THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory.

Feast of The Holy Innocents, 1936.

Dear People of All Saints:

A Very Happy New Year to you all! The Old Year, as I write, is slipping rapidly away, and one cannot altogether avoid the solemnity of Retrospect. In pictures and cartoons the Old Year is always depicted as going away to be unremembered, and to be in history unloved, and the New Year is always pictured as one that is coming in full of hope. Everything, so it is supposed, is going to be quite wonderful in the coming year. We hope it may be so; but if good things are to dawn for us in this New Year, we need to go out and **Bring** them in. An old autograph-book tag floats into one's mind: "Luck waits for something to turn up; Pluck turns up something." The world won't get better just because we are full of hope. **We WILL** be full of hope, we **will** be full of courage, we will ask God that whatever may befall us this year, at least we shall not be found lacking either in hope or courage; but if brighter days are to dawn, (and there is no reason why they should not) we must get busy. We must take off our coats to the strenuous task of making those days brighter. Kipling sang.

"Our England is a garden,
And such gardens are not made
By singing 'Oh, how beautiful'
And sitting in the shade . . ."

I find in parish life so many are content to sit in the shade of Indifference—they are not in any way antagonistic to Christ and His Church, but they have been sitting in the shade so long that they have dropped into a non-churchgoing groove from which they do not seem to have the inclination, nor the courage, to raise themselves. I respectfully suggest to such that they make this New Year an occasion for rousing themselves from their lethargy and joining our family of worshippers which cannot possibly be complete until they come into it.

New Year's Day is a challenge to each one of us—it challenges us with the question: "How are you getting on in this great business of life?" What are you trying to make of it? Are you trying to make anything of it, or are you just drifting along anyhow?

You may be quite sure that there is some tremendous meaning in life, and that, behind all the changing scenes, there is the unchanging will of One Who is "working His purpose out as year succeeds to year." We have all got to face the question whether we are helping God's purpose, or whether, by our indifference and selfishness, we are hindering it—that is the challenge which a New Year brings particularly to each one of us. Life is carrying us on, swiftly and remorselessly, and there is so much yet to be done.

We look back on Christmas Day, 1936, with gratitude and thanksgiving. After many very trying humid days, we were blessed with a delightfully cool day for the Great Festival. Thanks to those who so kindly brought gifts of lovely flowers and greenery, and to the artistic work of the decorators—Mrs. Morris and Miss Adams—our church looked absolutely beautiful. The well-rendered Services were an inspiration, and were very well attended; we again record our thanks to our organist and choir for their good work during the Advent and Christmas Seasons. We are indebted once more to our good friend—the Revd. David Creighton—for his assistance at the three celebrations on Christmas Day.

Lent falls very early in the New Year, February the tenth being Ash Wednesday, hence notice is herein given of our Harvest Festival Thanksgiving Services on Quinquagesima Sunday, February 7th. I hope you will all co-operate in making this Festival successful.

A friend of mine sent me the following greeting at Christmas time. I like it so much that I pass it on to you as my wish for you all in Nineteen 'Thirtysseven:—

"May the Giver of Gifts give unto you
That which is good and that which is true,
The will to help and the courage to do,
A heart that can sing the whole day through:
Whether the skies are grey or blue,
May the Giver of Gifts give these to you."

He illustrated his statements with photographs of the subject.
