THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory, 30th October, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints,—

The beautiful and impressive Service held on Sunday morning, October 22, when Bishop Pilcher confirmed thirty-six candidates, will long remain in the memory of those who were present, particularly those who were then admitted to full membership of the Church of England. The Bishop's address was based on portion of I John V: 4: "This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith."

The testing-time for these young people begins now. I hope and pray that when I look over my Confirmation Register this time next year, I may be able to say that every one of these 1944 Confirmees has remained loyal to his or her Confirmation vows. Let us remember we are not only individuals, but members of a Church, a Body, a Society. We should be proud of the ever-growing Church in all the world; its heroes and leaders, thinkers and practical men and women. They need our co-operation, which we can give by taking part in the worship and life of our Parish Church, by thinking things out and preparing for personal service in Church and State, and by the spirit of service in our daily life—in these ways we help our Church to grow. For all this, we need to keep fresh and vital our own contact with the Holy Spirit and with Christ the Leader, who is always available. The Epistle for the Twenty-first Sunday after Trinity, the day on which the confirmees made their first Communion, is beautifully appropriate. Read it again, and read it often (Ephesians VI: 10-20).

Our Patronal Festival was a particularly memorable one this year. The Bishop of Tasmania (the Right Reverend G. F. Cranswick) was the celebrant at Holy Communion (assisted by the Rev. M. C. Newth, Headmaster of the Cathedral Choir School, and the Rector). Afterwards the Bishop spoke to the Confirmees at the Communion Breakfast and preached at Matins, when he gave a fine address on "The Great Company," of the Epistle for All Saints' Day. In the evening, Bishop Robin, of Adelaide, paid his first visit to All Saints', and we shall ever remember his outstanding sermon based on his dramatic description of a sheep-dog trial, with its telling and practical application to our way of life as members of Christ's Church. We are very grateful to both Bishops for their help at our Festival, and in expressing thanks may I say that they both joined with me in appreciation of the music and the consistently good work of our Choir throughout the day. We are indebted also, to the ladies who provided and prepared a very good breakfast and to those who so kindly made the "family meal" possible by their donations.


We are approaching the end of the Church year, December 3rd being the first Sunday in Advent, and the commencement of a new ecclesiastical year. On that Sunday evening we hope to offer our special gifts for Reconstruction and Advance in the Diocese of New Guinea. You will remember that we have set ourselves the task of finding an additional hundred pounds per annum for three years for this purpose. Last year we received £106, and I have no doubt that, with your help, we shall attain our objective this year.

A tribute such as the following is more than sufficient to show what we owe to the Church in New Guinea. It is taken from an article which appeared in the A.B.M. Review for September, and was written in appreciation of the Rev. Vivian Redlich, who died by enemy hands on Buna Beach; he died because he remained true to his trust. The writer says: "May I be permitted to express my lasting appreciation of the heroic and truly Christian spirit that was shown by the whole Anglican Church in New Guinea during those dark days of '42, and right down to the present moment. I am not an Anglican, but the fact of being a Roman Catholic does not prevent me from expressing my deep appreciation of Father Redlich's

heroic conduct. Of him alone have I written, but I knew them all, and for their attitude in those dark days I admire them all. Their memory will never die in Papua. Their sacrifice will not have been in vain." On Sunday evening, December 3rd, the Ven. Archdeacon North Ash (Home Secretary, A.B.M.) will be the preacher at the special service for the presentation of our offerings for New Guinea—a practical piece of evidence that their memory has not died in Petersham either, and that we desire to do our share in helping to rebuild their shattered mission stations upon a sacrifice that can never be in vain.

We are saddened indeed by the news of the sudden death of The Archbishop of Canterbury, one of the outstanding leaders in the Christian Church of our day. He has given the Church such a fine lead, especially in these war years, and by his courageous utterances, both spoken and written, has helped us to see the magnitude and urgency of post-war problems, that one cannot but feel that his passing will be felt not only by our own Communion, but also by the whole Christian Church throughout the world.

HOLY COMMUNION AND THE RECENTLY CONFIRMED.

In the preparation classes great stress was laid upon the importance of, and necessity for **REGULAR** attendance at Holy Communion. In order to help each Confirinee to become a **regular communicant**, a certain specified Sunday every month has been allotted to each candidate.

This does **NOT** mean that you may come **ONLY** on the Sunday assigned you. You are welcome to come as often as you wish, and you should certainly be present at the Great Festivals of the Church. The Special Sunday is suggested in order that it may help young communicants to attend regularly. **You should never allow your attendance at Holy Communion to become less frequent than once a month.**

C.S.O.M.—The next meeting of the Group will be on Tuesday evening, November 7, when Miss B. Thomas will come to give us the benefit of her experience in establishing a Children's Library. We are working towards that end, believing that a Library, with its associated activities, to be one method of educating the child to use leisure profitably, and thus going a good way towards a solution of the problem of a rapidly increasing child delinquency.

"The Knights of Malta."—On Thursday evening, December 7th, at 8 p.m., a Lecture illustrated by Lantern Slides will be given in our Parish Hall on "The Knights of Malta," otherwise known as the "Hospitaliers and Knights of St. John, of Jerusalem." The Lecturer will be Archdeacon S. M. Johnstone, O.St. J., M.A., F.R.H.S. Admission will be by ticket, costing 1/-, and the proceeds will be devoted to the Australian Commandery of the Order of St. John in the British Realm. The Lecture will trace the history of the Order from the beginning of the Christian Pilgrimages to the Holy Land, through the period of the Crusades, and the subsequent activities of the Order in the Mediterranean and elsewhere. The Ophthalmic Hospital of the Order at Jerusalem gave great assistance to the Australian Troops while stationed in Palestine. The Y.C.I.—The first "Y.C.I. meeting in October was given over to a Ladies' Night, when members' personal guests and ladies from the Choir and Sunday School were entertained. The programme was a mixture of unique and fascinating games, which caught the imagination and interest of those present. At the supper served at the conclusion of the meeting a welcome was extended and acknowledged by a representative of the visitors.

The second meeting was devoted to the 132nd issue of the Manuscript Journal. The articles were plentiful and covered a wide field of interest.
