaim, warning everyone.

...and teaching everyone with all wisdom. Our graduates will teach the Bible precisely because that is how we proclaim Christ and warn everyone. The one we proclaim is the image of the invisible God. All things were created by him and for him. He is before all things and in him all things hold together. In his resurrection from the dead he is the beginning of the new creation, through whom God has reconciled all things to himself, making peace by the blood of his cross. These are not simple things for people to grasp. They are not self-evident truths. Teaching is needed. To proclaim him our graduates must commit themselves to being the best teachers they can be. They must study, think and prepare.

...that we may present everyone mature in Christ. All Christian ministry is focused on people. Our graduates must love the people to whom they go, and long to see each one "mature in Christ".

That is what they are going to do!

BRENDAN MCLAUGHLIN: Brendan, along with his wife Deb, serves at Christ Church, Mortdale.




STEPHEN MORRISON: Steve, along with his wife, Penny, is ministering at Willoughby this year.



MICHAEL PAGET: Mike has completed four years at Moore College and is working in congregational ministry and in chaplaincy at UTS.






ANDREW PATERSON: Andrew is ministering to the people at Mittagong. He and his wife Cecily would value prayers for their ministry and their family.

BREE STEDMAN: Bree has begun work as a high school teacher at Roseville College and will support her husband Peter in his ministry at St Andrew's Roseville.






