THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

27th September, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

On Sunday morning, October 26th, the Sacred Rite of Confirmation will be administered by Bishop C. Venn Pilcher in our Parish Church. To this service the parents and friends of the candidates are specially bidden. Wherever it is possible, the godparents of the candidates should also be invited, to witness their godchildren taking upon themselves the promises their sponsors undertook for them in the Sacrament of Baptism. If, by reason of distance or any other cause, the godparents cannot attend the service, I would ask that they may be informed of the date and time, that they may uphold their godchildren and the other candidates in prayer at the actual hour of their confirmation.

Parents! I want to remind you that these young people of yours will need all the help and encouragement you can possibly give them, as they go forth to bear their witness for Christ in an apathetic, indifferent and even hostile world. They have been taught that they cannot hope to be true to their confirmation vows and uphold the Christian standard of life in their own strength. They do need your prayers and all the encouragement you can give to help them to be regular in their Church attendance, especially in making their Communions. The very best, the most effective and the greatest encouragement is the example of parents who **will come with them**. They have been taught also, that they are not just individuals fighting a lone battle, but members of a Church, a Body, a Society, with all the added strength that membership in a corporate Body can bring.

A modern army consists of three parts.—General headquarters, lines of communication, and the fighting units, often called the front line. The people at G.H.Q. have a threefold task: (1) to plan the campaign, (2) to issue orders, (3) to supply the fighting strength with food, ammunition, etc. It is the duty of the men in the front line to keep in touch with G.H.Q., so they have what are called "lines of communication," which consist of aeroplanes, lorries, wireless sets, field telephones, and so on. In the battle of life the Bible teaches us that God has promised to do three things—(1) to plan the campaign, (2) to issue our marching orders, and (3) to supply us with our equipment and fighting strength. We have our "lines of communication" just as truly as any other army. In the Bible we can find our marching orders. In the Holy Communion service we are given spiritual food to keep us fighting fit. When we worship in God's House we not only get in touch with Him, but also share the comradeship of our fellow-soldiers in the great army of God. When we pray we not only get guidance from our Headquarters, but also obtain much spiritual strength. The purpose of these lines of communication is to keep us in touch with God every day. But we must **use** them: we must make them lifelong habits.

The newly-confirmed will make their First Communion at the 8 o'clock celebration on **Sunday, November 2**, which is our Patronal Festival. After that service they will come to the Communion Breakfast—a fellowship meal at which we welcome these young people into full membership in God's great family—the Church.


As is our custom, we shall make our Patronal Festival a Reunion of those confirmed here during my incumbency. Many have left the parish, and some have become careless and indifferent. If **you** should be one of the latter this is a good opportunity to start again. Each one concerned is in-

vited to attend the Communion service on November 2, and to make it a time of special remembrance and fellowship—a reminder of your own confirmation, and a re-dedication of yourself in the service of Christ and His Church; fellowship with your younger friends, who on that day will receive Holy Communion for the first time.

As our Patronal Festival will be observed before another "Chronicle" can reach you, notice of the services arranged for All Saints'-tide is included in this issue.

Surely all loyal All Saints' people will want to be in their parish church at All Saints'-tide!
