Dear People of All Saints,—

We will remember with thanksgiving the Holy Week Crusade conducted by Captain Cowland, from Palm Sunday to Easter Day. We have been encouraged by the well-maintained attendances throughout Holy Week, and by the obvious interest and reverent attention of those who came to the daily services. I believe the Mission has been the means of blessing to many in this parish. I pray that it may be the means of strengthening and confirming the faithful and that many who perhaps had become slack concerning the things that really matter may be encouraged to come back into the great family of the Church. Above everything, it should inspire us all to do more than we have ever done before in the service of our Lord Jesus Christ. Christianity is essentially something to be done, and it is only by DOING that anyone can know what it really is. I am afraid we have

not always regarded the Christian religion in this way; we have discussed it, tried to define it, admired it or hated it, worked up emotion over it, and even quarrelled about it; but it remains true that it is essentially something **TO DO**.

People sometimes tell us that they have "never done anybody any harm"; they seem to be content with this negative way of living, but the really important question is, "Have you ever done anybody any good?" No one who calls himself a Christian, that is, a follower of One "Who went about doing good," can be satisfied with living negatively.

The Missioner has left with me some copies of the Church Army's Remembrance Card, which I shall be pleased to hand to those who have received blessing and made resolutions during the Mission, if they desire to have something by which they can remember the Holy Week Crusade.

The Mission concluded with memorable and inspiring Easter Day services. It has been a pleasure to work in happy fellowship with a Missioner of such wide and varied experience as Captain Cowland, and we shall long remember his vivid and forceful presentation of the Gospel message. He takes with him our gratitude, and is assured of our prayers for, and interest in, the work of the Church Army in Australia.

We desire to thank **ALL** who contributed in any way to the success of the Holy Week and Easter services, including once again, our friend, the Rev. David Creighton, whose assistance at the celebrations was invaluable.

Elsewhere in this issue you will see a preliminary programme of St. Andrew's Cathedral Centenary Celebrations, from May 16 to May 22, which will be of special interest to all Anglican people. I have a few special vouchers for sale at 10/- each, which the purchaser exchanges for a complete set of tickets, giving admission to all functions including one performance of the pageant, thus effecting a considerable economy. Application for these vouchers should be made to me at once, as the supply is limited. An attractive button is also on sale for 1/-, which is being sold to advertise the Centenary. This button does not admit to the Centenary functions, but its sale will help with preliminary expenses.

Please note the date of the Easter Vestry meeting, Wednesday, April 14. I hope we may have a good representative attendance at this important meeting. I specially invite those who were stallholders at last year's fete to come, bringing with them their helpers. I suggest we do not have a fete this year, and I would welcome the opportunity of placing before you another plan for raising the moneys required for our Parish Hall Fund.

All Saints' Sunday School.—During the past month we were pleased to welcome a number of new scholars to the school, and our work has gone on steadily. Y.C.I. Chronicle Report.—Since the annual meeting in February the Y.C.I. has been delighted to initiate some seven or eight new members who, formerly, were not affiliated with any of the organisations of the Church. It is pleasing to report that they fully entered into the spirit of the Institute and expect to draw many benefits from their membership. The Institute is, fundamentally, a permanent and effective link between the young men of the parish and the Church itself and on this account it is gratifying to note that its numbers have been steadily increasing during recent months.

The first meeting in the Y.C.I. year was, in accordance with the usual custom, devoted to impromptu speeches. Impromptu speeches are a very popular item on the syllabus because of the willing co-operation of members, and the one in March was as enjoyable as its predecessors. Many topical subjects were discussed, as well as matters relating to the parish and the Institute's own affairs.

As the Bucks' Music Night, set down for March 19, fell on the eve of Holy Week, a more serious note than usual was introduced. As well as a number of the Y.C.I.'s popular choruses, a number of well known hymns were sung and some classical solo items were rendered.

Members are reminded of the annual motor picnic to take place on Saturday afternoon, April 17. All those intending to make the trip are asked to notify the social committee.

To supplement the Parish Hall Fund, the first Y.C.I. dance and card evening this season will be held in the Parish Hall on Saturday, May 29. All members and friends are asked to assist in making the function successful.

The Pageant.—The Pageant at the Broughton Centenary last year was of English and Australian Church History. The Pageant this year will be of Early General Church History, with scenes from the Early History of the Church in England and in Australia.

The Broughton Centenary Choir.—The Choir consists of a great number of parish choirs and includes several hundred voices. Amongst other musical works the Choir will render "Festgesang," by Mendelssohn, and "100th Psalm," by Prout. This Choir will be remembered for its excellent performances in connection with the Broughton Centenary Celebrations held last year.

Season Tickets.—A limited number of special vouchers, price 10/- each, are now available and can be purchased through the Rectors of the parishes or direct from the Centenary Office, Church House, George Street, Sydney. These are to be exchanged for a complete set of tickets which will admit the patron to all functions, including one performance of the Pageant, thus effecting a considerable economy.
