Rector's Notes

My Dear Friends,

Last month I promised to supply more details of the Festival Dinner. The date as you'll remember is Friday, the 12th of August — the Friday nearest 15th August, which is the date of the Consecration of All Saints' Church back in 1903. That means that we are marking the 74th Anniversary of that event. Our Dinner has for some years been one of the highlight of the year in the Parish.

This year we'll welcome as our special guest, Ald. John Gillroy of St. Peters. Mr. Gillroy is not only a very active local resident involved in community and welfare affairs, but is also a responsible member of our mother church — St. Peter's Cooks River. He plays an active part in the Church's Committee which has concern for relating the Christian Gospel to the Inner City Area in which our parish exists. So he comes to us with close associations and considerable experience of the kind of situation we at All Saints' find ourselves involved in.

Also at the Dinner we'll have the pleasure of hearing Mrs. Maureen Smee (interestingly from our daughter church of All Souls' Leichhardt) whose singing has charmed and delighted several of our people who have already heard her.

Tickets for the Dinner are available from members of the congregation — \$1.50 for adults and 50c for children. Just ask—and bring your friends along with you! I do appreciate the encouragement of your support.

It is with joy that I can report that the Lord has been blessing our faithfulness in not closing the evening service. At the new time of 5 p.m., our numbers have about doubled since the change. It's a confirmation to me of the way in which our Lord honours those who honour Him.

The theme for August at All Saints' then may well be The House of the Lord. Back in the Bible we find that the conclusion of man's work in building the Temple was the beginning of God's work. Men have lavished means and muscles on building a beautiful majestic structure—but they didn't stand off viewing their handiwork and say "We have created a glorious Temple".

No—it was the house of the Lord. God must move in. So the Ark of the Lord, symbolising God's meeting with His people on the ground of atonement, was brought in by the priests. When the ark had been placed the glory-cloud filled the house. It was the same when Moses erected the Tabernacle in the wilderness. "The cloud abode thereon and the glory of the Lord filled the Tabernacle".

Today do you go to church ONLY because the building is beautiful —or ONLY because it is your custom or duty — or ONLY to hear a popular preacher? Or do you go there because there, away from the noise and nuisances of life, you behold His glory and hear His voice? As you leave God's House are you able to say "Did not our hearts burn within us, while He talked with us . . . and . . . opened to us the Scriptures?"

THE CHURCH BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

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STORY OF A HYMN

O LOVE THAT WILT NOT LET ME GO:—George Matheson

“Doon the wa’er”—for any Scotsman means a trip down the lovely Firth of Clyde from Glasgow and out to the broader waters that lap the coast of Arran.

All the stopping places for the steamers have their associations and their own special beauty—Kilcraggan, Kilmun, Dunoon, Wemyss Bay, Rothesay, and little Innellan. Just at the point where the Firth begins to widen into the sea loch Innellan stands. It is a memorable beauty spot in summer, and it once had for its parish minister George Matheson, the author of this poignantly beautiful hymn.

George Matheson was blind from childhood. But his student days in Edinburgh, where he graduated in 1862, were brilliant in academic achievement. It was on a summer evening in 1882 at Innellan that he had the sudden inspiration to write the hymn under the stress of a deep personal bereavement. He was in the Manse, and said afterwards that the hymn was composed in only a few minutes. At least it seemed like that to Matheson who said that he was in "mental distress" and that the hymn was "the fruit of pain."

It is one of the most personal hymns in the English tongue, and has ministered to the triumphant sorrow of many thousands.

I lay in dust life's glory dead,
And from the ground there blossoms red
Life that shall endless be.

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PAUSE A MOMENT

I will always remember a 20-year-old boy who died of leukemia. He was a professional golfer and had many friends. Each week, for three years he came to the city for injections, and never failed to call on me. The thing that impressed me most was his peace of mind, and the way in which he accepted this sickness. He often joked about it, and went out of his way to help others. In fact, even on the day of his death, he asked me to thank all the nurses in the hospital who had taken care of him. What was his secret in life? And death?

He used to say things like this: "Mix up one part of forbearance, two parts of tact, add a concentration of peoples' virtues instead of their faults. Sweeten the whole with plenty of humour, sprinkle words of kindness for flavour and serve hot with a warmth of human sympathy and understanding."

That was the way he lived, and died. Getting along with sickness is difficult for some, and to others getting along with people is even more difficult.

"Lord help me to remember every kindness done to me, every promise made. Let me forget each kindness that I may do, as soon as I have done it. Amen."

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FETE ARRANGEMENTS


Fete Day this year is November 19 and everything that has to be done by this time has been arranged. At present we need someone to run the Plant Stall and someone to run the Refreshment Room.

Hardly a week goes by but one reads in the newspapers of some missing person. It is a divinely inspired selfless love which draws one to spend himself in love for his fellowman, in the name of God. Remember the "degree of lostness is not sinfulness but awayness". We all need to be brought home to God.
