RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

The Consecration Festival Services and Festival Tea and Concert were a great success, and all who helped are to be congratulated on the success of the function. The Tea Meeting was very well attended and it was indeed good to see so many sit down to the meal in the Parish Hall. The friendly spirit manifested by all made the Tea a very happy event. The ladies again did a marvellous job, and they were helped by the men folk, and members of the fellowship. The Fellowship lads did a splendid job in preparation and clearing up. I know that you will be happy to learn that there will be a profit of over £40 which will help the general funds of the parish considerably. The Organ Recital in the Church by Mr. Rowland Eagar, assisted by Mrs. Frank Gunner, was enjoyed by a large congregation. Evensong followed with the sound film, "The Man Born to be Blind." This picture gave a very faithful portrayal of this Biblical incident, and was appreciated by all. The Concert in the parish hall afterwards was very good, and we are grateful to Mr. Eagar, Mrs. Sayers, Miss Robinson, Mrs. Gunner, and Mr. Ron Thurgood for their splendid items, and also for the gift of their services: indeed a good donation to our funds. The amusement caused by the screening of an old silent film of Charlie Chaplin, in the "Stage Hand," brought a memorable evening to a close. I do want to say to all who helped by taking tables, boiling water, sending in donations, in money and kind, and preparing for this Festival in many ways, how grateful Mrs. Johnson and I are to you all and will you please accept our thanks.

During the evening opportunity was taken to express our thanks to the Rev. H. Linton, and to the Rev. Bert Gardener for their work in the parish during the vacancy. It gave me great pleasure to present them both with a book as a small token of our esteem, and thanks to them both. It was also good to see Mrs. Adams present. Mr. F. W. Johnson, of Johnson's Bakery, donated all the bread rolls, and Mr. E. Brooks donated the milk: we are grateful to these gentlemen for their interest and for their gifts.

We must now work on and endeavour to interest more people in our Church and in the Kingdom of God. What a wonderful difference it would make if every Church of England person in Petersham came to church and made an effort to bring at least one person with them. There is no reason why our Church cannot be filled each Sunday. Surely we could meet once a week as we did on Wednesday of the Festival and as we did at the Services on the Festival Sunday. We need to worship together more frequently, to strengthen our spiritual life, and in these days of crisis to know how we stand with God; in our worship, especially the worship of the Prayer Book, we have a wonderful opportunity of seeing what the true spirit of prayer is; we see the best kind of worship offered to God, in the liturgy of our Church we are all called upon to take our part, with the clergy: as we do so we discover that our Prayer Book is thoroughly Scriptural. On Sunday mornings, at 8 a.m., I am giving a series of talks on the Holy Communion service, and shortly, in the evenings, I hope to begin a series of addresses on what might be termed a Modern Pilgrim's Progress: we need to know more about our Bible, our Faith, and Church. What does the Christian Faith mean to you? Will you come and find out. A very warm welcome awaits you at All Saints. A special service for young people will be held at All Saints on Sunday, 26th September, at 11 a.m.: a special invitation has been extended to Rovers, Scouts, Cubs, and Girl Guides to attend. I trust that all parents will endeavour to attend with their children.

IRRESISTIBLE POWER

Two thousand years ago there lived a Man. In a small, unimportant country He lived His simple life, never in contact with the world leaders of His day, almost unnoticed by the historians of His time. What can He have to do with us in our driving, 20th-century, mechanised world of today, in our high-pressure offices, at our noisy ostentatious cocktail parties, in the stress and worry of trying against rising costs to make a living or support a family?

That Man—Christ—manifested with convincing force, as nobody else in history has ever been able to do, what God—the great God who made the world—is like. He revealed God, the all powerful, as a Being of supreme love—all gentleness, as understanding as a human Father, Prophet souls before Him had coupled God with supreme power, but never with supreme tenderness and love, as Christ did. Profound insight—or audacious folly!

This revolutionary conception has upset kingdoms and changed the course of empires. It has generated more irresistible power than any other force in history. Great armies, incomparable arrays of material strength, have not been able to withstand it. Today, twenty centuries after His death, His unforgettable words still ring across the world with resurgent, revitalising power.—Francis B. Sayre.

A FAMOUS HYMN: "ABIDE WITH ME"

For 25 years the fishing port of Brixham, in South Devon, had for its Rector a man called Henry Francis Lyte. He was always in poor health and when a little more than 50 years of age he realised that he was dying of consumption. He felt the sadness of having to leave his work unfinished and prayed that, before he died, he might be able to write something that would live on after he was dead. In one of his poems called the "Declining Days" he wrote:

" O Thou Whose touch can lend
Life to the dead, Thy quickening grace supply,
And grant me—swanlike—my last breath to spend
In song that may not die."

Never was a prayer more wonderfully answered. The Sunday came when he was to minister to his people at Brixham for the last time; on the advice of his doctor and friends he was about to leave the country for a warmer climate, and was extremely weak. He preached his farewell sermon to a congregation of broken hearted friends—the fishermen of Brixham and their families—begging them to put their hope and trust in the Sacrifice and Death of Christ. When the service was over, he went back home. Later the same evening—his daughter tells us—he put into the hands of a friend the words of a hymn he had written which began "Abide with me." He meant it to be a prayer of preparation for death, not an evening hymn, as many suppose it to be, as can be clearly understood in the following verse:

Swift to its close ebbs out life's little day,
Earth's joys grow dim, its glories pass away;
Change and decay in all around I see;
O, Thou, who changest not, abide with me.

SUGGESTIONS FOR CHRISTIAN ACTION

In reply to the question: What can I do?

Are the needs of old people in your neighbourhood looked after adequately? Are there old people living alone who need shopping done? Blind people who would like to be read to now and again? Old folk who would welcome a companion for a 'bus ride or a shopping expedition?

Are the needs of the young people looked after adequately? Are there sufficient clubs? Are youths and girls moping about the streets on Sundays with nowhere to go? It is not enough to say they should have something better to do—see that they have.

What of breaking marriages? Do parents with small children have a chance to get out together, in the evenings? Is there a scheme for "baby-watching" in the district to make this possible?

Are Christians in your district who have children at school playing their part on parents' committees. Are there such committees attached to your schools? If not, why not?

What can be done to reduce the appalling number of road accidents? Isn't it a challenge to Christians that local authorities have to hire paid servants to see school children across the roads?

Is the Christian voice heard at local meetings where important decisions are made? For example, at Trade Union meetings; at party political meetings, etc. What can you do to see that Christians are there on the spot at such meetings and that they play a full part in them?

What is your local newspaper like? Can you stimulate useful correspondence from time to time? Is it being misused—if so, what can you do about it? Are Christians in your district taking full advantage of opportunities available?

Has your local public library a representative selection of Christian books? Have you any suggestions for good books that might be added?

Have you a hospital in your neighbourhood? Is the Management Committee doing a good job? Would the Chaplain (possibly the local vicar) welcome any help? Although visiting the sick in hospital is not a job that can be done by everyone, there are often many ways in which a Christian group can be used for the help and benefit of both patients and staff.

Is there in your district, waste of time and material, which you can help to counter?
