## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

27th March, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints,

This paper will be ready for distribution on Palm Sunday—the first day of Holy Week, when once again we are called to pause and contemplate God's great love for us and for all mankind. Holy Week is a call and challenge from Christ to the world: "Is it nothing to you, all ye that pass by?" Wherever Jesus on the Cross has been truly lifted up, men have seen there the very heart of God, and in the light of that vision have turned with loathing from their sins. The Cross was not something that simply had to be, because it had long been fore-ordained in the councils of heaven. The Cross arose out of a real human situation, and was set up by real human hands, from real human motives, out of an evil determination to rid the earth of this disturbing Jesus. Nevertheless, Jesus went to that Cross quite deliberately, always the victor, never the mere victim; and He did so for the same reason as in the first place He left the carpenter's shop to go preaching, teaching and healing, that He might win men to God and His ways, by showing to them how wholly worthy of their full hearts' trust and devotion, God eternally is. On the Cross, against the dark background of man's sin, He was able to live out the love of God in such flaming colours, that, ever since, men have not been able to mistake it or escape it.

Insofar as you possibly can, will you keep Holy Week free from all social engagements, so that you may be able to observe it as a holy week and take advantage of the opportunities your Church provides for meditation and prayer? I especially commend to you the Three Hours' Service on Good Friday. You may think this is a very long service, but it really is not; and, in any case, you are not bound to remain the whole time if you find you cannot, provided you leave during the singing of a hymn so that no one will be disturbed by your departure. I do ask that you will range yourselves on the side of those who are trying to preserve this most sacred day. Do not allow yourself to be side-tracked by so called popular opinion and do not drift with the side of popular behaviour. We need all our courage to take the offensive and offer a real challenge to much careless life and thought around us.


We still have a good deal of the original Palm Sunday religion with us—it was then, and is now a sentimental, mass-emotion religion that judges by numbers, parades its popularity and chants "Hosanna" on the road to Calvary. It is a religion of moods and catch-words, a religion of pleasant emotions which you must not disturb, a kind of "no trouble" faith. Never, I believe, was the Christian Church face to face with such terrific antagonisms as it is to-day—fierce nationalism, fanatic communism, stark paganism. And with all their fallacies these things are producing in the minds of crowds of people devoted loyalties and sacrificial self-giving. The Church cannot meet that with emotional "Hosannas," with luke-warm convictions and half-hearted loyalties. The only religion that will meet the world of our day and that will satisfy our hearts is a commanding, challenging, incredibly difficult faith, that convinces the mind, captures the heart and transforms the life. We need to pray "that we may know Him and the **POWER** of His Resurrection" for it is only through the power of the Christian Faith that we can hope to solve the almost overwhelming problems of our times. Easter Day is the assurance that through pain and sorrow, through failure and death, through loss and defeat, God can bring the good cause to victory for those who trust Him. It is because of this that we can and do wish you ALL a Holy, Happy Easter.

Our Lenten Boxes and Envelopes for the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society are to be returned on Easter Day.

We should be glad to have gifts of white flowers for the Easter Festival. Some may, perhaps, like to give some in memory of loved ones who have passed on. #### MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

**District Visitors.**—At the close of another financial year, we wish to give a special word of thanks and appreciation to this loyal company of Church-women who render, month by month, an unspectacular but very worthy service to their Church. For the year ended 31st March, 1944, they have collected £314/14/9 for the General Fund and £36/17/6 for the Assistant Clergy Fund, making a total of £351/12/3, which is a record for any year in the history of the parish. We know this is achieved through the support of those parishioners who give, and it does show the value of small amounts regularly subscribed, but it represents also a vast amount of patient service willingly rendered by the Visitors. We do not quote these figures as being the only feature of the district visitors' work; they render a very valuable service in keeping in touch with parishioners, in welcoming new people to the parish, in reporting cases of sickness or trouble, and in generally assisting the Rector by a work which simply cannot be measured in terms of money.

We are grateful to Mrs. Whiting for undertaking Mrs. Gill's District whilst the latter is prevented by ill-health from visiting.

**Music in Holy Week.**—We would specially direct the attention of all our parishioners to the Tuesday in Holy Week, April 4th, when the choir, assisted by some former choristers and friends, will sing Maunder's Cantata, "Olivet to Calvary." The soloists will be Mr. Oliver King (Bass) and Mr. Lance Jeffree (Tenor).

**Women's Guild.**—The quarterly rally of the Guild was held on Thursday, March 9th, at 3 p.m. At the service in the chapel the speaker was Miss E. C. Glanville, who gave a most interesting and provocative talk on the trend of things in the present day, especially in family life. It was good to have Miss Glanville with us again and renew our friendship with her. A social time in the Parish Hall followed, when members of Miss D. P. Brown's group entertained at afternoon tea. The annual meeting of the Guild was held on Thursday, March 23rd. There was a good attendance of members. The Rector was in the chair. The Secretary's report and financial statement showed a splendid year's work. The sum of £152 had been raised during the year, and after disbursements to missions, parochial needs, and the Parish Hall Quota Fund, etc., there was a balance of £9 odd. Much appreciation was expressed in the report, of the Rector's kindness in sparing time, out of his exceptionally busy life, to give such splendid Bible studies every month. These studies were most helpful. All officers were re-elected. With regard to the Group Leaders, we are sorry that Mrs. Grant will not be able to continue in this capacity this year, a position which she has carried out splendidly for some time, but Mrs. Morton has kindly consented to act in Mrs. Grant's place, and the Guild is very grateful to

her for filling this vacancy. Mrs. Brennan voiced the thanks of the meeting to the secretary for her efficient reports and for the enthusiastic way in which her duties have been carried out during the year. The members were pleased to hear from their former treasurer, Miss Watson, and to know that she is gradually regaining her strength after her long illness. She has a very warm place in all hearts. At the close of the meeting the members of the executive entertained those present at supper.

**Good Friday — Procession of Witness.**—The march from Sydney Domain to the Cathedral will commence at 4.20 p.m. Parishioners are urged to attend in order that our witness may be a worthy one. Parishes will be grouped in rural deaneries. This Parish is in the Rural Deanery of Petersham. All taking part in the procession should assemble as soon after four o'clock as possible. It is hoped our Parish will again be well represented.

**Parish Hall Fund.**—At the last meeting of the Parish Council it was decided to again use the box method of reducing our Parish Hall debt, in lieu of a fete. Boxes will be available on Easter Day, April 9, and will be recalled on August 20 (our Consecration Festival). This period is approximately twenty weeks, and if 200 parishioners took a box and placed in it only one shilling per week, the Churchwardens would have the £200 they require. Yes; it is as simple as all that, IF EVERYONE WILL HELP BY USING A BOX! This concerns ALL parishioners, particularly the younger ones, who have the benefit of a spacious hall; and, therefore, should shoulder at least some of the responsibility of helping to pay for it.
