WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLAR – YEAR 2001

The Trustees are delighted to inform you all that we have been able to choose next year's Scholar. We had to delay our decision due to the political unrest in the South Pacific Area. She is **Miss Celestial Lusi** of Honiara in the Solomon Islands. Aged 33, she has been sponsored by the Roroni Women's Fellowship Group of the South Seas Evangelical Church, which is an inter-denominational organization. Celestial will be undertaking her final year of her Diploma in Theology at the Christian Leaders' Training College of Papua New Guinea and the South Pacific. Copies of her Student Semester Reports for her first two years' study are excellent. Her ministry so far has included working with women and children within the women's fellowship and her local church, and her sponsors assure us that they will be all working together to encourage the use of her new skills at the conclusion of her study.

In accepting the Scholarship on behalf of Celestial the Fellowship Secretary's letter said in part, 'I wish to heartedly express our most sincere thanks and unspeakable joy for your considerable approval and select Miss Celestial Lusi as the Winifred Kiek Scholar for the year 2001. Yours is indeed a tremendous assistance which we believe (is) God's providence for us and her. You are truly investing into the eternal kingdom in edifying God's church. The beneficiary of your funding is not only Celestial, but also the Women and churches of Roroni association at large.'

During my communications with the sponsor, I was told that Celestial was so excited that after she had heard the news she couldn't sleep! She is so very grateful for our assistance. May we all pray that her country will continue to return to normal and that she will be able to undertake her studies in New Guinea without any delays or problems.

News from Sue Nitrai – this year's Scholar.

In a letter just received Sue tells us that she has been very busy the last few months catching up with her study following the time taken off immediately before and after her Father's death. However, she feels confident that her year will finish without too much interruption. CENTENARY OF WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE WESTERN AUSTRALIA – 1999

In 1999 under the direction of the Minister for Women's Affairs, in conjunction with the Women's Policy Office, many celebrations took place to recognize that women in Western Australia have had the right to vote for 100 years and the positive role women play in all areas of life.

Many special events were held which highlighted not only the progress that has been made but also the areas that continue to disadvantage women.

Twice, during the year, organizations and districts throughout WA applied for grants allocated by the Government. Most of these were A\$5000 or less for projects such as gazebos in gardens in recognition of women pioneers, historical photos

displays, histories of women, art exhibitions, research, seminars, etc.

The main project by the WA Government for the year was the upgrading of the Pioneer Women's Fountain and Gardens in Kings Park. Organisations were invited to submit applications for inclusion in a 'Historical Walk' stating what they believed their group had done to promote the role of women over the years.

ACW (WA Unit) put in a submission and was accepted for inclusion in the project. One of our member's Guild group had closed a couple of years previously and they had given A\$200 to our funds which we had kept for a special project, so we only had to add a small amount to cover the cost of the A\$240 for the brass plaque.

The upgraded Pioneer Women's Fountain and Pool was extended down the hill in a series of mini water-falls to a new Water Garden and Gazebo which was officially opened in November 1999. In the path around the Water Garden, brass plaques were inserted inscribed with the organisation's name and a brief statement.

Earlier in the year we had been asked to provide a banner, which was displayed at some of the special events. On the day of the opening of the Water Garden, all the banners were displayed along a fence, which made a very colourful and interesting display. ACW were proud to be included as one of the Christian groups among the other secular groups who participated in this project as well as other activities during the year.
