Highlights of the past year could indeed stand up like toy soldiers and would pass muster with flying colours.

The service of dedication held in Wesley Chapel in May was a time of inspiration and renewed fellowship. We were charmed by our speaker, Deaconess Mok and encouraged by her inspirational words. During the service and at the luncheon following, the choir fed our souls as adequately as the food our bodies.

Valeri charmed us with her friendliness and sense of humour and impressed us with her integrity and dedication to her work and to her Lord.

This report is my last to you. I am grateful for the opportunity of serving in this office, for it has been one of the highlights of my life. Attendances at special days continues to increase and I have been honoured by organisers who have invited me to share in these services. Times of preparing the addresses and then sharing my faith have stretched my mind and given me opportunities for spiritual growth.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Council members of this unit, these faithful women, many of whom travel quite long distances month by month to enact the business of our unit. By their interest and their prayers I have been supported in a wonderful way. And what can I say in thanks to my Executive members? Every meeting with them has been a sheer delight and their friendship and support have been sources of strength. Especially I would like to thank the two members who are relinquishing office - Mabel Ward as Secretary and Elizabeth Walker as Treasurer have each made an indelible mark on A.C.W. in our State and our heartfelt thanks go to them both for what they have done in these positions.

### SECRETARY'S REPORT 1986

The past twelve months have been a time of consolidation by the N.S.W. Unit of Australian Church Women. Under the gracious leadership of Mrs. Edith Ridge, the meetings have been well attended and the aims and purposes of the A.C.W. maintained at all meetings including the Special Day Services.

Interesting visitors and speakers at the council meetings have included Miss Irene Voysey of the Bible Society, who gave a stirring account of the growing Prayer Circle of the Bible Society.

Four representatives from this Unit attended the National Conference held in Brisbane during August. Each one brought a report on some aspect of the conference at the August Council meeting. The theme, 'Living in God's Service' was both inspiring and challenging.

The current Winifred Kiek Scholar, Valeri Palang, from Rabaul, New Guinea was present at the September meeting when she spoke of her background, education and studies at the Alcorn College in Brisbane as well as the type of work she did with the village women of her country.

On 21st October a special meeting was convened so that members could meet the newly elected National president, Mrs. Dorothy Haensel. The purpose of this visit was owing to the cancellation of the Asian Church Women's Conference which was to be held in Adelaide in 1986. Mrs. Haensel clearly explained the financial difficulties of Asian women travelling to Australia.

For the November meeting, Christina Richards of Trading Partners presented the goods on display in an interesting and informative manner. These related to the conditions and changes which have taken place to people in the Third World. The ten per cent profit usually donated to our funds was not taken as we wished to donate it to this work.

The two special visitors at the February meeting in 1986 were Mrs. Joyce Bragg, president of the National Council of Women and the National president Mrs. Haensel.

Mrs Bragg was the main speaker and gave a clear and interesting outline of the history of the National Council of Women which began in Sydney ninety years ago. Celebrations are well in hand for this special anniversary. Mrs. Haensel was able to give further information regarding the conference held in Taipei since she had visited us in October. A special segment of this meeting was the presentation to Deaconess Mary Andrews of a Life Members Badge from the National Executive.

Appreciation on behalf of each member is expressed to the president Mrs. Ridge for the dignified manner she has conducted all meetings and the inspiration of her messages. To the treasurer, Mrs. Elizabeth Walker, who has handled the ever growing finances of this unit with skill and a strong sense of stewardship. The healthy position of the balance has enabled us to be generous in our giving to National projects e.g. \$500.00 to Partners with A.C.W.C. fund and \$200.00 towards the out of pocket expenses of Rathie Selveratnum when she attends a conference in Canada and the United States. We regret that our treasurer has been battling with a physical problem, and pray God will lay his healing hands upon her.

To the members of the executive who are faithful in all their commitments, the representatives of local branches who organise the Special Day Services, the representatives to other organisations, and for the loyalty of the council members including special groups, e.g. Y.W.C.A. and W.C.T.U. Thank you for making my work so fulfilling.

