THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

28th July, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

The day of our Consecration Festival draws very near, and I hope we may have the utmost co-operation and support of every parishioner in all that is being arranged to mark the occasion. Sunday, August 17, will again be observed as "Back-to-All Saints" Sunday, and I trust you will contact all the former parishioners you possibly can, to ask them to worship with us in their old parish Church on that day. As a means of economy in times when paper must be conserved, there will be no special invitations issued this year. Please send your friends this paper, which draws their attention to page 5, on which the arrangements for the Festival are set out in detail. You may also do a good piece of work by inviting present parishioners—especially those who do not attend Church regularly and those who do not come at all. Also, will you please remember the Festival Services in your daily prayers?

This letter conveys a special invitation to all men of the parish who are communicants, to be present at the eight o'clock Celebration on August 17, and to avail themselves of the Fellowship of the Men's Communion Breakfast which follows. You will be glad to know that Bishop Hilliard (who is, as many of you know, an "old boy" of All Saints', Petersham) has consented to speak at the Breakfast; and that our good friend, Bishop Pilcher, will be with us at Evensong. Additional interest will be given to the eleven o'clock Service, at which I hope to unveil and dedicate a beautiful window (the work of Mr. A. C. Handel) in memory of our late beloved Churchwarden—W. P. Bannan. This window will complete the stained-glass work in All Saints' Church, and is the gift of Mrs. Bannan and family.

Those who have collecting boxes which were issued four months ago (in lieu of a fete) will please return them on the Festival Sunday, August 17. For those who have no box, there is a special envelope issued with this "Chronicle," in which you are asked to place your special offering, and bring it to Church on the same Sunday.

The Festival Tea and Social Re-union will be held on Wednesday, August 20. Our Annual Parish Tea has been most successful in every way, and has been so very greatly appreciated in days gone by, that those responsible for its organisation feel they have a high standard to maintain. Even allowing for the many essential calls made upon us, we feel this can be done. Donations are requested from any who may be willing to give a table or a portion thereof, and promises of donations in kind will be very welcome. Admission to the Tea and Social Re-union will be by ticket, which costs one shilling, and is now available from the members of the Women's Guild, from your District Visitor, or from the Rectory. You will readily understand the significance we place upon ticket-sales; for only in this way can we hope to approximate the number for whom it will be necessary to provide. It will therefore help us if you purchase your ticket so soon as possible.

Confirmation Classes commence during the first week in August, as already intimated. Will those who wish to be prepared please fill in the special form provided in the July "Chronicle," and return it to me immediately? Do not defer Confirmation if you are eligible for it this year; for it is unlikely that there will be a Confirmation in this parish in 1942. It is most essential that candidates should put their preparation classes before all other engagements, and attend regularly. The formation of an adult class will, of course, depend upon the demand for it.

You will regret to know that Mr. Ridley concludes his ministry at All Saints' at the end of this month, having accepted the Assistant Chaplaincy of the Sydney Mission to Seamen, where he commences duty on September 1st. Mr. Ridley came to us upon his Ordination to the Diaconate on March 3rd, 1940, and was priested on March 2nd of this year. During the past 18 months he has been a faithful and loyal colleague, and I am sorry

to lose him. He takes with him our good wishes for his new sphere of service.

At the moment of writing I see no prospect of appointing a successor to Mr. Ridley. If it be not possible to secure the services of a full-time colleague, I shall have to be content with occasional help; and this will mean that some work will have to be suspended temporarily, particularly some of the public school classes.

It would seem that war is coming nearer to our own land. Anyone who thinks at all in these days must surely be forced into a position where one realises that we must have something more than material help. Our mood is akin to that of the Psalmist who prayed, "O be Thou our help in trouble, for vain is the help of man." The very magnitude of our problems leads us to the belief that God is speaking to us to-day. In the midst of these revolutionary times a new order is being created: what it will be like depends largely upon ourselves. Now, as always, God works through men; but the trouble is, so many of us are not prepared to allow God to work through us. Even to-day, after nearly two years of devastating war, you will still find many who think that man, by his own efforts, can make this world a better world.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

The Choir.—Despite cold weather, the Musical and Dramatic Entertainment was well attended on 22nd July. Fine singing by the Metropolitan Orpheus Male Choir and delightful piano playing by Miss Vailla Pender provided extremely enjoyable music. In two farces, members of the Choir disclosed unsuspected aptitudes for play-acting. To these artists and to all those who contributed in various ways to the success of the evening, our best thanks are given. The financial result will be about £11 nett.

