Dear Friends at All Saints',

"Thank you for your air letter of 23/8/'51, which I found awaiting me at the Bank on return from Scotland. We had a very enjoyable three weeks and found Scotland as 'bonny' as they claim it to be, notwithstanding the fact that some days were marred by rain. We went up through the English Lakes District and stopped awhile at Carlisle to see England's most northerly Cathedral, which is small but attractive. Working up the west coast we came to Oban, from which we visited Iona on a perfect summer day. Thence to Aberdeen, with the lovely Deeside scenery, to Pillochry and Callender from which we saw something of The Trossachs. Then down to Stirling and Edinburgh and back into England to Newcastle-on-Tyne, taking the opportunity of seeing Durham Cathedral and visiting Whitby Abbey. After one night in York, we came to London by train, for our last fortnight here.

BI-MONTHLY NOTES

New Guinea.

The Right Reverend the Bishop of New Guinea, writing of the visit of His Grace the Primate to New Guinea, says:—

"The Primate's Visit.—It has been a wonderful privilege and joy to us to have the Primate and Mrs. Mowll with us at our Diamond Jubilee Celebrations. I am writing at the end of the Commemorations at Dogura and before those at Gona have taken place, and I do so with a full heart as I think of all that his visit has meant to us, his own wonderful graciousness, kindness and understanding, and the way in which he has entered with us into the spirit of our Commemorations. It has been an inspiration to all and I feel a very great blessing to the Church in New Guinea that he should be able to come to us at this time and he and Mrs. Mowll have won the hearts of all, both brown and white."

House of the Epiphany Missionary Training College.

Miss Margaret Young, B.A., who has been the Warden of the House of the Epiphany during the past six years, has resigned as from the end of August.

Miss Edna Holland, LL.B., has been appointed as Acting Warden until the end of the year, or until a permanent appointment is made. Miss Holland, a Westralian, who has practised as a solicitor, has done youth work in the dioceses of Perth and Adelaide and is at present doing a course in Social Service in the University of Sydney. The Board at its recent meetings decided to make the college co-educational and to insist on our men, as well as women, doing the necessary training.

Bishop David Hand, writing from Popondetta, says:—

"My ten weeks in New Britain have been valuable to me for getting a better hold on the problems there and the various differences as between there and Papua.

I brought out two Papuans to train at St. Aidan's College, and eight of the brighter small boys from Harold Thompson's School to do higher education at Gona. Four of them may even achieve the Martyr's School in 1953. As soon as possible I must go down to Menapi to go into Norman Cruttwell's mountain country with him. We are opening up there amongst a big population of heathen folk about three or four days' walk from Menapi."
