THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
25th June, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints',

It is a lament of most parochial clergy that Christian homes are a diminishing force in the nation's life. I think many who have the responsibility of teaching young people in Sunday Schools would say that, in many cases, they miss the backing of an interested and friendly ally in the home. That being so, it brings a greater challenge to those whose privilege it is to prepare young people for Confirmation. I am therefore seeking the utmost co-operation of parents and guardians who have to do with those approaching confirmation age. Most parents naturally want the best for their children to fit them for life in the material sense; how much more important it is to see that they are trained in the much more lasting things which build character! Obviously parents cannot decide the important question of Confirmation **FOR** their children; but they can do much by their interest, encouragement and support, to help them in this matter. Those amongst you who are godparents should be reminded of the solemn charge given you in the Service of Baptism: "Ye are to **take care** that this child be brought to the Bishop to be **Confirmed by him . . .**"

That prompts me to say, in passing, that I find there is a good deal of uncertainty regarding the number of godparents required at Baptism, or even if they are really necessary at all. The Prayer Book distinctly says, "And note, that there shall be for every male-child to be baptised two Godfathers and one Godmother; and for every Female, one Godfather and two Godmothers."

Next month we shall be observing the 42nd Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints. Now is the time to begin getting in touch with former parishioners to invite them to join with us at one or more of the special services being arranged for the Consecration Festival on August 19. Notwithstanding all the difficulties of rationing, we hope to be able to have the Annual Festival Tea on Wednesday, August 22. We should be glad to hear from those who would be willing to donate a table or portion thereof, and also from those who would be willing to co-operate by acting as hostesses at the Tea.


On our Festival Sunday—August 19—the boxes now being used (in lieu of a fete) will be returned and presented. A Special Envelope will be provided with the August "Chronicle" for the convenience of those who have no box. There are only a little over six weeks remaining in which to finalise our efforts for the Parish Hall Fund. Last year we received over £200, and the Wardens hope we shall maintain or even exceed this record!

Winter conditions, together with prevailing colds and influenza, usually mean a decrease in Church attendances, especially at the Early Celebrations and Evening Services. It certainly needs a little more effort to turn out for eight o'clock Celebration on a cold morning, or to leave the fire and radio in the evenings; but I wouldn't like to think you younger people are incapable of making it. The Church is not merely a building, it is a society of people. Without a church, without a centre of worship, without some means by which people may express and develop their relation to God, God is not really honoured. The Parish Church is the house of the Lord; the trysting-place where God and man meet; the house of prayer where God speaks to man and man to God; where the Good News is preached and the Sacraments are administered. Even to those who seldom or never enter it, the Parish Church is a silent reminder that man comes from God and goes to God, that he cannot live by bread alone. To those who love it, the Parish Church is their spiritual home, giving stability, regularity, fellowship to religion.

We welcome to All Saints' Miss Margaret Young (formerly Principal of the Dornakal Diocesan High School for girls, Bezwada, India), who has recently succeeded Miss Herring as Warden of the A.B.M. Training Hostel in this Parish. We pray that her work in the responsible office to which she has been called may be greatly blessed; and that she may be very happy in it.

I am grateful to those clergy who took services during my absence on holiday: the Reverends A. E. Gardner, Graham Delbridge, W. H. Edwards, J. R. Le Huray, Tom Jones, and Chaplain Mottram; also to the Rector of St. Augustine's, Stanmore, for his ministry during the same period.

The Rector's Letter to those approaching Confirmation Age.

Dear Girls and Boys,

The time has come round again to begin the formation of preparation classes for Confirmation; and I want to have a word with those among you who are fourteen, or who are nearing your fourteenth birthday.

Confirmation is approached by special training and preparation and instruction for those who wish to take the Christian life seriously, and, by the service of "Laying on of hands" to become full members of one branch of Christ's world-wide Church.

It is possible, of course, for a boy or girl to be a Christian without being confirmed. But no boy (or girl) can be a complete and happy and useful Christian without joining himself definitely to the comradeship of other Christians, either in the Church of England—as in your case—or in some other branch of the world-wide Christian Church. It is quite impossible to play football without joining with others; if you want a game you must join a team.

So, special classes are held to show you what the Christian religion means. They lead up to a definite public act in the Service of Confirmation, which admits us to responsible membership of the most wonderful Society in the world—Christ's Church. It gives us, as fully privileged members of that Church, the greatest help anybody can receive to enable him to live the life he really knows to be best and happiest—the Christlike life. This help is given to us through the service of Holy Communion, which confirmed people are privileged to attend. It is a very great honour and privilege to become a full member of the Christian Church.

Confirmation comes to our help at a time in our lives when we specially need it. We are growing up, and that means that in mind, body and spirit we are obliged to face new temptations, challenges and difficulties, as we try to form a sound character and a sound outlook on life.

If you accept this invitation to join the preparation classes, please hand to me, before July 31st, your full name and address, your age, and the date of your Baptism. This is important, as you cannot be Confirmed unless you have been Baptised. Classes will commence next month; for Boys on Tuesday, August 7, and for Girls on Thursday, August 9, both classes being held at the Rectory and commencing at 7.15 p.m. It is most essential that you should attend **regularly**.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

The Archbishop's Winter Appeal.—His Grace, The Archbishop, writes:—

"As the result of the generous response to my Winter Appeal, I have now been able for several years to provide the means for some added and very necessary comforts for hundreds of Old Aged and Infirm persons each year. I feel sure that this Christian enterprise conducted in the name of our Church will again commend itself to your congregation, and I shall be happy to receive donations for it. Rectors of our poorer and congested parishes write to say how much the help of this fund means to them in meeting the unusual demands of the Winter months."

We commend this appeal to our people. The Wardens will be pleased to send any donations received through the offertories; these should be specially marked "Winter Appeal."

Personal.—It was a real joy to the Bicknell family and to Roy's many friends to be able to welcome him home on June 17th after more than four years in enemy hands. It was also a great joy to welcome Roy to the fellowship of the Church which he has attended from boyhood, in which he was Confirmed and from which he went forth to serve in the A.I.F. over five and a half years ago. Before commencing the Communion Service on Sunday, June 24, after he had said a few words of welcome, we joined with the Rector in the General Thanksgiving, giving humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God; especially remembering those who are still prisoners of war; and praying that the day may not be far distant when they, too, may be restored to their loved ones.

Women's Guild.—The Quarterly Rally will be held on Thursday, July 12, at 3 p.m. in the Chapel and afterwards in the Parish Hall. The guest speaker will be Miss Emily Clark from New Guinea who will speak on "The Educational Side of Work in New Guinea." An invitation to be present is extended to all women of the parish, to which we hope there will be a large response, especially as the appeal for our third £100 has been launched.
