## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,  
24th September, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints',

On Sunday morning, October 30th, at eleven o'clock, the Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered in our Parish Church. The parents and friends of the Candidates are especially requested to be present at this service. The Candidates have been asked to invite their Godparents also, so that they may have the pleasure of witnessing their Godchildren assuming the responsibilities their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. If, by reason of distance, the Godparents are unable to attend the service, I hope they may be advised of the date and time, so that they may remember their Godchildren and the other candidates in prayer at the actual hour of their Confirmation.

Parents! These young people of yours need all the help and encouragement you can possibly give them. They go forth to bear their witness for Christ in an apathetic, indifferent, and in some quarters, even hostile world. They are well aware that they cannot hope to be true to their vows and uphold the Christian standard of life in their own strength. You can help them best by encouraging them to be regular in their church attendance, especially in making their Communions. What a tremendous help it would be if you would come with them! They have been reminded that we are not only individuals, fighting a lone battle, but members of a Church, a Body, a society, with all the added strength belonging to a corporate Body can bring. We should be proud of the ever-growing Church in all the world, with its heroes, leaders, thinkers and practical men. They need our co-operation, and by taking part in the worship and life of our Parish Church, by thinking things out and preparing thus for personal service in Church and State, and by the spirit of service in our daily life, we help our Church to grow.

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the eight o'clock Celebration on **Sunday, November 6**, which is our Patronal Festival. After the service they will attend the Communion Breakfast which is a fellowship meal, arranged to welcome these young people into full membership in God's great family—the Church.

As is our custom, we shall try to make our Patronal Festival a Reunion of those confirmed here during my incumbency. Each one concerned is asked to come to the Communion Service on November 6th, making it a time of Special Remembrance and Fellowship—**Remembrance** of their own Confirmation together with a re-dedication of themselves in the service of Christ and His Church; **Fellowship** with their younger friends, who will, on that day, be receiving Holy Communion for the first time.

Looking back over the pages of the Parish Confirmation Register is sometimes a depressing and discouraging business. Of course, it has encouragements, too; but, when one notes the number of young people, who, in the presence of God, renewed the solemn promise and vow made in their Baptism, and now seldom ever come to their Communion, who cannot even attend a Corporate Communion once a month, one is saddened and discouraged beyond measure. I am sure Confirmation **once** meant something to them, but now it obviously means nothing. No one would be so stupid as to denounce healthy recreation in its proper place; but when it is allowed to push God and His Church from their rightful position it is definitely **WRONG**. To use Dr. John Mackenzie's words: "No one to-day asks for a return to the hard and gloomy Sabbath of the Pharisees and their successors. But those who are wise will not go to the other extreme and advocate a Sunday in which God is left out of account. . . . If the modern world throws away the Christian Sunday, it will inflict a grievous wrong, not only upon the men and women of to-day,

but upon the generations that are yet to be. In the light of this solemn fact, we should examine ourselves, guarding our conduct most carefully lest, by thoughtless action or deliberate neglect, we help to undermine the foundations of our nation's greatness, to weaken the testimony and influence of the Christian Church, and to hinder the coming of the Kingdom of God."

An outline of the services arranged for All Saints'-tide is included in this issue, as our Patronal Festival will be observed on the first Sunday in November. We are hoping that our Parish War Memorial—The Stone of Remembrance—will be ready for unveiling and dedication on our Festival Sunday, but at the moment of writing we are unable to say whether the work will be completed by that date. Meanwhile, we shall be glad to receive further gifts for our Memorial Fund, which still lacks some fifty or sixty pounds of the required total.

It is not too soon to remind all parents of the children's Festival Service on November 13th, and to express the hope that many of them will come with their children on that day.
