THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
25th October, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

This morning Bishop Hilliard laid his hands upon thirty young people and five adults in the Sacred Rite of Confirmation. It was both a privilege and a pleasure to prepare some who had not been confirmed in their earlier years; I wish more adults would avail themselves of the opportunity of becoming communicant members of their Church. It was a great thrill for the Bishop to confirm our candidates where he himself knelt to be confirmed fifty years ago, on All Saints' Day, 1903. There are still with us two parishioners who were confirmed here on the same day as the Bishop.

We thank the Bishop for his addresses which we feel sure will be remembered by the candidates and, indeed, by all who heard them. The text chosen this year is Proverbs, Chapter 3, Verses 5 and 6: "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy paths." The confirmees should be able to look back upon this beautiful Service with joy and thanksgiving.

Just how much the Confirmation Service has meant to these young people will be evident as time goes on, when we look back over the Confirmation Roll for 1953 and find how many of them have remained loyal to their vows. We commend them to you, asking that you will remember them in your prayers, and that you will help them in every way you can to become regular and faithful communicants. Because the Christian way of life is difficult, some become discouraged by their failures and give up trying. But God does not expect us to go in our own strength. Discipleship begins by trusting Christ for life and strength. In the Holy Communion Service He not only provides an eternal reminder of the love which made Him die for us, but also gives a means of grace by which we can be linked with, and strengthened and refreshed by Him. In this service we do not only pledge our loyalty to the Best Friend of all mankind, but we pledge our lives anew in His Service, as well as remind ourselves of the love He expects us to radiate among our fellow-men.

As you approach All Saints' Day you may like to recall the well-known answer to the question, "What makes a Saint a Saint?" It is, "Because they were cheerful when it was hard to be cheerful; patient when it was difficult to be patient; because they pushed on when they wished to stand still; they kept silent when they wished to talk and were agreeable when they wished to be disagreeable. That was all!" The Saints would certainly add that it was their Lord who inspired them and gave them the courage to be cheerful, patient, persevering, considerate and charitable. Saints were not, as some suppose, born Saints—they became, or were made, Saints, because with unswerving and consistent purpose they chose the one way of obedience to God—the way of sacrifice and self-surrender.

There will be a day of continuous prayer for the Missionary work of the Church on Saint Andrew's Day, November 30, commencing with a Service of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and concluding with Evening Prayer at 5 o'clock. It may be a little more difficult this year, the day being a Monday, but we hope you may be able to spare an hour or two. If so, please put your name down for the period you will be available, and so help to maintain the continuity of prayer throughout the day.

HOLY COMMUNION AND THE RECENTLY CONFIRMED

The period which seemed so long when we commenced our Preparation at the beginning of August has passed very rapidly, the Confirmation Service is over, and you are on the threshold of a new life.

It helps to think of Confirmation as your special ordination or equipping with strength by God for your life's work. Just as the Queen when she is anointed at her Coronation is given grace to rule, or a Bishop at his Consecration is given grace for his high office in the Church, so you, at your Confirmation, are given grace for your life's work, which is to be a member of Christ, the child of God, and an inheritor of the Kingdom of Heaven, and ever manfully to fight under Christ's banner against sin, the world and the devil, and to continue as Christ's faithful soldier and servant unto your life's end. In this way, Confirmation completes the process begun at Baptism: but it **must not be the end**; it is a **BEGINNING**.

It is significant that the Epistle for the Sunday you were confirmed (Trinity XXI) is Ephesians VI. 10, "Be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might." Read this Epistle often, or better still, learn it: it is the picture St. Paul gives us of the Christian's conflict and the Christian armour. For this conflict we need to pray each day: "Strengthen me, O Lord, with Thy Holy Spirit, that I may continue Thine forever, and daily increase in Thy heavenly grace more and more . . ." There is no discharge in this war against evil. As the special hymn sung at your Confirmation says:

"He, His mighty arm extending,
Still hath power from sin to save,
Though thy warfare hath no ending
But the grave."

In our Preparation classes great stress was laid upon the importance of **REGULAR** attendance at Holy Communion. Make a rule about how often you go, and try to keep it. You may come as frequently as you wish, but **never allow your attendance to become less frequent than once a month**. There are what we call "Days of Obligation," when it is the duty of every communicant to be present: Christmas Day, Easter Day, Ascension Day, Whitsunday, Trinity. You should also make a special point of attending on Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, and Maundy Thursday, the day of the Last Supper and, therefore, the anniversary of the Institution of Holy Communion; also on Saints' Days whenever possible.