The forthcoming Ruri-decanal Choral Festival, on September 9th, and the music for the Consecration Festival (17th August) are mentioned elsewhere.

Jubilee of New Guinea Mission.—This year, 1941, the New Guinea Mission keeps its Jubilee. It is exactly 50 years since the pioneers landed near the plateau of Dogura on the north-east coast. To-day there stands on that old fighting ground a great concrete Cathedral, built by the natives themselves under the supervision of one white man. The New Guinea Mission has been described by one who has travelled far in many lands as "One of the Best Bits of Work going on in the World to-day."

We are asked for special Thankofferings to mark the Jubilee on August 10th. If you can help, please hand your donation to the Rector, or place it in the special box in the main porch of the Church, before the above date.

A Festival Tea to mark the Jubilee is being held in the Lower Hall of the Chapter House, Sydney, on Monday, August 11th. There will be two sittings—at 5.45 p.m. and at 6.30 p.m. Tickets are 1/3, and may be obtained at the Rectory. After Tea there will be a Service of Thanksgiving in the Cathedral. It is hoped that All Saints', Petersham, will be well represented.

C.M.S. Medical.—The Rector has received the following letter of thanks from the Acting General Secretary, C.M.S.:—

"It was good of you to send the cheque for £7/11/4 (Seven pounds, 11/4), in time to be included in the results for this financial year, and we now enclose receipt for the amount of the Medical contributions from All Saints', Petersham.

"Will you please take an opportunity of conveying to all who have helped in this way, our very sincere thanks for their share in the work

of our doctors and nurses overseas. We are hoping it will be possible to again send the boxes, but even if there should be difficulty and delay about this, we shall at least be enabled to make certain remittances to help with the purchase of drugs, etc., in Tanganyika and elsewhere."

Women's Guild.—There has been much sickness and sorrow amongst our members, and we wish to express our sympathy with Mrs. Gray, who has lost her father, and Miss Darke, who has suffered the loss of her brother, Mr. Robert Darke, of Leura. We hope our prayers and thoughts may be of some comfort to them, and we hope to see them soon with us and sharing in our activities. On July 24 the Rector gave us one of his Bible studies, always so interesting and enjoyed by all. Visit of The Archbishop.—His Grace The Archbishop regrets that he cannot be with us on our Festival Sunday, but he has promised to preach at All Saints' on Sunday, August 31, at Evensong.

C.E.N.E.F. (All Saints', Petersham, Branch).—Since our last report we have been very pleased to welcome as members to our Branch, the Misses Glanville and Mottram. On July 3 we held a Grocery Evening and the Cathedral Hut benefited greatly; tins of fruit, bags of flour, breakfast foods, etc., being handed in. A football was also given to Padre Grace for the boys at Ingleburn Camp. We have been notified by Mrs. Mowll that the Royal Navy is making an appeal to help the gallant inhabitants of Malta, who have suffered from more than six hundred air raids. The S.D.C.A. has decided to have a stall, in connection with the appeal on August 1. Gifts of cakes, sweets, fruit and vegetables will be very acceptable. At the last meeting of our Branch, 13/- was collected for cakes. The S.D.C.A. is also arranging sleeping accommodation for forty men. The cost of equipping a bed is £6. To aid this movement our Branch is holding a Games Evening on August 7, admission 1/-. Each member has also promised to raise by that date at least 5/-, and by these means we hope to be able to provide one of the beds. We spent a busy evening at our last meeting, sewing up parcels in calico to be sent to our boys abroad. We have also knitted up three pounds of Air Force wool for C.E.N.E.F., and from our own wool—7 pairs socks, 7 skull caps, 5 pairs mittens, 4 scarves, 2 vests, 3 balaclavas; and also made 5 small pillows and 4 elbow rests for hospital use.

We wish to thank all who have given donations, both in money and in kind, thus enabling us to make our work worth while.