The generosity of your giving and service is like a lovely fragrance, a sacrifice that pleases the very heart of God.

### PUBLICITY REPORT

Also 'Good Morning Sydney' on Chanel 10 TV. A short biography of Mrs. Graham's background was also included.

We note with gratitude that the Vietnamese Church in Adelaide received a grant for 1985, and it is already known that the Nungalinga College for Aboriginal Women in the Northern Territory has been given a grant for 1986. These grants and many like them, given in differing circumstances on all continents, only become possible as women the world over, by prayer and supplication, seek to share with those who have become victims of wars, politics and famine.

Many Fellowships have written seeking information about F.L.C. and it is my privilege to send what I can. Executive and council members have also been willing to speak whenever asked. This year a new audio visual has been completed in Victoria with the help of the States, and N.S.W. have a copy on order which should be available on loan in the near future.

Remember, prayer knows no barriers, and our Heavenly Father is ever listening, so may we never cease to pray.

### WINIFRED KIEK REPORT

One of the dreams of the Interim Committee of A.C.W. twenty one years ago was to establish links with Christian women around the world especially in third world countries by inviting suitable women to come to Australia or go to some other country to get training and experience that was not available in their own country.

Since its beginning, the W.K. Scholarship has welcomed scholars from Africa, Asia and the Pacific who had contributed to the understanding of the members of A.C.W. of the work and witness of women in overseas Churches.

The 1985 Community Day offerings were given to assist Miss Kalpana Airan for the Karmalda Centre at Gatar, India, where a model project has been set up to educate illiterate mothers at the same time as the children and to enable them through handi-crafts to support the family.

Miss Valeri Palang completed her course at Alcorn College in Brisbane and has gone to the New Hebrides to face the challenge of work among women in the islands. Her joyous Christian witness was an inspiration.

Miss Catherine Min, the 1984 scholar has sent greetings from South Korea, where she is engaged in work with the Mothers' Union.

The principal of the School of Nursing at the Holy Family Hospital in Karahi is involved in Campus Crusade, Youth for Christ, Women's Fellowship and Nurses Christian Fellowship, of which she is president.

One of the highlights of the work of Barkat Das has been conducting a seminar on the 'Four Spiritual Laws' guiding people as to how to become Christians and grow in their spiritual lives.

We rejoice with Malini Weersinghe, 1981 Scholar, from Sri Lanka who was married on 3rd August, 1985 to the Anglican Minister, Reverend Yohan Devannanda, the Director of the Lay Institute of the Theological College of Sri Lanka.

In the Institute Malini finds much scope for the use of the skills and training she developed while in Sydney. In August she is planning a residential Ecumenical Conference for Sunday School teachers.

Our prayers are asked for the very grave situation in Sri Lanka, where many people are dying and suffering as a result in that Pearl of the Pacific island.

We have been looking forward to having a scholar from Burma, a country with which we have been a prayer partner. Miss Stella Lin has been chosen as a scholar but is going to be allowed to leave Burma for only three months later in 1986. Pray that God may overcome all the problems and that Stella may gain much from coming to Adelaide for study.

Dr. Sushila Rao of Madras, India, was sent \$209 which she needs for materials in the work she is doing among drug addicts. She is producing a paper called Phoenix to help in the work of drug rehabilitation.

The Winifred Kiek Travelling Fellow in 1984, Mrs. Eunice Kim, has had a very busy year as executive secretary of the Asian Church Women's Conference and as executive member of the International Executive of World Day of Prayer, which is holding the quadrennial meetings in New York in May 1986.

Mrs. Rathie Selveratnum, the second Winifred Kiek Travelling Fellow, has been invited to the Centenary Celebrations of the Women's World Day of Prayer in New York in May. She was the first president of the W.W.D.P. committee and a former president of the Asian Church Women's Conference.

We thank the Lord for His servants who serve the Lord and bring Him Glory.
